Actor's One-Man Show Applauded by Audience

Ashland-Philip Hanson appeared at Southern Oregon college in his new one-man show "Kings and Clowns" last Wednesday morning, October 14, before an enthusiastic audience of students and faculty. This was the first major appearance of the show since the successful audition this summer which won Mr. Hanson the sponsorship by the concert association, Vox Poetica. The show demonstrates his ability to hold an audience singlehandedly by utilizing material ordinarily requiring the assistance of other actors. Twenty different characters were counted by some which indicated the range of the program and his talent. The two-hour version includes a still greater number. Because of class schedules, the audience was only able to see a 50-minute program. Dressed in a dark jacket and slacks, the actor stands in a single spotlight on a bare stage playing various kings and clowns. Many of these he has played or directed in full production. William Hutchinson, English instructor at the college declared, "Deprived of the usual context of the play, he gave his 'Kings and Clowns' a context of its own by interweaving comments on English history, the Elizabethan stage, situations in the plays, Shakespeare's skill as a dramatist, and life and people in general. "The particular talent that Philip Hanson brought to his performances was that of modulation. With only a chair and a platform to help him, he vividly distinguished one character from another. Harry roared, Hotspur raged, and Verges wheezed and whined to Dogberry's vacuity. The sudden shift from King John to Richard to Henry, or from Henry V the warrior to Henry V the lover, displayed his excellent command of change of pace."

New York—UPI—Who said the American way of life is strictly toward informality? Turns out that brides at least are getting more formal. So reports the Bridal Fashion council, an organization of manufacturers of bridal fashions, retailers and textile people. The council said that of the 1.7 million U.S. brides in 1959, 49 per cent will purchase formal gowns for their big day. This represents an increase of three per cent over the number of formal weddings five years ago. One Philadelphia bridal firm said the ratio of formal weddings will continue to grow, because they provide a "psychological antidote for the creeping boredom of everyday functions and fashions." One New York resident buyer told the council the trend is "very normal." Formal weddings are a "status symbol" for the American girl. And with national income at an all-time high, more parents now can afford the fancy wedding ceremonies for their daughters.
