Extension Units Stress Health
 Portland-Homemakers are seeking to "cure the ills of the community" at the grass roots level through extension club programs in Oregon and across the United States, according to Mrs. M. C. Smith, Albany.
 Mrs. Smith is health chairman of the National Home Demonstration council which met in Portland this week. South Dakota and Arkansas reported that extension women last year completed outstanding health programs. South Dakota women conducted a two year program on mental health, and Arkansas, in cooperation with the Rural Health association, surveyed local communities to learn about medical needs, sanitation requirements, and emergency health requirements.
 Oregon homemakers in the past several years, through cooperative extension groups, helped get underway dental health studies carried out by Oregon State college.

Home Study Hints
 New York - (UPI) - Desk tops for home study should be at least two feet by four feet in area and 25 to 30 inches from the floor, depending on the child's size.
 The chair, straight-backed, should be high enough to bring the eyes 14 inches above the desk top. Lamps should be about two feet high with semi-direct lighting, a high-wattage bulb and a good-size shade. So reports a pen maker.
New Range Hood
 An electronic range hood needs no outside wall vents and takes just a few minutes to screw into the wall. It dissipates grease, smoke and odors electronically - inhaling foreign matter in air, passing it through tiny aluminum filters and strainers and electronic tubes. The purified air then is re-circulated through-out kitchen.

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
