## Funerals Held For Quintuplets

Taylor, Tex.—UPI—The quintuplet daughters of Lt. and Mrs. Charles G. Hannan were buried in separate graves today following a "white" funeral service in St. Mary's Roman Catholic church.

The services were those held for baptized infants in the church. The priest wore white vestments and the five tiny coffins were covered with white lamb-skin.

Lt. Hannan, a 29-year-old KC-97 tanker navigator, asked Thursday that publicity surrounding the births Tuesday come to an end. He told reporters that he plans to take a 30-day leave "to try to collect everything together again."

Both the officer and his wife are from farm families in Taylor, a small central Texas town. Mrs. Hannan, the former Cecilia Thonig, was unable to leave her hospital bed at Lackland Air Force Base to come to the funeral.

Mrs. Hannan said she was glad the quintuplets were born and said it was God's will that none of them lived more than 18 hours.

"I understand God's will, not his way," she said. "I am happy to have brought five daughters into the world."

**X15 Test Pilot's Oxygen Falters**  
Edwards AFB, Calif.—UPI—The test pilot of the experimental X-15 was nearly blacked out by failure of the rocket ship's oxygen supply Thursday, causing cancellation of a test flight.

Test pilot Scott Crossfield was set to take the half-rocket, half-plane on a test power flight from its B-52 mother plane at 41,000 feet.

He switched to the oxygen supply of the X-15 from that of the B-52 90 seconds before the drop, but the X-15 supply failed.

Bomber pilot James Allavie asked: "How are you doing, Scott?"

"Haven't done anything yet," Crossfield came back fuzzily. He was almost unconscious.

Allavie cancelled the drop and landed the bomber.

## Dr. Taylor Speaks At Faculty Session

Asland—Southern Oregon college professor, Dr. Arthur S. Taylor, chairman of the social science division, addressed faculty members and their wives Thursday evening in the Britt Student center on the topic, "College Teaching as a Profession."
