Steel up a point or more. DuPont jumped nearly 3 in a firm chemicals section, and Allied Chemical more than 2. Tufokol, off more than 1 in earlier dealings, came back slightly.

In the oils, Amerada gained more than 2, and Sinclair a point.

# Prineville Doctor Wins Damage Suit; Policemen Posted

Prineville—UPI—Two policemen were stationed outside the home of Dr. Norman D. Coleman Thursday night after a Crook County Circuit Court jury refused to award damages to Mrs. Clara Mitchell in the woman's \$203,814 mal-

practice suit against the doctor. Prineville Police Chief Mike Thompson said the men were assigned to guard the doctor's home as a "precautionary measure."

# Bank Appeals Board Decision

Salem—UPI—The State Banking Board Thursday heard an appeal from the Inland Empire Bank whose request to establish a branch bank at Pendleton was turned down by the state superintendent, J. F. M. Slade. But Slade told the banking board that Inland's request was turned down because it was filed later than that of Portland Trust.

Slade said that Portland Trust filed July 27 and that Inland's application was not received until Aug. 5. He said the law required him to accept the first application. Gov. Mark Hatfield, who sits on the banking board to which Inland appealed, said that the case was the first in which a banking commission decision had been attacked. The board took the appeal under advisement.

The six men and six women in the jury deliberated about three hours before returning the verdict. Mrs. Mitchell, an attractive mother of three, had accused the doctor of having sex relations with her while she was being treated for a mental disorder.

She charged that the doctor had acted "negligently, carelessly and unskillfully, causing severe and permanent damage" in his treatment. It was claimed that the physician also administered deep psychotherapy treatments, which he was allegedly unqualified to give.

However, Dr. Coleman denied that he used sodium pentathol . . . so-called truth serum . . . on Mrs. Mitchell, and said he did not engage in "deep psychotherapy."

A former mental patient, Mrs. Mitchell admitted Thursday she had intercourse with an undetermined number of men since she was a senior in high school. Dr. Coleman, while on the stand Wednesday, testified that he tried to break off relations with Mrs. Mitchell.

# Tujunga Canyon Fire Rages Uncontrolled in California

Los Angeles—UPI—A gigantic brush fire raged unchecked in the Los Angeles foothills today and there was no immediate hope of bringing it under control. About 30 to 40 homes were within less than a mile of the blaze and in peril. Several hundred other homes were in potential danger. An estimated 80 persons

were forced to spend the night away from their threatened homes in the big Tujunga Canyon in the flareup area. Other residents were warned to be ready to flee at any time. The wind-whipped fire has burned an ugly black scar in 7,200 acres of valuable watershed in the foothills about 20 miles northeast of here since erupting Tuesday afternoon.

More than 2,000 men were massed against the crackling blaze feeding on thick undergrowth, scrub oak and pine trees. Perimeter of the giant blaze was estimated at 40 miles. Another, less serious but potentially dangerous, brush fire erupted Thursday afternoon in Topanga Canyon near Malibu, some 40 miles or more southwest of the foothill blaze in the Angeles National Forest. It has burned 250 acres but was no immediate threat to homes.

Students of Mount St. Mary school, Beverly Hills, where Miss Jeri Callahan of Medford is enrolled, were evacuated from the school Wednesday because of the fire according to information received by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Callahan, 128 Highland drive. Miss Callahan talked with her parents and said that although students were allowed to return to the buildings later, they were told to be prepared for another evacuation.

# Two Homes Seen As Necessity in Next Few Years

Portland—UPI—The average American family within a relatively few years will look upon the idea of two homes as a virtual necessity to the everyday pattern of living, a plywood official said Thursday.

W. E. Difford, managing director of the Douglas Fir Plywood Association, made the prediction at the regular fall meeting here of subscribers to the Association's trade promotion program. Difford told some 250 executives "four years ago the idea was fantastic. Today it's a reasonable possibility. Tomorrow it will be a major market for plywood."

He said "the only thing holding back an actual explosion in the demand for the second house is financing." He said a program was needed which would make it as easy to buy a second house or a cabin hideaway as it is to buy a boat, a car or a swimming pool.
