Two of the dashing actor's three wives were expected to be among the great and small of Hollywood to turn out for services at Forest Lawn's Church of the Reformation.

The wives attending were his widow, Mrs. Patricia Wyomore, who arranged for the services and burial, and Mrs. Nora Edgington Flynn Haymes, his second wife.

Flynn's parents, Professor and Mrs. Theodore Flynn, flew here from London for the services.

Wall Street Chatter

New York UPI - The petroleum industry is still in the doldrums with current consumption barely ahead of 1958, and ample inventories lending little strength to product prices, notes Thomson & McKinnon.

The brokerage firm points out that cutbacks in crude oil production and lower prices cast some gloom over the fourth quarter, and earnings are almost sure to be off from 1958 levels.

W. E. Hutton & Co. looks for an inspiring earnings report from American Seating in the third quarter, showing somewhere between \$2.25 and \$2.50 a share for the three months. Earnings of \$3.25 to \$3.60 a share for the year would appear in sight in spite of a net of only 69 cents in the first half.

Cigarette statistics continue to make impressive reading, says Reynolds & Co. in a progress report on the industry. For the first eight months of 1959, cigarette shipments amounted to 298,400,000 units, up 5.6 per cent over the like 1958 period.

Home Furnishings Daily reports Bulova watch and Emerson radio are about to market Japanese-made transistor radios.

The stockmarket's ragged performance of the past few weeks is about over and time for change in investment thinking is here.

Value Line Investment Survey believes the deterrent influences of tight money and retarded consumption are beginning to make themselves felt throughout the economy, and will no doubt remain in evidence for many months after the steel strike ends.

Book To Be Published From Ancient Egyptian Volume

In 1945, a group of Egyptian peasants, poking around the ruins of a hillside tomb, discovered 13 earthen jars containing leather-bound volumes of papyrus.

They didn't think much of their find. They used one of the documents to light a fire, and sold the rest very cheaply to a dealer in antiquities.

Eventually the papyrus volumes came to the attention of biblical scholars—and touched off the greatest wave of excitement since the Dead Sea Scrolls.

One of the ancient books, preserved for more than 16 centuries in the dry Egyptian sands, proved to be a collection of 114 "Sayings of Jesus" purportedly recorded by the Apostle Thomas.

The full text of this so-called "Gospel according to Thomas," hitherto available only to a handful of researchers, will be published in English by Harper and Brothers at the end of this month.

It is fascinating reading, particularly for anyone who is reasonably familiar with the Bible.

Many of the "sayings" attributed to Jesus duplicate passages that are found in the four canonical gospels of the New Testament—Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Others, however, are new.

Documents Spur Debate
The authenticity of the latter will be the subject of long and earnest debate among scholars. Some of them sound as if they might truly have come from the lips of Jesus.

"Jesus said: If those who lead you say to you, 'See, the kingdom is in Heaven,' then the birds of the heaven will precede you. If they say to you: 'It is in the sea,' then the fish will precede you. But the kingdom is within you and it is without you."

Or this new beatitude: "Blessed is the man who has suffered, for he has found life."

And this timeless answer to the whole philosophy of materialism: "If the flesh has come into existence because of spirit, it is a marvel; but if the spirit has come into existence be-

cause of the body, that is the marvel of marvels."

Some "Gospels" Spurious
Despite the presence of these pearls, the "Gospel according to Thomas" cannot properly be called "the fifth gospel." Scholars are unanimous and emphatic on that point.

In the first place, they point out, this is by no means the first apocryphal non-biblical "gospel" to turn up. A dozen others have long been known, and every one of them has proved to be either entirely spurious, or at least far less authentic than the four which the early church chose for inclusion in its Holy Scripture.

In the second place, it is clear, both from internal evidence and from the other documents found at the same time, that the "Gospel according to Thomas" was produced by an heretical sect known as the Gnostics, who flourished in Egypt during the first few centuries of the Christian era.

Gnostic Traces Found
The Gnostics tried to include Christianity in a catch-all synthesis with other religions. Greek philosophy and various mystic rituals of their own. They had a number of doctrines which were directly contrary to basic Christian teachings. For example, they held that man is saved, not by God's grace, but by knowledge. The Greek word for knowledge is gnosis, and that's where the sect got its name. They also held that all matter was created by a devil rather than by God, and that the human body is therefore inherently evil—an idea totally foreign to Jesus.

Traces of these and other peculiarly Gnostic ideas can be found at many points in the "Gospel according to Thomas." Scholars are convinced that many of the alleged "sayings of Jesus" were simply made up by the Gnostic writer or writers who composed the "Gospel according to Thomas." There is general agreement that the Apostle Thomas was not the author.
