Guidance Clinic Receives Funds From UMC Drive

(Editor's note: This is another in a series of articles in which agencies of the United Medford Crusade are discussed. Today's article reviews some of the work of the Southern Oregon Child Guidance Clinic.)

Happiness should be part of every person's life. Some people are able to find happiness themselves, but a few children and parents need guidance to find their way to happiness.

"Mary Jones," a junior high student, has come to the Southern Oregon Child Guidance Clinic to meet with several other girls her age. After six or seven weekly sessions with a psychiatrist to guide them, Mary and the other girls are beginning to understand their feelings and their behavior.

Understanding herself is a first step up the ladder of happiness for Mary. Her parents and family, her friends and community, also, find greater happiness when Mary is a happier, better adjusted person.

Supports Services The Southern Oregon Child Guidance Clinic is a member-agency of the United Medford Crusade which gives support to many services to make a happy community in which to live.

Mary is one of the almost 500 children served at the Southern Oregon Child Guidance Clinic in the six years since its establishment in October, 1953.

Through support of the United Medford Crusade, the clinic can provide this kind of help to the community through child guidance.

Stevenson Classes taught at OTI by Dr. Munford include higher education for graduates, and higher education, a seminar for undergraduate students.

Borrowing Plan Gets PUC Approval

Salem—(UP)—The Public Utility commission Tuesday approved a "standby" borrowing arrangement between the Oregon-Washington Telephone company and United Utilities, an affiliated firm.

Under the plan, Oregon-Washington intends to borrow funds up to 15 per cent of its total capitalization to supplement normal short term bank borrowing.

The utility furnishes telephone and telegraph service to 10 Oregon counties, four in Washington and, through a subsidiary, a portion of California.

OTI Officials Visit SOC Campus

Ashland — Administration and faculty members from Oregon Technical Institute, Klamath Falls, attended a meeting at Southern Oregon college Monday for a program intended to familiarize them with the role of OTI as a new member of the Oregon state system of higher education.

Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, SOC president, addressed the group on the functions and organization of a combination professional school and college of arts and science, stressing the philosophy, aims and purposes of the college not only as an autonomous entity, but also as a part of the state system.

Discussing the board of higher education, Dr. Stevenson explained how it was appointed, its composition, and its primary areas of concern. He also pointed out the duties of the chancellor in relationship to the board, and the relationship of the institutional executives to both.

Conducted as a field trip for members of general extension classes being taught weekly on the OTI campus by Dr. J. Kenneth Munford, Oregon State college director of publications, the evening ended with a tour of the SOC campus under the guidance of Dr.
