Rooks Will Open Slate

Oregon State College, Corvallis — The Oregon State Rooks open their 1959 season here Friday afternoon when they entertain the Washington State Frosh. Kickoff is set for 2 p.m. in Parker stadium.

One of the most highly-regarded groups of freshmen to hit the Beaver campus in several seasons, the Rooks are slated to open with a forward wall averaging over 200 pounds, not including their largest squad member—tackle Roy Jones, Palermo, Calif., who stands 6-7 and weighs in at 250 pounds.

Rook coach Jim Brackins opened this third week of practice with 34 players still in action, including a touted wingback, Gary Casey, who was sidelined last week with a shoulder dislocation. Another Californian, tailback Phil Lazark, is also on the shelf with a leg injury.

Blocking Back
The starting backfield, however, lists two former prep all-American squad members, Edgerton's Ladd Horn at blocking back, and Ernie Thompson, Torrance, Calif., at fullback. Horn doubles in brass as Thompson's first-line reserve at fullback.

The tailback duties will be shared by Barry Fernandez, a southpaw from Redlands, Calif., and Dick Brooks, Grass Valley, Calif. The wingback is John Fassulo, Eureka, Calif. The WSU Couabees opened their season last Saturday night with a 35-18 victory over the Idaho freshmen.

UPI Honors Moon For Comeback

New York —UPI—Wally Moon, whose return to stardom symbolized the Los Angeles Dodgers' rise from a seventh-place team to the world championship, was hailed today for making the No. 1 comeback of the year in the National League.

The 29-year-old outfielder from Bay, Ark., was the choice of eight writers on the United Press International's board of experts representing every city in the league. Pitcher Gene Conley of the Philadelphia Phillies ranked second with five votes and outfielder Gus Bell of the Cincinnati Reds was third with four votes in balloting that included a total of eight players.

Acquired From Cardinals
Acquired with pitcher Phil Paine from the St. Louis Cardinals for outfielder Gino Cimoli. Moon batted .302, drove in 74 runs and hit 19 homers this year. One of the steadiest players in the majors from 1954 through 1957, he had played in only 108 games, batted .238, knocked in 38 runs and hit seven homers in 1958.

"Certainly in a year in which so many Dodgers stood out at various stages of the campaign, Moon must be singled out," said Dodge General Manager E. J. (Buzzy) Bavasi. "No player was more consistent throughout the campaign and no man was more of a team player than Wally."

'Big Thursday' Will End Today

Columbia, S. C. —UPI—A 63-year-old tradition expired today. The epitaph will read "Big Thursday. Born Oct. 1896, died Oct. 22, 1959."

The University of South Carolina and Clemson college football teams met today in Columbia on Thursday of the last time.

At the insistence of Clemson, which has never played South Carolina in Clemson's home stadium, the colorful mid-season, mid-week rivalry is being abolished.

Beginning next year the two state-supported institutions will meet on a Saturday nearer the end of the season, on a home and home basis.

STUDY STADIUM SITE

New York —UPI—The New York City Board of Estimate is expected today to approve a proposal to provide \$170,000 to draw up plans and survey the site for a 55,000-seat stadium to be the home park of a New York club in the newly formed Continental Baseball league. Mississippians Gain 32 Votes

New York —UPI—Mississippi Southern, eager to display its football team in a major conference, and Delaware and West Chester, two Eastern schools satisfied to shine in their own class, ranked 1-2-3 today in United Press International's small college ratings.

Mississippi Southern received 32 first-place votes and a total of 400 points in the latest balloting by the nationwide Board of Coaches which rates the small schools for UPI.

Prothro has not lost a game to California since taking the state helm four years ago. Thursday he had praise for several members of his squad.

Don Kasso's punting, the passing of Larry Sanchez and the running performances by tailback Ron Miller and fullback Jim Stinette brought credit from Prothro.

FLOOR CONTRACTED

Portland —UPI—The Exposition-Recreation Commission Wednesday awarded a Boston firm a \$12,950 contract to provide a portable basketball floor for the Memorial Coliseum here. The bid of Di Natale Floors Inc. was higher than that of Lawson Portable Floors of Fort Worth, Tex., but the latter firm's bid deviated from specifications.

FOLLEY OFFERED \$15,000

San Francisco —UPI—Zora Folley has been offered a \$15,000 guarantee to fight Eddie Machen again at the Cow Palace within 90 days, according to matchmaker Bennie Ford. Machen and Folley stumbled and struggled to an unpopular 12-round draw here in April, 1958.

BANK BUYS ESTATE

Sarasota, Fla. —UPI—The 31,400-acre ranch here of the Edith Ringling estate was sold for \$2,600,000, it was announced Wednesday. The Bankers Life and Casualty Co. of Chicago bought the property. The estate of Mrs. Ringling, who died six years ago, also includes 40 per cent of the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey circus.

Pole Sheared; 300 Sheep Hurt

Portland —UPI—A loaded livestock truck and trailer sheared off a utility pole in northeast Portland Wednesday night, injured 300 sheep, cut off electric power in a four-mile radius and knocked out 20 telephones.

The sheep-laden trailer struck the pole at a side angle when the truck, driven by Kenneth Lee Goetz, 22, of Sunnyside, Wash., swerved to miss a car.

Police said the car had pulled onto the highway from a motel.

The trailer broke off a 10-foot section of the pole and snapped a 13,000 volt Portland General Electric Co. primary line and a Pacific Telephone company cable.

The sheep bound for Armour and Company packers here, were en route from Toppenish, Wash. They were transferred to another trailer. Power was out for about an hour.

Expert Foresees Improvements in Movie Cameras

Madison, Wis. (Science Service) — High-speed motion picture cameras that react instantaneously to a stimulus and begin photographing an action at its very inception have been foreseen here.

Such movie cameras could start rolling without any advance knowledge of the time the action would occur. They could be used to monitor failure of a mechanical component or a defective operation in a continuous manufacturing process occurring one time out of 10,000.

Development of such a camera was one of several future trends in high-speed photography reported at the University of Wisconsin here by William G. Hyzer of Janesville, Wis., a consulting research engineer and authority on high-speed cameras.

To Stop Action
The broad objective of high-speed photography, Hyzer said, is to slow down or stop actions that are normally a blur to the eye, due to their short duration or their high velocity. Slowing them down allows them to be carefully observed, studied or chronologically analyzed.

Hyzer said he anticipated a further increase in the speed of cameras, shutters and short duration light sources. This would permit recording and analysis of explosive reactions, re-entry phenomena and other hyper-velocity effects.

The image converter, an electronic device comprising a photosensitive cathode to receive a stimulus and a photographic screen to display and intensify the image, holds considerable promise as the high-speed "camera" of the future, he said.

To Decrease Package

Another development trend, he said, will be a decrease in size and weight of the camera package, and an increase in its reliability under shock, vibration and high temperature. Such a package could be built into aircraft, missile and satellite components to bring back hitherto unattainable air and space-flight data.

Also envisioned was the integration of camera recording systems with other instrumentation facilities so that all recorded data from highly sophisticated test operations may be analyzed simultaneously and correlated rapidly with increased accuracy.

Navy Day Ceremony Set in Portland

Oregon youths enlisting in the Navy on "Navy day," Oct. 27, will be sworn in at a special ceremony at a shipyard in Portland Wednesday night, announced by the local Navy recruiting station today.

Under the joint sponsorship of the Navy league of the United States, Portland council, and the American Legion, "Navy day" will be observed in Portland with a parade, honoring Martin B. McKnealy, national commander of the American Legion, the recruit swearing-in ceremony and a banquet at the Portland-Sheraton hotel.

The day marks the 184th anniversary of the Navy and also commemorates the anniversary of the birth of Theodore Roosevelt, generally proclaimed as the "father of the modern Navy."

STAGE DEMONSTRATION

Paris —UPI—About 20,000 government employees staged a noisy but peaceful demonstration for higher wages Wednesday before the Ministry of Finance and the Paris City Hall. The demonstration was called by Socialist, Communist and Catholic unions to protest against the government's offer of a 3-per cent boost.

Bailout Capsules Undergoing Tests

Hurricane, Mesa, Utah (Science Service) — Bailout capsules, designed to guard the lives of U.S. airmen who must abandon ship at speeds of 1-300 miles an hour, have been tested here for ruggedness. A supersonic sled rockets the capsule along a 12,000-foot track and pitches it over a 1,500-foot cliff. Parachutes lower it to the bottom of the cliff in what amounts to a simulated ejection. When installed in an Air Force B-58 Hustler bomber, the capsules will remain unsealed until necessary to abandon ship.

When each crewman triggers his capsule's escape mechanism, the pod will seal itself and eject from the plane. It is designed to land the crewman safely on land, sea, or ice and protect him until rescuers can answer the distress call of its built-in radio.

CAMPAIGNERS RETURN

New York —UPI—Freshmen at Fordham university got 500 old Taft, Dulles and Dewey campaign buttons to use in the freshman class election and covered them with a sticker promoting Maroon Party candidates. Their main worry was that rain would wash off the sticker revealing the lost cause of the original buttons.

An essay contest on the topic "Is Juvenile Delinquency a Serious Problem in Jackson County?" and a dance for all teenagers Oct. 31 have been planned by the lodge for the honor day.

Winners in the contest, which closes today, will reign as queen and king of the dance and also will receive \$50 savings bonds.

Gov. Hatfield wrote that the day "affords an opportunity for wholesome recreation in cooperation with local officials."

He stated that "Fraternal organizations can do much, as individual members set worthwhile examples and as they collectively provide a number of ways in which teenagers can get together for a variety of activities."
