Georgia Tech, Purdue, Iowa Fall By Football Wayside

Georgia Tech, Purdue and Iowa fell by the wayside Saturday but Northwestern, playing one of college football's toughest schedules, kept right on rolling in its bid to dethrone national champion Louisiana State.

Georgia Tech, the nation's fourth-ranked team, dropped a 6-6 decision to rebounding Auburn when Tech's kicking specialist, Tommy Wells, missed the try for extra point, fifth-ranked Purdue, playing without its No. 1 and 2 quarterbacks, was shut out by Ohio State, 15-0, and fumbling Iowa, ranked ninth, suffered a 25-16 defeat by Wisconsin.

Meanwhile, second-ranked Northwestern took over the lead in the Big Ten by defeating Michigan, 20-7. The victory was the Wildcats' third without a loss in conference play and their fourth overall. In addition to Michigan, they now hold victories over Oklahoma, Iowa and Minnesota with the toughest part of their schedule still before them.

Top-ranked L. S. U., which already has won four straight, played Kentucky, the patsy of the Southwestern Conference, in a night game. Texas, the nation's third-ranked team, also played at night, meeting southwest conference leader Arkansas.

Two Others Upset
Georgia Tech, Purdue and Iowa weren't the only ones to feel the up-set sting. Undeclared Air Force Academy, the best of the service academy schools this year, bowed to Oregon 20-3; West Virginia

dropped Pittsburgh, 23-15, and Maryland upended North Carolina, 14-7.

Yale, Pennsylvania, Penn State and Syracuse, the top teams in the East, won as expected; Mississippi rose up as a challenger for southern honors with its fourth straight victory; Illinois, one of the teams Northwestern plays later in the season, jumped into second place in the Big Ten race, and Oklahoma and Kansas remained tied for the

Rogers became coach after Frank Reagan resigned earlier this week.

The Redskins dominated play throughout the game, intercepting four Villanova passes and scoring their final touchdown after partially blocking a punt on the Wildcats' 15-yard line.

The first credit union was established in Germany in 1849 and was a non-profit organization, as they are today. The first credit union was established in the United States in 1909 in New Hampshire.

Since that time, the number of credit unions established under federal and state charters totaled 19,166 in the United States, representing 10,721,595 members with assets amounting to \$4,414,239,807.

USC Turns On Power To Win

Seattle, Wash. — (UP) — Sixth-ranked Southern California turned on an awesome display of power in the final period Saturday to defeat Washington, 22-15, before 52,500 screaming, stomping fans in one of the greatest football games ever played in Husky stadium.

Washington, the nation's 17-rated team, had gone ahead 15-14 with just over 10 minutes to go after Jerry Traynam fumbled Bob Schlored's 47-yard punt on the Trojan 20 and Don Millich pounced the ball to set the stage for the touchdown. Washington worked it down to the six. Then Schlored, a one-eyed quarterback from Gresham, swept around left end for the score and dove over tackle for the other two points.

A sellout, homecoming crowd was really screaming then. But Willie Wood, fleet Trojan quarterback who had been injured, came in and masterminded USC's victory march.

Traynam broke loose for 42 yards to Washington's 29. The Trojans drove down to the five, and Wood swung over for the winning score. Then he passed to George Van Vliet for two more points.

Football Hall Adds 10 Names

New Brunswick, N. J. — (UP) — Doak Walker, Doc Blanchard and Charlie Trippi, three standouts of the '40's, were among 10 new members selected for the National Football Hall of Fame to be constructed here shortly.

Walker starred for Southern Methodist in 1947, '48 and '49, Blanchard played fullback for Army in 1945, '46 and '47, and Trippi was a star halfback at Georgia in 1942, '45 and '46.

The other seven named were: Bobby Dodd, former Tennessee quarterback and present coach of Georgia Tech; the late Herman Hickman, ex-Tennessee guard and later coach at Yale; Carl Hinkle, one-time Vanderbilt center; the late James (Stan) Keck, who played for Princeton and coached Norwich, Princeton and Waynesburg; former Clemson on halfback James Banks McFadden; Clarence (Biggie) Munn, ex-Minnesota fullback and now athletic director at Michigan State; and the late Henry Disbrow Phillips, a star guard for Scowane during 1902, '03 and '04.

Pro Grid Questions Expressed

Can the Green Bay Packers make their record 4-0? Will the Philadelphia Eagles overcome a strange jinx? Can the Baltimore Colts stop the "Bear blitz"? Can the Cleveland Browns make their stingy defense pay off?

About 200,000 stadium fans and thousands of TV quarterbacks will get the answers to those questions in four of Sunday's top National Football league games.

The oddsmakers tab the Packers (3-0) as three-point underdogs against the Los Angeles Rams (1-2) at Milwaukee; the Eagles (2-1) 6½ point underdogs against the Giants (2-1) at New York; the Colts (2-1) slim, one-point favorites against the Bears (1-2) at Chicago; and the Browns (1-2) 4½ point choices against the Chicago Cardinals (1-2) at Cleveland.

The Pittsburgh Steelers (1-2) and Redskins (2-1) are rated even for their clash at Washington and the Lions (0-3) are two-point picks against the San Francisco Forty-Niners (2-1) at Detroit. The favorites have been beaten or failed to win by the pointspread in 11 of the 18 games played this season.

AUBURN BEATS TECH

Atlanta — (UP) — Auburn marched 79 yards on sheer power with the second-half kickoff Saturday and fullback Ed Dyer kicked the extra point for a 7-6 victory over fourth-ranked Georgia Tech before 45,000 rain-soaked fans.

Tech kicking specialist Tommy Wells missed the conversion try after Tech's second period touchdown and then was wide on a 38-yard field goal attempt 14 seconds before the game ended.

It was the first loss of the season for the Yellow Jackets, who had won four straight.

COWBOYS DROP BRIGHAM

Laramie, Wyo. — (UP) — Reserve quarterback Joe Dempsey passed for one touchdown and kicked two field goals Saturday to lead the University of Wyoming to a bruising 21-6 Skyline conference football victory over Brigham Young university.

The 182-pound junior from Muskegon, Mich., split the uprisings from 15 yards out to open the scoring with 11 minutes and 37 seconds left in the second period.

BRUINS GET VICTORY

Los Angeles — (UP) — Two of the four Bruins on the UCLA football team — fullback Ray Smith on offense and end Earl Smith on defense — led the Bruins Saturday to a hard-fought 19-12 victory over the University of California.

The jinx at the Coliseum against hexed California held before 32,933 fans as the Bears led in both the first and second periods, but let the Bruins fight back each time under the guidance of hot-and-cold tailback Bill Kilmer.

MICHIGAN STATE WINS

East Lansing, Mich. — (UP) — Dean Look hurled a 52-yard touchdown pass and ran 41 yards to set up another score Saturday to enable Michigan State to overcome the handicap of losing the ball five times on fumbles and lead the Spartans to a 19-0 upset over Notre Dame.

It was the first time the Irish have been shut out in 29 games, since losing to Oklahoma 40-0 in 1956, and the seventh time that Michigan State has downed Notre Dame in their last eight games.
