

West Coast Opens New Routes Today

Seattle - West Coast Airline today inaugurated service to five new cities in Washington and Montana bringing single-carrier service to a total of 62 cities on WCA's routes and connecting those cities with 15 other major and regional carriers in a six-state area.

Service was inaugurated to Bellingham, Wash., Kalispell, Cut Bank-Shelby and Great Falls, Mont.

The company also has announced that it has petitioned the Civil Aeronautics Board to reopen the record in the Montana Local Service case and reconsider the company's proposal to provide local air service between Boise and the western Montana cities of Butte, Helena, Great Falls and Billings.

West Coast asked reconsideration on the basis of its present ability to offer single-carrier service between Boise and Klamath Falls, Sacramento and San Francisco-Oakland. The company began service from Boise to the Bay area via intermediate points Sept. 15.

Mekvold Attending Seattle Meetings

Alf B. Mekvold, Jackson county school superintendent, is attending a meeting of county superintendents and rural area educators in Seattle, Wash., this week.

The combined annual meetings of the department of rural education of the National Education association, and the NEA division of county and rural area superintendents are being held at the same time.

About 1,100 educators are expected to hear discussions on the topic of excellence in education, what it is and how to get it.

Among speakers at the meetings, which end Oct. 28, are U.S. Sen. Gale McGee (D-Wyo.), who formerly taught history at the University of Wyoming, and Chief Justice Matthew W. Hill of the Washington Supreme Court.

Explosive Course Scheduled in City

Approximately 50 state, county and city law enforcement officers and city firemen will attend a course in explosive ordnance reconnaissance training Tuesday, Oct. 27.

The course, offered by the Army, will be held in the council chambers at the Medford city hall from 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

The course is designed primarily for law enforcement officers, fire fighters and others having an active part in Civil Defense. It includes the identification of unexploded ordnance, such as bombs, rockets, shells, guided missiles and includes a briefing on the identification of nuclear devices.

Among those attending will be officers from the various community departments throughout the county.

Study of Virus In Chickens Upped

Washington - (Science Service) - A virus-caused cancerous disease of chickens is coming in for some intensive study with the awarding of a \$100,000 research grant, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced here.

Funds from the grant, made by the American Cancer Society, will be used to step up research on three main types of avian leukosis, as the disease is called. Scientists at the USDA's Regional Poultry Research Laboratory in East Lansing, Mich., have already shown that this poultry cancer is caused by a virus. They have transmitted the virus to other chicks and have immunized chicks against the disease.

Poultry cancers cannot be transmitted to humans but it is expected that research results can be applied to human cancer studies.

Dr. Ben R. Burmester, USDA biologist, will direct the research program which will now include a larger staff. Study of visceral lymphomatosis, or "big liver" disease - one of poultry's biggest killers - will be emphasized. It is one of the most difficult of the avian cancers to detect.
