

Veteran Newsman Says Cold War 'Here To Stay'

San Diego—UPI—The cold war "is here to stay," according to Hugh Baillie, veteran of 17 years of gathering the news all over the world and former president of United Press.

Baillie said there might be a truce, such as the recent Krushchev visit, but that the Russians and Chinese are not making it.

To report the news during this trying period requires freedom of the press, he said, "the United States has always been in the forefront of the struggle for freedom of information."

Although people are always expecting him to have the answer, Baillie said he had no idea who the next president would be.

"But I do know we should pray to God almighty to bring us another Eisenhower."

Man Sentenced to Year in County Jail

Morse Charges Labor 'Sold Out' By Sen. Kennedy

Milwaukee, Wis.—UPI—Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) charged Wednesday night that Sen. John Kennedy (D-Mass.) "sold out" labor to further his own presidential ambitions.

Morse said Kennedy was "the principal architect" of the Landrum-Griffin labor reform bill so he could obtain a "label" with the word "labor" on it.

The Kennedy-Landrum-Griffin law "was labor's worst setback since passage of the Taft-Hartley act," Morse told the United Industrial Workers International convention.

"Let there be no misunderstanding among you," he said. "Had the senator from Massachusetts at any time not opposed bringing this language back to the Senate in form of a conference report, it would not now be law."

Morse was one of the members of the joint congressional conference committee which molded the Landrum-Griffin bill into the final form which became law. Kennedy was chairman of the committee and ranking labor committee senator on the joint parity.

Transit Bargaining Scheduled Friday

Portland—UPI—Representatives of Rose City Transit company, the Portland local of the Streetcarmen's union and the Federal Mediation service will sit down at a bargaining table here Friday in an effort to resolve a wage dispute before the Oct. 31 deadline.

If negotiations fail, city bus service in Portland could be halted.

Doctors Attempt To Save Features Of Scalped Girl

Salt Lake City—UPI—Doctors today attempted to save the ears, eyelids and eyebrows of a girl scalped accidentally by a mechanical potato digger by grafting them to her abdomen.

Christine Hayes, 12, was picking potatoes on a farm at Blackfoot, Idaho, when her hair, done up in a pony-tail, became caught in the digger. Her scalp and part of her face were torn off.

The Idaho doctor who first treated Christine immediately received instructions on preservation of the dismembered parts.

This encouraged plastic surgeons to make the temporary graft in the hope that they would adhere to her abdomen, obtain a blood supply and remain healthy for later grafting back in their original locations.

In their first operation, plastic surgeons grafted skin to Christine's face and neck. Among the future operations will be one to remove an outer layer of the girl's skull to provide a possible surface for skin grafts.

The surgery may extend over a period of years.

Two Men Appear in Circuit Court Here

Two men waived grand jury action and had attorneys appointed for them in circuit court Wednesday.

They were Charles Lavonne Coffey, 21, of Blackwell rd., Gold Hill, who was charged with burglary in a dwelling, and William Harrison Smith, 39, of Lyndon, Calif., who was charged with uttering and publishing a forged check.

Judge James Main appointed Robert Boyer to represent Coffey and John Cheney for Smith.

Policy Statement For Dog Pound Is Received by Court

A written statement of proposed policy for Jackson county dog control was received this week by the county court.

The statement, drafted by County Dog Control Officer Chris Hagler and Poundmaster Joe Taylor, was approved Tuesday by the three-man county dog control board before its submission to the court for final consideration.

The court members asked for the policy statement Sept. 29 with an eye to eliminating misunderstandings concerning the nature and extent of county dog control operations.

The court had received a number of complaints on certain phases of the operations, alleging in particular that the county dog pound's pet-for-adoption program was being run for profit and that the county was in competition with private kennels and the Southern Oregon Humane society.

The court members in calling for the statement, made it clear the pound would be run on a non-profit basis and added, "It isn't our intention to interfere with kennels or the humane society, but to cooperate with them."

The following are excerpts from the statement: "It is the policy of Jackson county dog control that the first and most important considerations shall be the licensing and control of all dogs in Jackson county and the placing in good homes of as many of our dogs as possible."

"Prices should be set with this policy in mind: recover the maintenance cost. However, the price should not be set so high that anyone who comes to us for a dog goes away without one. The only exception to this is the case of the known 'repeat' customers who obviously come shopping for valuable dogs that they intend to pick up cheaply and re-sell for a profit."

"At the poundmaster's discretion, an exchange animal may be given to replace one that became ill or was unsatisfactory. A cash refund may be given on demand."

Diagnose Ailments
"We are not permitted to diagnose ailments nor prescribe treatment for people's pets. Advise that such inquiries be taken to a veterinarian."

"Complaints should be answered the same day as received or as promptly as possible day or night."

"No rough handling or mistreatment of our animals is permitted."

"The Jackson county dog pound does not give out animals for experimentation, exploitation, nor cruel treatment of any kind. We give them either to kind homes or destroy them."

Property of County
"It is understood that all animals on the premises are the property of Jackson county, and all moneys derived from their sale, and the sale of dog licenses, go into the Jackson county dog control fund."

"State law prescribes a fine of up to \$500 for abandonment of any domestic animal without making proper provision for its food and shelter. Contact the office of the district attorney for prosecution of such offenders."

"The state health department requires that a dog which has bitten some person shall be held for 10 days. It is optional with the owner whether he elects to hold the dog on his own premises. If held in our isolation kennel, a fee of \$1 per day is to be paid, plus \$1 impounding fee, plus an additional \$1 destroying charge if the dog has to be destroyed following isolation period."

"State law prescribes that all dogs with their second teeth require a dog license. We will do our best to collect these licenses at all times."

Responsible for Claims
"The Jackson county dog control board is responsible for all claims filed against them for livestock and poultry killed by dogs. If the owners of such dogs are found they shall be required to pay the damages. Also, any dog

caught molesting livestock or poultry in any manner shall be destroyed on sight."

"The Jackson county dog control board, which is appointed by the Jackson county court, has a chairman and two members. These three men meet the first Tuesday of each month to pass on and pay claims against the Jackson county dog control board and take care of all old and new business."

The current board members include W. H. Arnold, chairman, Henry A. Owens and Homer Jeffries.

Report of Prices
Attached to the statement is a report on the prices, as of Aug. 1, of dogs for sale at the pound to new owners. These include \$3 to \$5 plus \$1.50 license fee for grown males; \$1 to \$3 for puppies, depending on how long they have been at the pound; and \$15 spaying charges plus other charges for shots if given and \$1.50 license fee for spayed females.

According to this report, from May 1 to Sept. 2 a total of \$792.20 was paid out to veterinarians for spaying and other medical treatment and \$41.09 was spent for miscellaneous needs at the pound. During this period a total of \$696.09 was collected in spaying charges and pound charges.

One reason for the difference between expenses and collections, according to the report, was the fact that 13 spayed females had to be destroyed afterward because of distemper, and thus no spaying charges could be collected later from new owners.

SINGER PIAF RELEASED

Paris—UPI—French singer Edith Piaf was released Wednesday from the American Hospital of Paris where she underwent an operation for inflammation of the pancreas three weeks ago. Miss Piaf said she hoped to resume her singing career in February.

Rival Tribesmen Clash in Riots In Belgian Congo

Leopoldville, Belgian Congo—UPI—Rival tribesmen clashed today in another round of fights "to the death" near the town of Luluabourg where terrified European residents have taken refuge.

It was the third day of fierce clashes between the Lulua and Baluba tribes. Reports reaching the Congolese capital 600 miles away said at least 20 natives were dead.

More than 200 Africans of the warring tribes have been arrested, most of them because they carried machettas, the most common weapon used in the rioting that began Monday.

Europeans in the area have taken refuge in the town of Luluabourg, on the Lulua river. The police have sealed off the European section of the city with its population of 2,000. Only Europeans fleeing the riot-torn countryside were allowed past guards armed with machine-guns.

In the African section, which has a population of 64,000, strong police patrols were arresting Africans who carried arms or had no papers. Pillars of smoke could be seen rising from surrounding villages.

Hatfields Undergo Physical Therapy

Salem—UPI—Both Gov. and Mrs. Mark Hatfield are undergoing physical therapy under direction of Dr. Robert Anderson, the governor's office said today.

Mrs. Hatfield has been placed in a "collar" for neck injuries suffered in a week end traffic mishap. She also sustained bruises on one side of her body.

The governor returned to work Wednesday, but Dr. Ralph Purvine ordered his out-of-town engagements cancelled for the rest of this week. Included was the dedication of the Waldport high school Friday.

COURT CONVICTS REDS

Trivandrum, India—UPI—A court Wednesday convicted A. K. Gopalan, deputy leader of the Communist opposition in Parliament, of defamation charges filed by the former district superintendent of police in Kottayam.

Munich, Germany—UPI—Bruno Beirsdorf, 20, who was

credited with frustrating an attempt to assassinate West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer seven years ago, is under arrest here as a hotel thief, Munich police reported.

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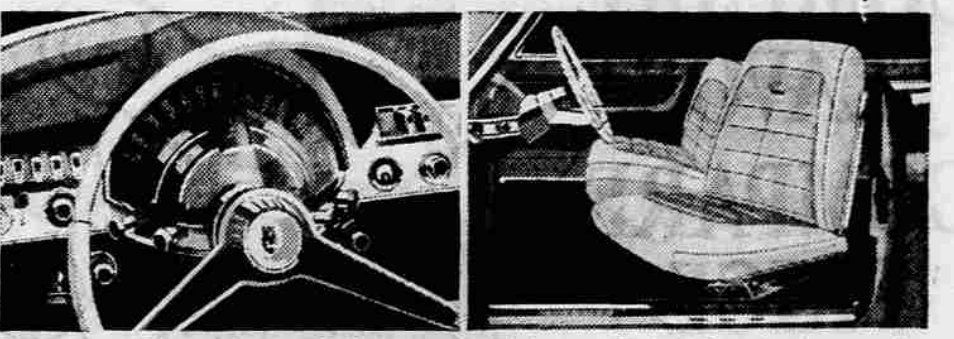
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
