SOC talent will be displayed at the Variety show on Friday, October 23, at 8 p.m. Following the variety show, a Victory bonfire and pep rally under the direction of Yell King Larry Hall, Medford, will complete the evening. The bonfire, constructed by the freshman class, will be ignited, at which time the presentation of the royal court, yells, and speeches by the Red Raider coach, Al Akins, and members of the football squad, will take place.

Saturday's events will get under way with the Homecoming parade from Lithia park to the Ashland Junior High school starting at 10:30 a.m. with over 15 floats participating. Bands from Phoenix, Eagle Point, Ashland, and Central Point High schools, plus the Ashland Kilt band, will set the pace. Parade dignitaries will ride in cars provided by local dealers and the Medford Old Timers club.

The football game between the Raiders and the Oregon College of Education Owls from Monmouth will begin at 2 p.m. and halftime activities at Fuller field will be high-

lighted by the colorful bands and the presentation of the royal court.

Climaxing the Homecoming week end is the annual dance. A seven-piece combo from Klamath Falls, the "Dance Masters," will provide music at the Britt ballroom beginning at 8:30 p.m.

County Agent Given Honor By Association

Grants Pass - A Josephine county extension agent, Miss Rippah A. Douglass, has been singled out for "distinguished service" by the National Home Demonstration Agents association.

Miss Douglass has been a home economics extension worker for 32 years, 10 of them in Josephine county. For 22 years earlier, she was home furnishings specialist in Nebraska.

Miss Douglass and extension unit members conducted a countywide home accident survey in Josephine county three years ago and reported their findings to a local safety council. Through individual contacts and follow-up reports in newspapers and radio, families were asked to remove accident hazards in their homes.

Helping organized clubs conduct better meetings has been another of the county agent's achievements. A total of 35 leaders were trained in group leadership methods last year.

Organizes Group Miss Douglass also has helped organize one of the most successful Great Decisions discussion groups in the state. For the past three years, she has been secretary for the Great Decisions Council.

Miss Douglass' enthusiasm moved Oregon agents to organize the Oregon Home Demonstration association which has carried out projects in encouraging high school girls in home economics careers.

One of the pioneers in extension work, Miss Douglass has continued to improve her work methods to extend extension education to more families, says Mrs. Esther Taskerud, home economics extension coordinator, Oregon State college.

The distinguished service award was presented to Miss Douglass in New Orleans at the annual meeting of the National Home Demonstration Agents association. Others from Oregon at the meeting are Mrs. Edna Mae Wimsatt, Malheur county agent, and Mrs. Sylvia Lee, Curry county agent.

Vegetables And Fruits Plentiful

Washington - (UPI) - Food shoppers can again look forward to a fairly wide selection this week end. The "big four" leading the parade of plentiful foods are pork, beef, eggs and fall vegetables. Greater supplies of fruits are going to market, too.

In beef, many markets across the country are featuring chuck and rib roasts, while some steaks are wearing favorable price tags. In the pork line excellent values include smoked hams and loin roasts. Eggs continue to favor the family budget also.

Broiler-fryers and turkeys are best values at poultry counters, but some markets are featuring hens for baking and stewing.

In vegetables, the best values include potatoes and sweet potatoes, onions, lettuce, cabbage, carrots, radishes, and turnips.

Fruit bins right now are offering excellent supplies of apples from this year's big crop, grapefruit, oranges and grapes.

In fish, best values include shrimp, fish sticks and canned tuna.

These are the week end's best values, nationally. Now, here's a closer look at plentiful foods in the West (Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming):

Ample supplies of pork, beef, eggs and apples are available this week. Some cuts of pork and beef are down 1 to 2 cents a pound. Supplies of calf, veal and lamb are moderate, but ample for the demand, and some cuts are priced slightly lower than a week ago.

Eggs continue in ample supply. Egg prices are unchanged in the Northwest, but the large size are selling one cent a dozen lower than a week ago in the San Francisco area, and mediums are down two cents in the Los Angeles area.

Ready-to-cook fryer chickens are in good supply, with prices unchanged to slightly higher. Tom turkeys are down one to two cents a pound in California markets. Ample supplies of butter are unchanged in price.

Plentiful fresh fruit and vegetables include apples, Valencia oranges, lemons, pears, cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, spinach, squash, sweet potatoes and tomatoes. In good supply are grapes, grapefruit, carrots, cucumbers, onions, potatoes and peppers.

In the fish line, plentiful include salmon, halibut, rockfish, flounder and sablefish.
