

## Beauticians Say Blondes Losing; Brunettes Gain

New York—Twelve thousand hairdressers, cosmeticians and manufacturers of beauty products met in Manhattan last week and found that:

—Brunettes are gaining on blondes.

—Hair styles for the winter will remain short with the newest "do" shaped like a triangle.

—The latest dryers are air-conditioned.

—Some luxury beauty salons cater to customer comfort with vibrator chairs which remove kinks from the body while curlers put them in the hair.

The occasion was the National Beauty Trades Show, an annual gathering sponsored by the Hairdressers and Cosmetologists Association.

Mrs. Edna L. Enme, of St. Louis, a beautician since 1925 and member of the association's official hair fashion committee described some of the new trends in the beauty world.

She said manufacturers have improved wave solu-

tions to the point that getting a permanent takes little more time than getting a shampoo, and so that any type of hair—bleached, dyed or natural—can be treated.

"The same improvement goes for all the coloring solutions," she said. "And these days, almost every woman is coloring. There still are plenty of blondes, but the brunettes are advancing. This season, we're tinting all shades of brown with high lights... some rosy, some tawny."

She said the air-conditioned dryers operate on a new principle of circulation, drawing air through the curlers instead of blasting out around the face. And as for those vibrating chairs, she said most salons give the customer benefit of some without extra charge.

**Latest in Coiffures**

The association decreed "American Caprice" as the newest in coiffures. It is cut so that looking at the full-face, from the chin up, the silhouette is triangular. Sometimes soft wisps of bangs break the line. The triangle is repeated at the nape of the neck. The hair is waved softly and there is a brushed-up look at the temples.

I asked Miss Enme what became of that puffy, young-looking hair-do called the Bouffant which was highly popular a couple of years ago.

"Oh some girls still wear it," she said. "But you know, women like change. Now, when a woman feels gloomy, she goes out and buys a new hairdo instead of a new hat. A hair-do you wear for 24 hours a day."

The first class was held September 28 at Rogue Valley Memorial hospital to begin a 50-week course. A tea on opening day honored the students, and various hospital staff members and others interested in the program attended.

The unique class, part of a new program started in Oregon a few years ago, was planned partly because of the pressing demand in hospitals for trained nursing personnel, according to Lindsay M. Vinsel, director.

Women completing the course will be "trained by an accredited school to provide nursing service under the supervision of a registered nurse or a physician in private homes, nursing homes, doctors' offices and hospitals," he said.

Mrs. Bertha Morrill, R.N., is the teacher and coordinator of the school. She has been an instructor of nurses and has worked in hospital, missionary and office nursing. She was director of nursing service for Ashland General hospital before taking the practical nursing instructor position.

**Course Outlined**

The course consists of 510 hours of classroom instruction, including nursing care of the patient, personal hygiene, normal structure and function of the body, first aid and disaster nursing, home nursing, common drugs and their administration, foods and nutrition, care of mother

and newborn, care of children and occupational therapy.

An additional 1440 hours will be spent in clinical training in the Rogue Valley Memorial hospital and the Jackson county farm home.

To enroll, students must be high school graduates or pass a general educational development test, must be between 17 and 50 years of age, in good physical health, of good moral character and must pass tests of reading ability and aptitude.

The practical nurse program in southern Oregon is the result of efforts of Mrs. Roberta Cummings, Dr. Edwin R. Durno, Mrs. Francis Earhart, the board of directors of the hospital and the board of education of Medford, Mr. Vinsel said.

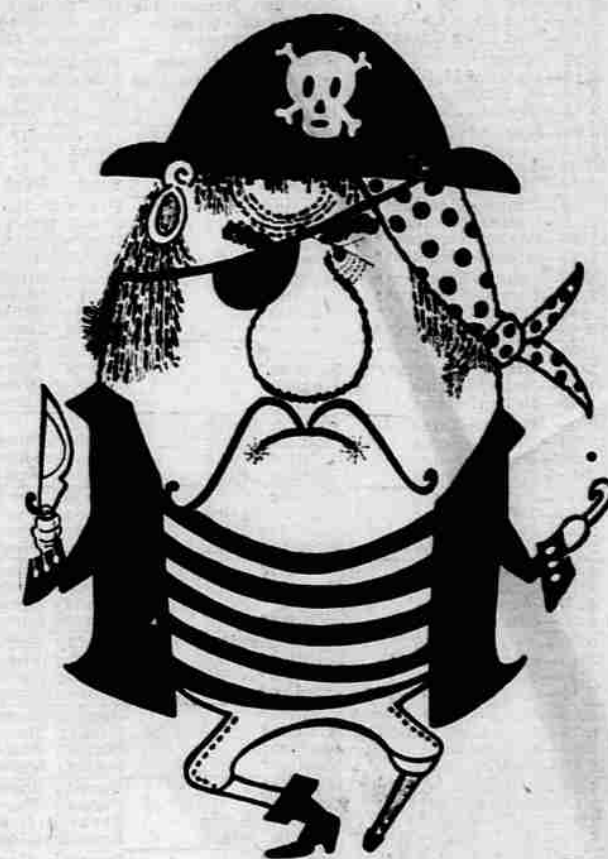
