

Concert This Afternoon To Be Played by Juniors

The Portland Junior Symphony, which will play in Medford this afternoon, is playing in various cities of the state, sponsored by the Oregon Centennial commission.

The Symphony of young musicians will present Beethoven's "Fifth Symphony," an Irish reel, "Molly on the Shore," Debussys "Afternoon of a Faun," and "Roumanian Rhapsody No. 1."

The concert will be presented at 2 o'clock in the Medford High school auditorium. Tickets will be sold only at the box office which will open at 1 o'clock. Admission is \$1 for adults, 50 cents for students.

Among the Symphony members is Louis Wildman, 17, who is in the percussion section and is one of three members who played under the former Conductor Gershowitch. He also plays with

the main Portland Symphony orchestra.

Paul Speaker, 17-year-old principal of the cello section, is a senior at Washington High school and is playing his first season with the main Portland Symphony. He was the recipient of a scholarship to the First International Congress of Strings held at Greenleaf lake near Tulsa, Okla., this summer. His sister, Mary Lou, plays in the first violin section.

Sixteen-year-old Joe Hearne is principal of the string bass section. A junior at Grant High school, he received a scholarship to music camp at Aspen, Colo., this summer.

Delmar Pettys, 16-year-old, who plays in the first violin section, is a Junior at Cleveland High school. He also attended the Aspen summer music camp and is playing his first season with the main Portland Symphony orchestra this fall. He is the youngest to be accepted by the orchestra.

Symphony conductor is Jacob Avshalomov.

Four young women make up the 1959 class of provisional members of Medford Junior Service league. The four are Mrs. Leonard R. Moyer, Mrs. Brian D. Stringer, Mrs. John T. Weisel and Mrs. H. Dewey Wilson.

They were introduced at the annual Founders' day luncheon of the league held Thursday noon at Rogue Valley Country club. This traditional event is held each October to announce the new members and review plans for the league's activities during the coming season.

Mrs. Edward H. Collins, new president of the league, was out of the city Thursday and Mrs. Ralph E. Hibbs, president-elect, presided.

The league was organized in 1947 by a small group of young women interested in widening the city's social and welfare horizons. During the league's early days a program of hospital welfare work was carried on. Eventually the group concentrated its efforts on establishment and operation of a kindergarten for hard-of-hearing children, since no institution of this type was in operation in southern Oregon. The kindergarten is now an acknowledged success, with the support and cooperation of welfare and children's organizations and agencies throughout the state.

Calendars in many valley homes have red circles around the dates of November 4 and 5 as members of the Junior Service league start rehearsals for the Follies of Proceeds from the Follies will be used to maintain the kindergarten for hard-of-hearing children which the league founded.

Mrs. Houston L. Bush Jr. and Mrs. George L. Lewis are co-chairmen of this year's production. They have appointed committee chairmen, and have plans well under way.

Mrs. Donald Wood, in charge of the programs, Mrs. H. S. Deuel Jr., and Mrs. David H. Holmes, who have invited the patrons, and Mrs. Robert R. Dickey, as the head of the publicity committee, have been working on advance preparations for several weeks.

Mrs. B. Kent Blackhurst and Mrs. Jack A. Edson have tickets available now, and are distributing them to several stores where they may be conveniently purchased.

Casting will be done as soon as the director has discussed the available parts with the co-chairmen of the talent committee, Mrs. Hope Lewis and Mrs. Frank B. Hopewell. Tryouts will be held immediately and rehearsals will begin Tuesday. Members of the Junior Service league will devote most of their time during the coming weeks to rehearsals and ticket selling. League husbands will cooperate in staging the Follies, as in previous years.

League members from Grants Pass and Klamath Falls will be guests of the Medford League for the session which is set to begin at 10 a.m. and to end at 3 p.m. The Oregon president, Mrs. K. E. Reception To Observe United Nations Day Here

"World Peace Through World Law" will be the theme of Medford's annual observance of United Nations Day. The observance will be sponsored by Medford chapter, Oregon United Nations association, and Mayor John L. Snider with the cooperation of officers and members of the Jackson County Bar association.

To focus attention on the day, the UN chapter and Mayor Snider plan a reception Sunday, October 24, at Girls Community club at 3 o'clock. On the program will be Sam B. Harbison, president of the Jackson County Bar association, Frank Van Dyke, former legislator and well known attorney, and Robert B. Duncan, speaker of the Oregon House of Representatives for the last session.

It is considered significant that a committee of the American Bar association last week urged the United States to support the International

Court of Justice and asked the U.S. Senate to withdraw its "power of veto" over cases brought against the United States in the court.

The Senate accepted jurisdiction of the court when it was established by the United Nations, but only on condition that the United States might determine which cases brought against it are "international" and which are "domestic." Withdrawal of the reservation by the U.S. would be "a major practical and dramatic step towards the goal of the rule of law among nations," the ABA committee report said.

In the receiving line for the reception Sunday will be Mr. Harbison and his wife and other members of the association and their wives. Among other guests will be officials of Jackson county and their wives and mayors of Jackson county cities and their wives.

A coffee hour will conclude the reception and program. The public is invited to attend.
