## Bond Issue Passed For Tillamook Burn

Salem—(UPI)—Signing of a Benton county oil exploration lease and approval of issuance of \$750,000 in forest rehabilitation bonds were announced Wednesday by the Oregon state forestry board.

Halsey Stuart and Company and Associate was the low bidder for the bonds with a bid of 3.5556 per cent interest. Reforestation of the Tillamook burn is the objective of the bond issuance. Some five million dollars already has been borrowed for the reforestation program.

The board approved signing of the exploration lease by Oregon Oil and Gas company of Albany for 1,380 acres west of "Philmath." The rate was 25 cents per acre.

## Anti-Red Agent Tells Of Later Vilification

Los Angeles—(UPI)—A Los Angeles woman told House un-American Activities subcommittee probers Wednesday her home was stoned and she was "vilified on all sides" when it was publicly revealed she joined the Communist party as an FBI undercover agent.

Mrs. Marian Miller, 38, the second Los Angeles housewife in two days to tell the subcommittee of her undercover work against Communism, was applauded by the audience at the hearing. The subcommittee holds its final hearing of the current series today.

Mrs. Miller said she served in her dual role of Communist and FBI undercover agent for five years. She told the probers she testified at subversion hearings in Washington shortly after leaving the party in 1955, and then returned home to find:

**Home Stoned**

"I had become the object of controversy, my home was stoned, the lives of my husband, myself and children were threatened," she said.

Mrs. Miller told members of the subcommittee headed by Rep. Morgan M. Moulder (D-Mo.) that she was barred from membership in a woman's club after her testimony. She said she believed the campaign to keep her from the club was headed by a member whose Communist

activities were unknown to other club members.

She said she served in a Communist-dominated group because her Red leaders did not want her known publicly as a Communist.

She said her husband, Paul, also an FBI undercover agent against Communism, served in the same group identified as the Committee for the Protection of the Foreign Born.

**To Stifle Laws**

"The objective of the group was to stifle all anti-Communist legislation, particularly in the field of immigration," she said. "They knew they were going to lose Communist party leaders if they were deported."

Moore Hamilton, retiring president of the Medford chapter of United Nations association, and Mrs. H. P. Bosworth, newly-elected president, will assist Mayor John Snider in greeting guests.

The Medford chapter, which has planned the reception, was formed five years ago and is one of 11 in Oregon. Members include residents of Medford, Ashland, Jacksonville, Gold Hill and Grants Pass.

The public is invited to the reception and refreshments will follow the program.

## Champion Steer Is Sold at \$1.81

Portland—(UPI)—The grand champion Hereford steer at the Pacific International Livestock exposition sold at \$1.81 per pound Wednesday.

The steer was purchased by Ceba's Market from Edward Gath of Salem for \$1,950.

The current market price for steers is 28 cent. Highest price paid in recent years was \$2.05 by a local restaurant in 1956.

## Eugene Woman Contests Election

Portland—(UPI)—A Eugene woman, Mrs. Florence R. Cook, Wednesday filed a suit in federal court here seeking to set aside a bond issue of \$198,700 approved by voters of the River Road Park and Recreation district of Lane county.

Mrs. Cook contends in the suit that the Feb. 23 election was illegal. The Eugene area district, its directors and the district superintendent are the defendants.

The woman asks that the district be restrained from selling bonds pending federal court determination of the legality of the voting.

## Rains Damage Florida Crops

Miami—(UPI)—Millions of dollars of south Florida truck crops destined for the northland's dinner tables this winter were destroyed by heavy rains this week.

Agriculture agents in Dade (Miami), Broward, Ft. Lauderdale and Palm Beach counties predicted Wednesday that vegetable crop losses from the deluges would run into "millions of dollars."

The damaged crops resulted from near-torrential rains that followed Hurricane Judith which passed over this area Sunday.

The weather bureau forecast scattered showers today, the first relief from heavy downpours all week. Rainfall has averaged from three inches south of Miami to between 10 and 15 inches in Broward and Palm Beach counties between Sunday and Wednesday.


