

CENTRAL POINT School Program Set

Central Point—Bill Brewster, principal of Jewett Elementary school, and George Johns, principal of Central Point Elementary and Junior High school, have invited all interested persons to attend "Back to School Night" Oct. 15.

At Jewett school, the time will be 6:30 to 7:30 p.m., and at the Central Point Elementary and Junior High school, the time will be from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m.

Parents will go directly to their children's rooms, become acquainted with the teacher and view the children's work, their books and school facilities.
