

Oregon Spoils Air Force Record By Trouncing Falcons 20-3

Portland, Ore. — (UPI) — Fast and alert Oregon, led by Quarterback Dave Groz and substitute Fullback Harry Needham, spoiled Air Force's unblemished football record Saturday with a convincing 20-3 victory before 29,162 fans.

It was the first loss for 12th-ranked Air Force in 15 straight games. Unbeaten Oregon now has won five straight.

Groz, a calm 196-pound junior, completed 12 of 21 passes for 145 yards. One of them was a 50-yard touchdown pass to pint-sized Halfback Cleveland Jones.

Needham, a speedy senior, scored two touchdowns and had 77 yards in a dozen carries.

Four pass interceptions, two of them by Halfback Willie West, wrecked the Air Force.

Oregon started out sluggishly. The Webfoots were outplayed in the first period and Air Force scored first on a 33-yard field goal by George Pupich.

But the Webfoots came to left with startling suddenness in the second period.

Guard Dave Urell intercepted a pass at midfield and Groz hit the five-foot, five-inch Jones with a long pass on the 20. He scored untouched.

Then the Webfoots launched a 75-yard scoring drive, with Needham, whose brother attends the Air Force Academy, doing most of the work. He racked up 49 yards in seven carries and plunged over from a yard out.

Oregon scored again early in the final period, moving 55 yards in four plays. Needham made the touchdown from seven yards out.

Air Force, with Richie Mayo hitting some beautiful screen passes to Mike Quinlan, dominated the third period. The Falcons moved from their own 22 to the Oregon 6 in one drive, but West's interception on the goal line ruined it. Then Groz scored 63 yards from scrimmage on the next play and the Falcons were finished.

Groz had a total of 213 yards rushing and passing.

Air Force lost to Colorado State, 20-7, in the final game of the 1957 season.

Tornado Junior Varsity Holds Off Pelicans 27-20

Medford high's junior varsity footballers built up a large lead and then held off a second half rally to down the Klamath Falls JV on the Medford field 27 to 20 Saturday afternoon.

Medford scored near the start of the game. Three plays after the Tornado had kicked off the Pelicans were forced to punt. Mike McCollough took the ball on his own 20 and went down the right side on an 80 yard run to pay dirt. Paul Garren's run for the conversion was stopped.

The Tornado scored again a few moments later when Craig Laurence passed 17 yards to McCollough on the 20 and he ran the rest of the way. George Clearwater went up the middle for the bonus and 13 to 0 at the end of the first quarter. Medford next went 54 yards in five plays with Clearwater going over the last 12 yards. Garren crossed for the extra.

55-Yard Punch

Then, after the Tornado kicked to the Pelicans, KF marched 55 yards in eight plays for its first score. Roger Ballard went over from the one foot line. Gordy Malcomb kicked low in the extra attempt. Score at the end of the half was 20-6.

Medford went 47 yards in 10 plays for its final touchdown of the day. Bob Classen took a Laurence pass in the end zone on a 12 yard play. Clearwater broke up the middle for the bonus point.

The Pelicans then moved 57 yards in 11 plays for a TD, the score coming when Ballard tried for the end zone from the one. He fumbled the ball but it was recovered by Jim Lanchester. Malcomb split the air rights.

The next time they got the ball the Pelicans journeyed 33 yards in five plays and picked up the marker when Sherman Allen passed to Rich Depew. Malcomb's kick was good.

Klamath Falls led in first downs 10 to eight.

Hedrick 9th Tips Crater

Central Point — Hedrick Junior High school ninth grade gridders came from behind in the third period and added insurance in the fourth to edge the Crater freshmen here Friday afternoon.

Even then the Hornets faced a closing bid by the Comets. A Glines run put the ball to the 18-yard line. Then he got to the six. But, a 15-yard penalty against the Comets nipped the threat.

Bandy scored in the opening quarter for Hedrick on a nine-yard run. Gary Wald went four yards to the goal for Crater in the second chukker.

Gas Stove Blast Kills One Person, Hurts 17 Others

Wapato, Wash. — (UPI) — A gas stove exploded in a building north of here Saturday killing one person and injuring 17 others, seven of them seriously enough to require hospitalization.

All the victims were Indians, most of them members of the Yakima tribe.

Killed was Moody Charley, 53. The injured included his 12-year-old son, Anthony.

Others injured were Herbie Woods, 29; Elizabeth Double-runner, 29; Raymond Pierce and Daniel Pierce. They were taken to Central Memorial hospital in nearby Tappanish. Taken to a Yakima hospital were Frazer Thomas and George Jimmy, both of Vancouver, B.C. Ten persons were treated by doctors but did not require hospitalization.

Indian police investigating the explosion said the group was playing cards in a building near the Indian fishing grounds on the Yakima river.

A bottle gas stove started making strange noises and then exploded, police said. The explosion hurled the stove through the roof of the building and 50 to 75 feet in the air.

Charley went over to the stove to investigate when the strange noises started, police said, and was standing close by when it exploded.

A fire followed the explosion and destroyed the building.

The Indians had gathered at the river site for their annual salmon fishing season under treaty rights. The salmon come up the river to spawn each year and the Indians use spears and nets to catch the fish as they attempt to jump the small Sunnyhide dam across the river from the scene of the explosion.

Scalping Shows Education Need

Boise — (UPI) — The scalping death of Christine Hayes, 12, dramatizes the need for greater education on farm hazards, two Idaho officials said Friday.

The Blackfoot girl died in a Salt Lake City hospital Friday, four days after she was scalped by a mechanical potato digger while working on a farm near her home.

Labor Commissioner W. L. Robinson and State Agriculture Commissioner Stanley Trenhaile both agreed legislation governing agriculture employment and safety standards for farm equipment is not the immediate answer.

Robinson said eventually he felt a code similar to the state law regarding industry would help reduce farm accidents, but education was the important thing at the moment.

Trenhaile said there also was a "need for more common sense on the part of people hiring children for farm work and also of the parents."

Other sponsors of the "crash program" against polio in the state included PTA groups, medical societies, nurses groups, granges and VFW auxiliaries.

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Pirate Gang Crushes RR Chiefs 47-7

Phoenix — Doing its heaviest scoring in the second half, after the visiting Chieftains had lost two top packs on injuries, the Phoenix high football team whipped Rogue River 47 to 7 here Friday night for its third straight Rogue victory.

The Pirates led 7 to 0 at the quarter and 14 to 0 at the half and pumped around three touchdowns in the third session to hold a 34 to 0 margin.

Paul Archer, tailback, hurt his foot and Larry Goosey, wingback received a broken collarbone. Both were starters for the Chieftains.

Phoenix went to a touchdown the first time it gained the ball, taking possession after the Chiefs had kept it for just three downs following the kick off. Ten plays covered 60 yards for the Pirates and Consbuck went off tackle for 10 yards on the scoring play. Sam Walls kicked his first of four successful conversion tries in six efforts.

Rogue River came back to reach the Pirate seven yard line only to be stopped.

Small next broke around end for a 65-yard run for Phoenix but clipping erased the romp and put the home team back on its 10. Twelve plays later Small went 21 yards to pay territory on a run which counted.

Dan Lumley gained the first of the Pirate touchdowns in the third chukker. Phoenix moved from its 42 in two plays to the RR 43 and Lumley broke away from that spot on a reverse.

A Pirate intercepted a Chief pass and it took four plays from the Rogue River 45 to go the distance again. Lumley made the biggest gain on a 30-yard run to the five. Consbuck made it to the one and Small went over then. Walls fourth conversion try was blocked.

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65-Yard Jaunt

To round out the third canto, Phoenix boomed to the goal in two plays from its five after a Rogue River punt. Small circled right end to the 35 and Lumley toured the left flank for the other 65 yards.

A nine-yard pass interception run by Mike Reese produced the next Phoenix TD. Walls kick was low for 40 to 0. Another stolen pass, this time Lumley set up the finale Pirate score. He ran the ball 30 yards to the Rogue River 20. On the fifth play from that point, Small crossed over from the five. Reese passed to Walls to convert.

Dennis White capped a 58-yard rumble for Rogue River with a five-yard scoring run. Jerry Van Dorn ran the extra point.

Phoenix outscrimmaged the Chieftains 415 yards to 299 and had first down advantage 16 to 12.

Corvallis — (UPI) — Pint-sized Larry Sanchez paced the Oregon State college to their first win in five starts as he scored one touchdown and passed for three more as the Beavers humiliated Idaho, 66-18, before 10,268 fans at Parker stadium Saturday.

Sanchez used his sharp-shooting arm to its fullest extent as he connected on five of nine passes for 124 yards to spearhead the high-scoring Oregon State attack.

Coach Tommy Prothro cleared his bench as the Beavers ran up a new Parker stadium and new OSC scoring high. Previous high Parker stadium high was 61 by UCLA in 1954. The old Beaver scoring record was 63, run up against Montana on the old Bell field.

OSC Gets 1st Win In Five Starts; Beats Idaho 66-18

Oregon State hit pay-dirt when Jim Stinnette scored with 40 seconds remaining in the quarter. He went over from the one to cap a 62-yard march.

End Leon Criner picked off an Idaho pass on the Vandal 33 and raced to the one-yard line. Stinnette dove over for the score. Sanchez picked off another Idaho pass minutes later and raced 64 yards to another Beaver score.

Sanchez then passed to Iaron Thomas for 36 yards to give the Beavers a 28-10 halftime bulge.

The final Vandal score came with 2:20 left in the game as Gary Farnsworth passed 23 yards to Kent Valley.

Longest run of the day was recorded by wingback Art Gilmore when he returned an Idaho kickoff 90 yards for a touchdown in the fourth period. Gilmore also scored on a 46-yard pass from Sanchez.

Sanchez also threw a 9-yard scoring toss to Thomas.

Stinnette added a final six points to his total in the third period on a one-yard plunge. Don Kasso tallied on a seven yard run.

Talent High Victor Over Prospect

Talent — Talent high's Bulldogs picked up touchdowns in every quarter Friday evening to outdo Prospect 25 to 6 in a non-league grid engagement.

The Bulldogs wasted no time in digging pay dirt. Ed Seaver ran the opening kick back to the Cougar 25-yard line and Bob Jacobs packed for a TD on the first play from scrimmage. A Seaver to Jacobs pass produced the only extra point of the night.

Bob Fitch then scored for Prospect on a 30-yard run but Talent boomed right back on Bob Jacobs' kick run back to the Prospect 11. Seavers' push to the one and then a TD plunge by Seaver. Don Skundrick made the third touchdown for Talent on a three yard run and set up the last with a pass interception dash which put the ball on the six. Bob Jacobs went the rest of the way.

Talent had 336 net scrimmage and seven first downs and Prospect 187 yards with two first downs.

School Patrols Subject of Study

Salem — (UPI) — Problems of school patrol operation in Oregon will be on the agenda of the Oregon traffic safety commission when it meets here Oct. 28.

The commission will study the method of operation of the safety patrols to determine if some form of legislation may be necessary.

There are more than 400 state-sponsored school patrols operated in about 250 Oregon communities, the commission said. However, the Portland program is independent of the state-sponsored patrols.

Outside Portland, the program is conducted by the motor vehicle department's traffic safety division with assistance from the highway department and police and school officials.

SOONERS GRIND ON

Columbia, Mo. — (UPI) — Oklahoma's Sooners were down the Missouri Tigers Saturday, scoring two touchdowns in the final period to ice a 23-0 victory over the team generally conceded the best chance of ending the Sooners' 11-year reign as Big Eight football champions.

It was the 73rd straight Big Eight victory for Oklahoma, but the outcome of the contest was in doubt until the final period — when quarterback Bobby Boyd and Bob Page each tallied a touchdown to put the game out of reach.

Monkey-Wrench Dropped in Works

Ephrata, Wash. — (UPI) — A monkey-wrench dropped into the works at Priest Rapids dam has resulted in a week's delay for the dam's first generator getting into service.

Herbert Jenkins, public relations director for the Grant county public utility district here, said Friday a workman dropped the wrench into the heart of the generator and workers were forced to disassemble the big power unit.

The rotor was not running at the time and no major damage was done. Plans had called for the opening of the first of the 10 generators next Friday but Jenkins said now it would be at least a week later.

Mike Hanby tied up the mix again with a 48-yard Cougar journey. But, on the first play after the kick-off Bob Berryman raced 80 yards to touchdown territory. Geren kicked the extra counter for a halftime status of 20 to 13.

In the third quarter Geren swiped a Hanby pass to give EP the ball on the IV 43. This prepared the way for a 43-yard goal scamper by Nease.

Clipping wrecked a 55-yard run to the goal by Berryman in the third quarter. Eagle Point drove to the Illinois Valley one in the fourth period and lost the ball on downs.

Berryman had 107 yards in nine packs for EP. Nease ran 81 for eight and Skeeters 60 for nine. Tucker was the evening's workhorse with 86 for 20 carries and Hanby had 73 for nine. Skeeters and Nease also contributed to the verdict with strong defensive play.

Eagle Point had 328 net yards, 74 passing and 254 on the ground. IV totaled 218 with 35 in the air and 183 rushing. The Cougars led in first downs nine to eight.

Ashland Grizzlies Upset Grants Pass

Ashland — Steve Gray, a lame-ankled halfback, gathered in a pass from Dave Jackson 4 1/2 minutes into the game, and galloped 20 yards for the only touchdown of the night as the Ashland high Grizzlies recorded a stunning 7 to 0 upset over Grants Pass in a Southern Oregon conference football game here on Friday.

The scoring play covered a total of 36 yards and LeRoy Hannon kicked the extra point.

Grants Pass gained the Ashland pay zone in the second quarter on a 24-yard play but it was ruled that an intended lateral was tossed forward. That nullified the Cavenem's deepest penetration.

Ashland in the first half got the ball to the GP 25 and 9-yard lines after Cavenem fumbles were recovered by Vern Speirs and Phil Tucker. Then the Grizzlies marched off the second half kick-off to the GP 20 and lost possession on a fumble of their own.

Dickerson Intercepts

In the fourth panel the Cavenem took advantage of another muff by Ashland to move to the Lithian 28.

The Ashlanders almost got their scoring opportunity sooner by recovery of the ball from GP. But, the whistle had blown before the Grizzlies controlled the pigskin and the Cavenem kept possession.

Big break came when Harley Dickerson intercepted a Rex Benner pass in midfield and ran the ball back to the GP 42. Paul Alley gained three yards and Doug Forrest nine to the 30. Jackson lost three yards on each of two occasions, then he pitched the winning pass.

Ashland had the yardage edge 212 to 134. Each club netted 102 yards in rushing but the Grizzlies gained 110 in the air to GP's 32. Grants Pass led 13 to 11 in first downs.

Gray saw action for only a few plays in the game because of his ailing ankle.

STAR GAME SET

Los Angeles (UPI) — The 10th anniversary All-Star pro bowl football game between the top players of the Eastern and Western conferences of the National Football league will be played in the Coliseum here Sunday, Jan. 17.

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
