Doctor Testifies Attempt Made To Sever Relations

Prineville — (UPI) — The defendant in a \$203,864 medical malpractice suit testified Wednesday he tried to break off an affair with the woman who is suing him but that she wanted to maintain the relationship.

Dr. Norman D. Coleman, 37, gave the testimony in a civil trial of a suit brought by Mrs. Clara Mitchell, 25. She charged, among other things, that he engaged in sexual relations with her while she was mentally ill.

Dr. Coleman told the jury of six women and six men that he tried to break off their affair in the fall of 1957. He said she wanted to maintain the relationship although he realized it had to stop.

The doctor said he was forced to call her as often as two or three times a week, to visit her at home and to engage in kissing and petting sessions to keep her "pacified."

Threat Said Made

He said he finally told her he no longer cared for her. "I told her my feelings for her were the same as someone who had loved someone but had married another person."

He said Mrs. Mitchell threatened she was "going to get even with me if it was the last thing she ever did in her life."

Dr. Coleman added he told his wife about the affair after Mrs. Mitchell went to the state mental hospital for the third time.

He denied he had ever given Mrs. Mitchell drugs for any purpose except medication. He also said he had never used sodium pentothal (so-called truth serum) on her and that he had not engaged in "deep psychotherapy."

He also denied he had sexual intercourse with Mrs. Mitchell while she was mentally upset.

Marine Band to Play Tomorrow

Among outstanding soloists are Frederick Erdman, cornetist; James Erdman II, trombonist; William Jones, vocalist; and John Beck, marimba soloist.

Tickets are 75 cents for students at the matinee, \$2 for general admission and \$2.50 for the reserved section at the evening concert. Tickets are available at Swem's, Emerald Music company, Barker's, Puruckers, Medford High school, and at the door.

Case Dismissed in District Court

The case against Rachel Fay Standley, 22, of 310 Haven st., Medford, was dismissed in the course of a trial Tuesday before District Judge E. Roy Bashaw.

Jury Finds in Favor of Bottger

A jury in circuit court Tuesday returned two findings favorable to Henry C. Bottger, Upper Applegate rd., Jacksonville, in his suit against the state industrial accident commission.

At issue in the trial before Circuit Judge James M. Main were whether Bottger had suffered an accidental injury while employed by Rogue River Packer Corp. and whether the injury to his left leg resulted from a fruit box slipping from his hands. The episode reportedly occurred Sept. 19, 1958.

The jury responded with a "Yes" to both questions.

Bottger, according to William Deatherage, his attorney, had been denied a state industrial accident claim previously on the ground that his case did not qualify.
