Gold Hill - Several groups, including civic, school and church have planned events for the observance of Halloween here.

Mrs. Ogden Kellogg, president of the Gold Hill Parent-Teacher association, which is sponsoring the project to aid the United International Children's Emergency fund, has named chairmen in various sections of the area, who will be in charge of the coin collections in their individual neighborhoods.

The first event scheduled is the annual adult masquerade party, honoring teachers of the Hanby and Patrick Elementary schools and Crater High school. It will be held Thursday, October 29, at 7:30 p.m. in the Odd Fellows hall on Fourth avenue.

All adults in the community are invited to attend even though they are not a member of one of the sponsoring groups. Each woman attending except the teachers is to take a pie. Mrs. Daniel Stewart, vice-president of Amethyst Rebekah lodge, and general chairman for the event, said prizes will be awarded for the best costumes.

Entertainment will be provided by the sponsoring organizations. Each will present either, one skit, game, or stunt during the evening.

The Past Noble Grands' club will decorate the hall. Odd Fellows and Rebekahs will serve the pie and coffee during refreshment hour and the Gold Hill Grange and Gold Hill Health unit members will be in charge of clean-up and dishwashing.

Other sponsoring groups include the Gold Hill Parent-Teacher association, Gold Hill Garden club, Amethyst Rebekah Friendship club, and the Gold Hill Lions club.

Traditional Halloween parties for pupils of the Patrick and Hanby Elementary schools will be held Friday, October 30, in the different classrooms immediately after the masquerade costume parade, which will take place at 12:30 p.m. in the Hanby school's gymnasium.

Officials of the unit wish to stress that the penny collection project is optional and that those youngsters participating will do so only on a volunteer basis. The offer of "trick or treat" by householders as well is optional.

The pennies collected by youngsters for the United Nations Emergency fund will be used for medical and nutrition programs aided by the fund, to benefit underprivileged mothers and children in more than 100 countries, and has been endorsed by parents and leaders throughout the United States to give youngsters the opportunity to help those who are hungry and ill.
