Merchants Plan Christmas Decor

More street decorations, a treasure hunt and possibly a Santa Claus landing by helicopter are features planned for Medford's Christmas shopping promotion, according to Don McNeil, Jackson County Chamber of Commerce manager.

McNeil said a committee of downtown merchants decided recently to order another six illuminated candy canes, about 10 feet long, to hang along the business streets this year.

The Christmas opening right after Thanksgiving, on Friday, Nov. 27, will feature a Christmas shopping period treasure hunt, the committee reportedly decided. Bill Moffatt, of Mann's department store, is heading the planning work on the treasure hunt, McNeil said.

This treasure hunt will be like the one last year with tickets given with Christmas purchases and the prizes displayed in the store windows. Numbers will be assigned to those prizes on a given day, when the customer must compare the number on his ticket with that in the window.

The merchants' committee headed by Joe Materie is working on plans to have Santa Claus land by helicopter in the new Park and Shop lot behind Burleson's department store, McNeil added.

Senator Backs U.S. School Aid

Portland—UPI—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) told the governmental affairs committee of the Oregon Education association here Saturday that federal aid to schools can be provided without any real threat or peril of federal dictation or domination.

He emphasized that federal aid to impacted school districts such as Hermiston, Astoria and elsewhere had taken place in Oregon for many years.

"I have consulted with school superintendents and school principals in those districts," he said, "and they tell me their fine schools are free of any federal effort to dominate or exercise control."

Neuberger said a provision to the new version of the Oregon Dunes National Seashore bill would be added authorizing federal aid to any school district which might have 10 per cent or more of its land included within the boundaries of the proposed park.

He promised that in the next Congression session he would continue to seek federal action for any federal aid-to-education proposals.
