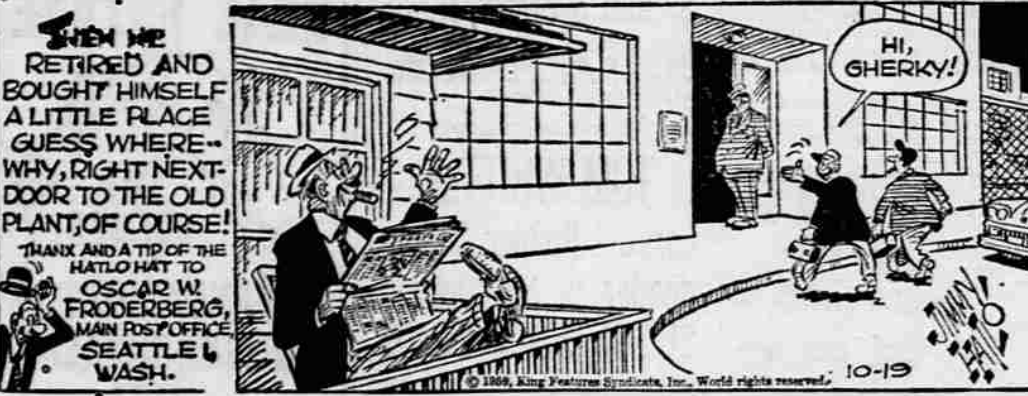

Plans are underway by the Sacred Heart parish unit of the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine to intensify its work and to widen the scope of its activity in accordance with suggestions made to delegates at the 10th Regional Congress of the CCD held recently in Portland.

Members of the local unit who attended the Congress met Tuesday night with their spiritual director, the Very Rev. Carl Mai, and lay members of the CCD to report on proceedings of the conference and to discuss ideas given them for developing the CCD in the parish.

The delegates reported on the enthusiasm shown by veteran CCD workers. They mentioned the respect and gratitude of the hierarchy and clergy for the CCD and the work of the laymen in assisting the parish priest in fulfilling his spiritual obligations to the people.

Medford delegates to the Congress and sections they attended were Mr. and Mrs. Donald Sweeney, beginning elementary teachers and discussion clubs; Miss Mary Grumbach and Mrs. Raymond S. Wise, high school teachers; Mrs. Fred C. Shere, parent educator; and Robert J. Hamelin, apostles of good will.

Hamelin, president of Sacred Heart unit of CCD, was a sectional speaker, using as his subject "The Place of the Executive Board - Its Functions."

Father Mai attended the one-day session for the clergy at which the general CCD program was discussed by both priests and laymen.

Recreational Use Of O & C Funds Set

Portland - (UPI) - The Association of O & C Counties has approved expenditure of funds from its share of revenue from Oregon and California railroad grant lands for campgrounds and picnic areas on O & C property.

The Oregon state supervisor of the bureau of land management, Russell E. Getty, said an expenditure of \$72,000 for the fiscal year starting July, 1960 was agreed upon at the association's meeting last week in Eugene. Also approved was a \$100,000 outlay in the 1962 fiscal year.
