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Federal Farm Official Sees Record Highs in 1960 Economy

Nashville, Tenn. - (UPI) - Agriculture Undersecretary True Morse said today that 1960 will set all-time highs for the national economy, with growing sales of farm products.

The forecast came in a speech prepared for delivery to the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture meeting here.

Morse also said that most farm price support programs are proving their value by helping farmers to market their crops on an orderly basis.

But he said the progress was swamped in the public mind by the fact that wheat surpluses are still growing.

cash receipts for the first nine months of this year amounted to \$22,300,000,000 or 3 per cent less than last year.

The agriculture department reported that receipts from marketings in September were estimated tentatively at about \$3,300,000,000. The figure was off about 2 per cent from the same month in 1958.

The September decline was blamed on lower prices for livestock products, mainly pork, eggs and broilers. Total livestock receipts for the month were down about 6 per cent from 1958.

STORE SALES CLIMB
Washington - (UPI) - The agriculture department said today that food store sales continued to climb in recent months despite declining consumers income.

Sales in the third quarter of this year averaged 2 per cent above the same period in 1958.

The department said the steel strike has reduced consumers income but the effect on overall spending so far has been only moderate.

Retail trade, aside from seasonal factors, dipped about 1 per cent in August and another 2 per cent in September from the record July volume. However, most of the decrease was in durable goods, not food.

WHEAT SURPLUS STUDY
Washington - (UPI) - The United States has been asked to join four other wheat-producing nations in making a study of disposing of surplus wheat in the Far East.

Max Myers, administrator of the agriculture department's foreign agriculture service, said the plan, as he understands it, would not involve merely an increase in food "hand-outs."

Myers said the joint fact-finding mission was recommended last week by a five-nation wheat utilization committee which includes the United States, Canada, Australia, France and Argentina.

Silverton Man Wins Judgment

Portland - (UPI) - Floyd H. Powell, Silverton, has won a \$17,220 judgment against Tigard-Sherwood Truck Service for injuries allegedly suffered on Sept. 11, 1954, when the firm was helping him move some household goods.

A circuit court jury awarded the damages to Powell, who lived in Sherwood.

Powell said he suffered injuries when a plank from the truck to the house slipped and he fell.

London - (UPI) - Sir Winston Churchill received a standing ovation from both ruling Conservative and opposition Socialist members when he made his first appearance in the House of Commons Wednesday since the general elections.

Wall Street Chatter

New York - (UPI) - The existence of tight money reflects the basic strength of the national economy, says Distributors Group Inc.

Actually, it reasons, if the economy were weak or declining there would be no tight money worries because the demand for funds would be substantially less than today.

Distributors Group bolsters its argument with figures that put labor income only 1 per cent below the all-time high reached in June, 1959, but 3.2 per cent above the monthly average for the first quarter when steel mills were producing record tonnage.

Bache & Co. recommends Trane Co. for long-term growth as a quality commitment in the air conditioning industry. It enjoys a fine industry reputation and its outlook for larger industrial and commercial air conditioning units next year is favorable.

Purcell & Co. says Universal-Cyclops Steel is a good buy as a near-term speculation, inasmuch as it is expected to show sharply higher earnings this year. The company has been little affected by the steel strike.

Automotive news reports the Corvair tire suppliers are Firestone and Goodrich. Falcon tires are made by Firestone and Goodyear. The latter also is supplying the Chrysler Valiant model.

Salmon Endure In the Willamette

Portland - (UPI) - Robert Schoning, assistant Oregon fish director, said today that Willamette river spring salmon runs seem to be maintaining themselves in the face of stream pollution and dam construction on the basin's upper reaches.

A total of 31,800 upstream salmon was counted last spring through the Willamette falls fishway at Oregon City.

Due to low water and other factors, the fall salmon run on the Willamette is practically nil.

Generator Ideal For Party Phones

Chicago - (Science Service) - A transistorized ringing generator that may be the "ideal" source of voltage for party line telephones was described here today.

One such generator, installed on a field trial in a location where there were 4,000 telephones, has given trouble-free performance for 20 months, J. F. Kostelich and B. W. Howard of Lorain Products Corp., Lorain, Ohio, told the American Institute of Electrical Engineers.

The frequencies of this generator can be set precisely with a screwdriver and its harmonic content averages 5.2 per cent, not enough to cause cross ring difficulty. The generator is self-protecting in case of overload or short circuit and operates from the telephone office 50-volt battery so it is not dependent on AC power. Power consumption is about one ampere at full load.

Khrushchev Uses Carrot, Not Stick

Corvallis - (UPI) - Nikita Khrushchev is using "a carrot instead of a stick" to lure Soviet citizens, an editor of Reporter magazine said Wednesday.

Editor Douglass Cater said terror was being produced in Russia and this has resulted in the belief of Russians that things will be better in their lifetimes and for their children.

Cater spoke to the 10th annual Institute of World Affairs at Oregon State college.
