Cellers Warns Major Leagues

Washington (UPI)—The chairman of the House judiciary committee warned big league baseball today that it would invite "strong" anti-trust legislation if the Washington Senators moved to Minneapolis.

Chairman Emanuel Celler (D-N.Y.) served notice that any move by the Washington club "will give me more ammunition and impetus" to push a baseball anti-trust bill in the next session of Congress.

Celler also accused Senators owner Calvin Griffith of "going back on his word to Congress and to the people that he wouldn't move."

Aparicio, Fox, Wynn Unanimous Choices For All-Star Team

 New York (UPI)—Luis Aparicio and Nelson Fox, the Chicago White Sox' brilliant double play combination, were unanimous choices today on a United Press International 1959 American league All-Star team that does not include a single New York Yankee.

Two other members of the American league champions—

pitcher Early Wynn and catcher Sherman Lollar—were named to the team, which also included pitcher Cal McLish, outfielder Rocky Colavito and first baseman Vic Power of the Cleveland Indians, outfielders Al Kaline and Harvey Kuenn of the Detroit Tigers and third baseman Frank Malzone of the Boston Red Sox.

Mickey Mantle, who received eight votes for an outfield position and Yogi Berra, who got two for catcher, were the only Yankees among the total of 29 players receiving at least one vote. The team was picked by a 24-man committee of baseball experts, three representing each city in the league.

Wynn, whose 271 victories make him the biggest winner among active major league pitchers, also was a unanimous choice of the committee. Lollar received 18 votes, and Power, Malzone, Kaline and Colavito had 16 each. McLish got 11 and Kuenn won the third outfield berth with 10.

The Short, Happy Life of the Luna Moth

In a nocturnal flight of the luna moth, is mystery and suspense in superabundance. Here are creatures who inhabit only the darkness; creatures too beautiful to describe, who enact the entire drama of birth, life, reproduction and death in only a few short hours.

Silently I sat and waited. The night was very warm and still, not even a whisper of wind stirred in the leaves that hung quiet and dull green in the yellow tropical moonlight. The stars were bright and clear and seemed so near that one could almost reach up and pick them out of the sky that looked blue even though the sun had been gone for hours. The nearby hammock looked black; the thick vegetation screened the moonlight from its interior; it lay off to my right, dark and mysterious in the night.

I prepared to switch on the powerful electric torch I carried. I was afield for the sole purpose of observing, if I was lucky, the nocturnal flight of night-flying moths.

Lights On

I switched on the light. The shadows rushed back, as if in fright; the near edge of the hammock became real as every tree trunk and leaf sprang into view. It was several minutes before the insect noises resumed their usual clamor.

By the time my eyes had accustomed themselves to the glare, many small bugs already had been attracted by the light.

The witchery of the moon and the languorous night gripped me; I had to rouse myself with an effort. A shadow had flitted across the outer

edge of the illuminated circle, just where the light and the darkness met. I watched, trying to see into the black shadows—then I saw her, she had come in from the side, her pale green wings glinting in the light—a luna moth.

No more beautiful creature

inhabits this earth than this frail being that flies only at night and whose life lasts but a few days. As men measure time, barely a week would elapse during which the entire life span of the luna moth runs its allotted course. Yet in those few short days, this celestial beauty I was watching had emerged from her silken tomb, flitted on velvet wings through the warm darkness, mated, would lay her eggs and die.

Full, Short Life

A full life, but a pitifully short one. Nature did not even endow her with a mouth—she would have no occasion to eat. But during her few allotted hours of life, she had to find

a mate, and nature gave to her a faint, elusive scent that wafts far on the soft night air, is picked up by a mate somewhere out there in the darkness.

His delicate fern-like antennae detect the scent and he follows the invisible path unerringly to the waiting moth. A few hours in the moonlight, then she lays her eggs and dies. These two actors play their part but once; they are on the stage but a little time; they will never make a second appearance. Here are all the ingredients of a mystery, dark and profound. Adventure, suspense, midnight tryst and even mortal combat, as once in a while two males will batter

each other into senseless tatters for the same female.

Of the 8,000 species of moths that inhabit the earth, none is more beautiful than the luna moth. There are many more moths than butterflies, but the majority of moths fly only at night and are seldom seen.

The beautiful creature under the light flitted suddenly away toward a shadow that appeared at the far edge of the hammock. I switched the light off; the moon was as bright as ever; the shadows came back, the trees of the hammock became only a blob in the night.
