Services Monday For Mrs. Davis, Noted Doll Maker

Funeral services for Mrs. Anne Adeline Davis, 65, of 429 South Grape st., who died at her home Thursday, will be held Monday at 1:00 p.m. in the Chapel Mortuary.

The Rev. D. K. West, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, will officiate. Interment at Siskiyou Memorial park will be private. Those wishing to pay their respects may do so by calling at the Chapel this evening and until 12:00 noon Monday. Contributions to the Cancer society may be made in lieu of flowers.

Mrs. Davis, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest S. Butcher, was born in Ionia, Mich., on Nov. 27, 1893. She was married to Miles City, Mont., on January 1, 1933 to Henry A. Davis, who preceded her in death last April. The couple came to Medford from Miles City, 15 years ago.

Before coming to Medford Mrs. Davis had been employed by the Great Northern Railway company in Montana for many years, and here she worked for American Fruit company until illness forced her retirement.

Artistic Creation
With her death, the world of doll makers and collectors lost one of its better known personalities. Mrs. Davis was known throughout the United States and in some foreign countries for her artistic creations. Her collection had been the subject of many articles in national publications, and one German author included her in his book written for doll collectors.

Mrs. Davis made dolls out of many odd materials, but she was best known for such creations as "Hermit of the Rogue" which won several awards in shows, and which had aged-appearing features made from dried pears.

The Medford woman made Indian, Puritan and historical dolls which were purchased widely by collectors. One lecturer ordered about 70 historical figures to be used as illustrations. Mrs. Davis also made clothing and ornaments for her dolls, and even set up entire historical scenes.

Citation Issued In Five-Car Crash

Paul James Stewart, 17, of 19 Jeanette st., Medford, was cited by Medford police Thursday for violation of basic rule after a five-car chain-reaction accident at the intersection of Crater Lake highway and Biddle rd.

Stewart said he did not see that cars operated by Alvin Alan Alexander, 709 Lawnsdale st., Medford and Billy Thomas Strawn, 3253 Cottonwood st., were stopped. Stewart said he swerved to the right to avoid them and his left front end hit the right rear end of the pickup truck driven by Alexander. Hoover Submits Protest Petition

Bud Hoover of the Camp White area, who objected before the Jackson county planning commission last Wednesday against a proposed wrecking yard location off Crater Lake highway, has filed a protest petition with the county court.

The petition bears 25 signatures, according to the court's records. Hoover objected when the planners indicated the proposed establishments would not interfere with projected land use for the area. He stated that considerable residential development was contemplated on the surrounding land.

It is up to the county court to decide whether to recommend to the state that the Baker brothers, who plan to operate the yard, should be granted a license.

Commission member Robert Boyer stated at the meeting that he opposed the use of this power to recommend licensing as an instrument of zoning policy.
