

Oregon Tech Tips Raiders 14-6 in Weird Encounter

Asbland - When football's flukes and oddities of 1959 are recorded for posterity, the Saturday night skirmish between the Owls of Oregon Technical Institute and the Red Raiders of Southern Oregon college should rate high up on the list.

It was a weird and "odd-ball" game, to say the least, in which numerous fumbles, one disastrous stumble over an official and one of three stolen passes, rather than sparkling football, had the feature roles.

Oregon Tech was the victor 14 to 6 on Fuller field here to all but reclaim the Oregon Collegiate conference banner it captured, then rejected because of ineligibleities, in 1958. The Owls nabbed their third decision against no losses in the small state school circuit. Southern Oregon is now one-one in the loop.

Garner Scores
The Raiders of Asbland touched down on a fumble recovery and run by Willie Garner in the second quarter of the hassle. Ralph Norgaard did the same for OTI in ditto manner in the third. Clincher touchdown was in the fourth quarter on a pass from Roy Johnson to Norgaard. An intercepted pass set up this clinching push. Charles Wilson booted both Owl conversions.

Flukiest incident of the night came on the first OTI score. Southern Oregon possessed the ball on its own 17-yard line. While the ball was dangerously deep in hometown territory, the Raiders noted that the Owls were leaving the flat unprotected. A roll out pass seemed a certain bet.

But, the strategy backfired with calamitous results. Quarterback Jack Brown, rolling and fading to throw the ball, either tumbled over or was knocked down by referee Hero Hamer, and dropped the ball. Norgaard, quick for the opportunity grabbed the pigskin and crossed the goal. It was officially a TD despite

the collision with the referee. Southern Oregon got its marker when quarterback Johnson of OTI, rushed in on by Raider defenders, lost the ball 12 yards behind his line of scrimmage. Garner scooped up the loose pighide and ran 22-yards to go over the pay-off line. Conversion kick by Bill Guthrie was low and wide.

Only offensive drive that paid off in a touchdown went for 20 yards. A Brown aerial was snared by OTI's Johnson on the Raider 30 and run back to the 20. Wilson made four yards and Allen Leach one. Stan Glass gained three more to the 12. With fourth down and two yards to go SOC hopes were high of halting the goabound surge. But a Johnson toss was complete to Norgaard for first down on the one.

Johnson fumbled on the next play and the Raiders pushed the Owls back to the seven. But the Tech quarterback pitched to Norgaard for the TD on the next play.

SOC Fans Aroused
That Norgaard's diving catch on the sidelines, putting the ball on the one for the first down, was ruled good aroused SOC backers. For earlier in the game, the Raiders' end Gordon Carrigan had made what appeared to be a legal catch before running out of bounds. But the throw from Brown had been ruled incomplete.

SOC's defeat was not because it lacked for opportunities to score. The Raiders reached the Owl one and six-yard lines on futile touchdown bids.

End Jim McAbee produced Southern Oregon's most sensational ramble of the night on a fumble, which also ended a serious Owl threat. This came shortly following the kick-off after Tech had made the count 7 to 6. SOC with the ball on its 45 tried a statue of liberty play. The exchange between Brown and Bud Kastner was muffed. Frank Wilson fell on the ball giving it to OTI back on the Asbland 27. The Owls went to first down on the 17.

Then Glass fumbled and

McAbee grabbed the ball. The Raider end headed down the field, paused well into OTI territory then resumed his goalward trek. It appeared he'd go all the way to touchdown but McAbee dropped the ball and had to scramble to regain possession on the Owl 11, ending a 72-yard run.

A Tech offense helped the Raiders by putting the ball on the six yard line. But halfback Al McKinnis lost to the seven. On a pitchout Kerman Bennett got back to the six. On fourth down Brown tried to pass. The throw appeared blocked but the ruling was fumble and OTI took over on its own 26.

Southern had its other big chance in the late first quarter and early second after John Shama had fallen on an Owl fumble on the OTI 39. The Raider's first pass completion, Brown to Carrigan, went 30 yards to the nine-yard line. Fullback Allen Barnes made another yard and another play gained to the three. Halfback Eldon Francis went to the one on a reverse. Then on fourth down Barnes lost the ball on the one.

SOC Stopped on Ground
The Raiders reached the Owl 32, 35, 31 and 28 on other occasions. OTI made it to the SO 37, the 29 twice and to the 28. Leach once stopped SOC with an interception on the Owl 10 and Wayne Allen of the Raiders interrupted a Tech aerial on his own 25.

Southern Oregon ground attack was generally ineffective against the Techmen. The Raiders went forward 93 yards from rushing but lost 74 to the Owl defense and netted only 19 for the game. The Klamath Falls club, on the other hand, moved 194 along the turf, lost 45 and netted 149. In the air SOC outgained the Owls 109 to 23.

Raider coach Al Akins, much disappointed in his teams offense, said he would wait for the movies before making assessment of the game. He said there was some doubt as to whether Norgaard actually crossed the goal before being thrown back on the second Owl TD play.

Oregon Tech is the first team to really stop the Aslanders on the ground, according to the Raider mentor. Southern Oregon meets Oregon college on Saturday afternoon at Asbland in a homecoming fray.

Morris Boots 3 Field Goals

Milwaukee - (UPI) - The Los Angeles Rams, with an impressive 45-6 rout of the Green Bay Packers under their belts, returned home today to prepare for Saturday's game against Detroit in the Coliseum.

The Rams ran over the unbeaten Packers Sunday in a merciless display of ground and passing artistry by quarterback Bill Wade and fullback Ollie Matson and a strong defense that held Green Bay to only two field goals.

It was the first time this year the Los Angeles defense was able to keep its opponent from scoring a touchdown.

"You can't figure this league," said Rams Coach Sid Gillman after the game. "When you expect to win, you get killed. And when you think you might get killed, you win."

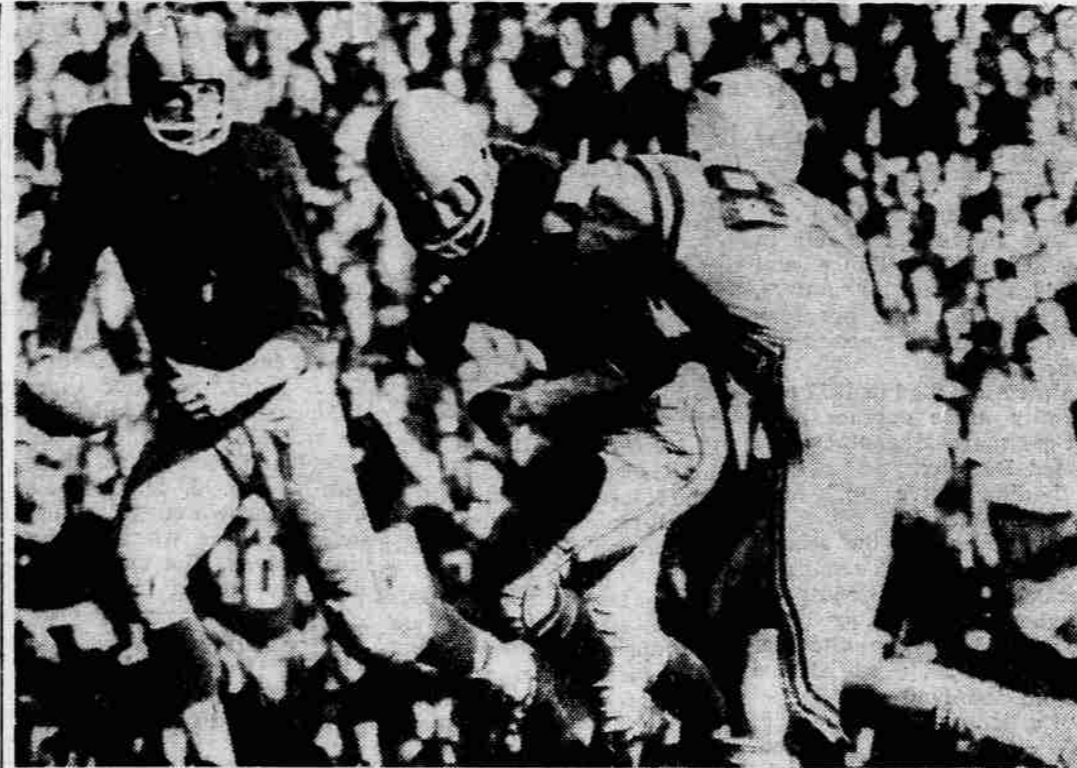

Bill Wade and John Unitas, master passers who handle the ball on almost every play, and Harland Svare, a line-backer who seldom gets his hand on it, are the guys most responsible for the reshuffled National Football League standings.

The Green Bay Packers, Baltimore Colts and San Francisco Forty-Niners each (3-1) emerged from Sunday's action tied for first in the Western division while the New York Giants (3-1) became undisputed Eastern leaders.

Wade played the key role in setting up the three-way Western deadlock when he threw three touchdown passes to spark the Los Angeles Rams (2-2) to a 45-6 victory over the hitherto unbeaten Packers.

Unitas, All-League quarterback for the champion Colts, virtually knocked the Bears (1-3) out of the Western race. He fired touchdown passes to Lenny Moore and L. G. Dupre and set up Alan Amechi's scoring dash in a 21-7 triumph at Chicago. San Francisco, with J. D. Smith scoring twice, smashed Detroit's dim Western hopes by whipping the Lions (0-4) at Briggs Stadium, 34-13.

Giants Avenge Defeat
The Giants took a 49-21 whipping from the Philadelphia Eagles two weeks ago. They trailed the same club Sunday, 7-0, when Svare delighted a record opening day crowd of 68,783 at Yankee Stadium. He started the Giants toward a relatively easy 24-7 victory by intercepting a Norm Van Brocklin pass and racing 70 yards to tie the score. It was his first touchdown in seven pro campaigns.

New York started the day tied with Philadelphia and

the Washington Redskins for the Eastern lead. The Giants took a one-game lead by downing the Eagles while the Pittsburgh Steelers turned four of seven Washington fumbles into points while enroute to a 27-6 victory.

The Cleveland Browns remained in the Eastern race with a 17-7 victory over the Chicago Cardinals (1-3) on Milt Plum's 14-yard touchdown pass to Bob Mitchell. Bernie Parrish's 37-yard scoring dash with an intercepted pass and Lou Groza's 19-yard field goal. Cleveland, Philadelphia, Washington and Pittsburgh each (2-2) are tied

Four Good Fights on Ring Menu

New York - (UPI) - Boxing gets a shot in the arm this week. Four excellent fights are included in the schedule, and a new small club opens in New York.

Good match-making is reflected in the week's two television bouts. Each is quoted as "even money." Welterweights Luis Rodriguez and Isaac Logart - both of Camaguey, Cuba - square off at Miami Beach Wednesday night in a 10-rounder.

Friday night's (NBC) 10-rounder brings together heavyweight Tony Anthony of New York and Billy Hunter of Detroit for the first fight-show in Madison Square Garden in 10 weeks.

Key Welterweight Bout
Perhaps the best bout on the schedule will be staged at Philadelphia's Convention hall tonight, when Sugar Hart and Charley Scott - both of Philadelphia - clash in a 12-rounder for the Pennsylvania state welterweight title and for the challenger's rung in the world rankings.

Hart, ranked No. 1 among world contenders, is a slight favorite at 6-5 over second-rated Scott.

At London, Tuesday night, world featherweight champion Davey Moore of Springfield, O., engages Bobby Neil of Scotland in a non-title fight. Moore is favored at 3-1 over Neil, who is unranked among world contenders, but has a large British following.

Hebert Winner In Orange Golf

Costa Mesa, Calif. - (UPI) - Veteran Jay Hebert was back on the tournament trail today, \$1,000 richer after his first place finish in the \$15,000 Orange County Open.

His victory Sunday over the brand new 6650-yard Mesa Verde layout, was the first since June a year ago, although he had been runner-up in eight tournaments in the last 21 months.

Right behind Hebert were relative newcomers Jerry Magee of Toronto, Canada, and Jack Fleck, former U.S. Open winner from Los Angeles.

Magee and Fleck each received \$1,350. Tied for third were Bert Weaver, Beaumont, Texas; Jerry Barber, Los Angeles; Billy Maxwell, Odessa, Texas; and Tom Nieporie of Bronxville, N.Y., who all shot 276. Each received \$862.50.

Easy Rivals Ahead For Ranking Teams

Louisiana State, Northwestern, Texas and Southern California, four ranking college football powers, take on comparatively easy opponents this week, while Syracuse and Penn State, the top challengers in the East, face tough tests.

The top-ranked LSU Tigers, who swept to their fifth straight victory during the week end, meet Southeastern conference opponent Florida (3-1) Saturday, while second-ranked Northwestern, the top team in the Big Ten with a (3-0) record plus a victory over Oklahoma, goes out of the conference to play Notre Dame (2-2).

Texas, the leading Southwestern team now that it has beaten Arkansas, hopes to make Rice (0-2-2) its sixth straight victim and Southern California (4-0), the best in the West after vanquishing Washington, tackles Stanford (1-4).

Face Possible Elimination
While these four are expected to keep right on rolling, at least through this coming week end, Syracuse (4-0) and Penn State (5-0) face possible elimination from the national rankings when they play West Virginia and Illinois, respectively.

Victory, of course, would place both in the middle of the race for the national championship. However, it won't be that easy. The Syracuse Orangemen proved their right to national ranking by whipping previously-unbeaten Holy Cross, 42-6, but in West Virginia they'll be meeting a team which handed Pittsburgh, another Eastern power, a 23-15 licking.

Penn State faces a similar task. The Pennsylvanians beat Boston University, 21-12, but Illinois, the second best team in the Big Ten following its 14-6 victory over Minnesota, should prove a much tougher opponent. They'll play in a neutral site - Cleveland.

Engineers Meet Tulane
Of the other ranked team, Georgia Tech, which was tumbled from the unbeaten ranks by Auburn, 7-6, plays Tulane (2-3); Purdue, upset by Ohio State, 15-0, meets Big Ten rival Iowa (2-2), which was surprised by Wisconsin, 25-16, and Mississippi tackles with Arkansas. Ole Miss has won all five of its starts while Arkansas suffered its first defeat Saturday when Texas beat the Razorbacks, 13-12.

Conference play in both the SEC, Southern and Big Eight this week end may also determine who will get bowl berths from those respective areas. While Mississippi is playing outside of the conference, Georgia, tied with the Rebels for first place with a 3-0 record, meets Kentucky, a team which held mighty LSU to a 9-0 score.

The Citadel, West Virginia and Furman are tied for the Southern conference lead, each with 2-0 records. The

Citadel and Furman meet each other Saturday.

Sooners, Kansas Tied
In the Big Eight, Kansas and Oklahoma are tied for first with 2-0 records after both won important tests Saturday, Kansas beating old rival Kansas State, 33-14, and Oklahoma downing Missouri, 23-0. This Saturday they'll square off at Norman, Okla. Victory for Oklahoma would boost the Sooners well on the way toward their 12th straight conference title.

In the Atlantic Coast conference, Clemson (3-0) and South Carolina (1-1) will get the week end rolling when they meet in their annual "Big Thursday" game at Columbia, S. C. Wake Forest (2-0), Clemson's chief rival, will play North Carolina (2-2) on Saturday.

Yale, unbeaten and unscorced upon in four games, and Pennsylvania (4-0), the Ivy league leaders, both play out of the conference, Yale meeting Colgate and Penn playing Navy. Yale stayed alive by beating Cornell, 23-0, while Penn was whipping Brown, 36-9.

In the Big Ten, Indiana, Wisconsin, Purdue, Michigan State and Ohio State are tied for third with 1-1 records. Beside the Purdue-Iowa pairings, Indiana meets Michigan State and Wisconsin plays Ohio State. All except Purdue won last Saturday. Indiana crushed Nebraska, 23-7, Wisconsin

beat Iowa, and Michigan State shut out Notre Dame, 19-0, in a nationally-telvised game. The shutout was the first for the Irish in 29 games. Northwestern earned its top rating in the Big Ten by mauling Michigan, 20-7.

Georgia Tech, Purdue and Pittsburgh weren't the only ones floored by upsets last week end. Miami (Fla.) got the week end off in high style by upsetting Navy, 23-8, on Friday, while the Air Force Academy was handed its first loss in 15 games by Oregon, 20-3, and Maryland tripped North Carolina, 14-7. Army was the only victorious service school, the Cadets whipping Duke, 21-6. The Air Force plays UCLA this Saturday while Army hosts Colorado State U.

In other games of national significance, Texas Christian, the Southwest Conference defending champion, trounced Texas A&M, 39-6; Princeton routed Colgate, 42-7; Alabama and Tennessee battled to a 7-7 tie; UCLA nipped California, 19-12; Connecticut took over the Yankee Conference lead by beating Maine, 18-15; Wyoming defeated Brigham Young, 21-7, to open up a big lead in the Skyline conference race and Baylor won over Texas Tech, 14-7.
