Entertainment, including a mystery contest, is planned. Visitors and prospective members will be welcome.

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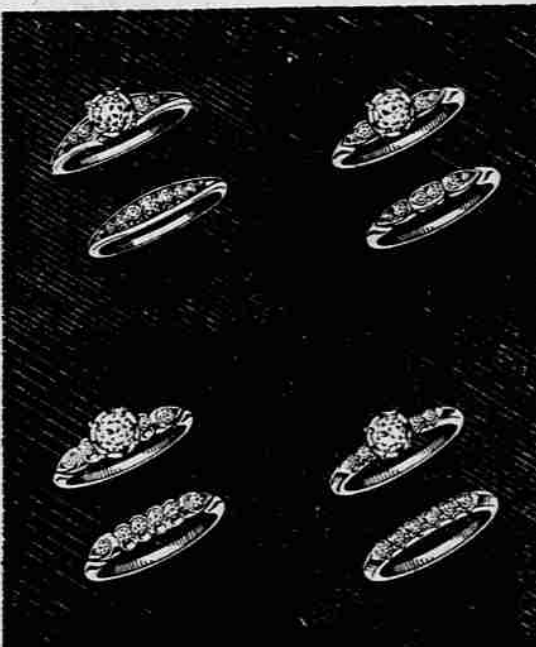
