

Governor's Rest After Accident Filled With Lots of Homework

Salem (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield took the hard way to get a couple of days off earlier this week as he and his wife rested at home following a week end traffic accident in Portland.

Despite a stiff neck, the governor signed more than 50 papers including letters and extradition proceedings. The fact that the Hatfields' apartment is close to the capitol building made it easier for the necessary work to be done.

The accident, which strained both the governor's and his wife's necks, was the third in which Hatfield had been involved in the past 10 years. In none of them was the governor driving.

In 1949, a friend was driving on the Bayshore highway outside Palo Alto, Calif., when they were struck from behind as they attempted to turn left. Hatfield's back was injured and he was hospitalized briefly.

The present governor's press secretary, Travis Cross, was driving Hatfield (then a state legislator) in 1954 when they were hit head-on. Hatfield suffered a scalp wound. An irony connected with the latest accident in which the rear of Hatfield's limousine was smashed in, was that Hatfield's father-in-law, Vincent Kuzmanich, Portland, is a friend of the longshoreman whose car struck the governor's Cadillac.

These accidents have all taken second place to one brought up by Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) during Hatfield's campaign for governor.

The governor, while still in his teens, had struck and killed a young girl who ran in front of his car. But Morse's revival of this old tragedy at campaign time seemed to touch off sentiment favorable to Hatfield.

The brief respite offered by the last mishap was the first rest since he spent two days in Vancouver, B.C., and then took a week end off at the Oregon coast.

Things will pick up shortly, however. Hatfield is scheduled to "Meet the Press" Oct. 23 over television from Los Angeles. He will also receive an award from the National Municipal League Nov. 17.

Sick or well, the governor must forego many out-of-state requests. He has turned down more than nine out of 10 appearances out of Oregon.

Included were invitations from Queen Elizabeth II to meet him in British Columbia during her Canadian tour and a request from President Eisenhower to be present at ground-breaking ceremonies for the Eisenhower library in Abilene, Kan.

Despite these refusals, Hatfield has still spent a good deal of time outside the state. Comment Raised

Test Measures Risk Taken in Heart Surgery

Los Angeles (Science Service) — A new test has been devised which tells whether or not patients with high blood pressure in the lungs, associated with a hole between the heart chambers, can safely undergo heart surgery.

The test was developed by Drs. I. Hunter Crittenden, Forrest H. Adams and Harrison Latta of the University of California, Los Angeles.

It involves intravenous administration of a drug, acetylcholine. This drug tends to relax normal blood vessels of the lung causing a drop in pressure in them.

But diseased arteries, in which the inside wall is markedly scarred offering much resistance to blood flow, show little or no response to the acetylcholine.

Patients with severe artery disease in the lung usually do not benefit by surgery. Thus the new test is an index to the degree of lung artery involvement and a surgical risk of the patient.

Thirty-eight patients have been studied with the new technique and results have been encouraging, the investigators said. All patients demonstrating reduced artery pressure in response to acetylcholine that have undergone surgery have survived.

DRISCOLL'S MOTHER DIES
Haddonfield, N. J. — (UPI) — Mrs. Mattie Eastlack Driscoll, 78, mother of former New Jersey Gov. Alfred E. Driscoll, died Tuesday.

This was mostly because Hatfield had been mentioned as a possible Republican vice-presidential candidate on a ticket headed by Gov. Nelson Rockefeller whereas most western governors were known to favor Nixon.

However, the governor's office points out that Hatfield spent much time with Nixon on his recent trip to dedicate the Dalles dam. The only exceptions were brief periods Nixon spent with friends and with Washington Governor Albert Rosellini.

Hatfield did not sit in on Nixon's strategy session but the vice-president was one of the first to respond by telegram when Hatfield was injured this past week end. His condolences were in by noon Monday.

The governor's position seems to be that it would be unfair to either Republican hopeful at this time to express a preference which might have national implications.

PAYING ITS DEBT
