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Back Stairs: Source of Amazement

Washington—UPI—Backstairs at the White House. At least one illustrious American waited around Palm Springs, Calif., for two days recently on the understanding that he was to play golf with President Eisenhower. He didn't and went away puzzled, if not genuinely miffed at an equally illustrious American (non-Washington division), who had assured him he would be in the President's foursome.

Why ordinarily sensible people attempt to use the Presidency in this manner is a constant source of amazement to the White House staff.

The White House correspondents batted an unhappy .000 in their pursuit of a particular present for the President who is 69 years old today. The reporters, at their big dinner and show for the President Monday night, were well aware that Eisenhower is an avid fan of Westerns on television.

In arranging their show, they tried to get one of the ranking cowboys from motion pictures and—on television to join the entertainment for the President and his guest, President Adolfo Lopez Mateos of Mexico.

Most of the Western stars, however, were too busy shooting at each other on the sound stages of Hollywood to get away for a few hours with the President and the reporters.

It would be unfair to identify one star in particular because he was so genuinely enthusiastic about the prospect of appearing for Eisenhower and Lopez Mateos. The studio boss said no, however. Why? Because the boss was afraid that his rough, tough leading-in hero of the old West might catch a cold if he flew East and thus interfere with expensive production schedules.

There were artists, however, who cast all caution to the winds and came to Washington to entertain the President. With no thought of colds, the brave ones who gave the President a thrilling birthday show included Mahalia Jackson, Hal Holbrook, the Lennon sisters from the Lawrence Welk Show, singer John Gary and Carl Reiner.

Miss Jackson's appearance was particularly courageous because the Democratic party has no more fervent member. She reasoned, however, that this birthday was about as

non-political as possible.

The Lennon sisters had to fly from Hawaii to make it in time for the President's show and their teacher flew with them. The girls live in California where state law requires young ladies and gentlemen of the entertainment world to keep studying wherever they may travel.

Hal Holbrook, whose "Mark

Twain Tonight" was such a New York theater hit this year, had to cancel a highly profitable one-night stand—more than 3,000 tickets were ordered and paid for—in order to appear before the President. And Reiner had to juggle a complicated schedule of TV appearances and delay an important trip to the West Coast to appear in the show.

BLM Employee Receives Award

Tom A. Saunders, forester of the Medford district office of the bureau of land management, has received a \$15 award for a suggestion for facilitating statistical and administrative assignments by the technique of color coding.

The award, granted by the Area I Incentive Awards committee, was presented to Saunders by District Manager Ross Youngblood of the Medford BLM office at a district staff meeting Monday.

Israelis Demand Nazi Extradition

Tel Aviv, Israel—UPI—Israelis have demanded extradition of Nazi war criminal Adolf Eichmann from a Persian Gulf hideout for trial as the "master executioner" of five million Jews.

Newspapers gave credit to Tuvia Friedman, 55, Haifa, Israel, former inmate of a Hitler concentration camp, for tracking down Eichmann in the Arab sheikdom of Kuwait, a British protectorate.

In Frankfurt, Germany, State Prosecutor Hans Krueger said extradition documents could be drawn up at any time. A trial of the former Nazi S.S. colonel would have to be held in Germany.

Eichmann was head of the Jewish Department of the Nazi Security Ministry and was one of the few accused war criminals who escaped justice after the war.

Extradition admittedly would be difficult, Kuwait is Arab and Arab animosity toward Israel remains as bitter as ever.

Scientists Shooting For Million MPH Speeds in Space

Langley Field, Va.—UPI—Scientists are shooting for speeds of more than a million miles an hour in space and less than 100 miles an hour close to the ground.

This roughly represents the extremes of research being pushed at its various scientific centers by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Between the extremes are research and development projects aimed at:

—Perfecting collapsible space platforms and space-ships which automatically expand after being fired into orbits high above the earth.

—Development of radio communications capable of spanning the interplanetary voids.

Plan "Parking Orbits"

—Boosting rockets into "parking orbits" from which lunar probes could be launched more successfully than from stationary sites on the ground.

—Designing jet aircraft capable of speeds greater than a mile a second to handle human transportation from point

to point on the earth's surface.

This and a host of other research projects, including an array of spacecraft resembling everything from a flattened needle to a flexible kite, are being reported to some 2,100 guests this week at NASA's \$100 million Langley Research Center here.

The hottest thing in space research is a new science called magnetoplasma dynamics or MPD for short. A plasma is a gas which has been so hot that its molecules break up into electrically charged positive and negative particles.

Can Supply Speed

Such a gas is electrically conductive, and under the influence of electromagnetic forces its particles can be made to move literally at millions of miles an hour.

Since the weight of gas involved is extremely small, such motions don't generate much thrust. If you want to lift a spaceship off the ground against the pull of gravity,

Rhinoceros Entered In Brazil Election

Porto Alegre, Brazil—UPI—Caicareo, the rhinoceros who was a write-in favorite in last week's Sao Paulo City Council vote, has been entered with a bull and a goat for next month's local election here.

The animals, tokens of opposition to Brazil's runaway inflation, are favored to win a landslide victory over 212 human candidates.

Caicareo polled nearly 100,000 votes in Sao Paulo, approximately twice as many as the leading human.
