The Family Council

Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a Judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Mrs. B. N.—She can never be happy with him. Edith N.—I've never cared so much about anyone else.

Mrs. B. N.—Our daughter is engaged to be married and we feel she is making a dreadful mistake.

Edith is 25, very cultured and very well educated. She has never had to do a lick of housework in her life. She has been very popular and could have married well. Instead she has chosen a young man who is bound to give her a hard time. He cares nothing about money or luxurious living. He has a government job and claims he is satisfied with it. He hasn't got a grain of ambition.

We give Edith just one year of this kind of life and we know she'll come complaining to us. But we've made up our minds that if she goes through with this she'll get no sympathy from us.

Edith N.—At the age of 25 I think I ought to know what I want. I have been dating since my early teens and I have been in love a couple of times, but I have never known anyone who has affected me as deeply as Neal.

My parents don't understand that Neal isn't a mere hobo just because he doesn't care about money. He has ambition—but not to make money. He wants to write, paint, compose music and just plain enjoy life without having to think about getting ahead of somebody else. I feel just as he does about it. I have never really cared about the luxuries that appeal to my parents.

My parents are all wrong in thinking I'd come running to them if I were in trouble. It's the last place I'd go.

The Council: We gather that Edith's parents don't believe she can or should have thoughts, feelings or abilities other than those they have instilled in her. But it's possible that Neal's biggest attraction for her is that he represents different attitudes from those that have surrounded her.

Attractions like this can be tricky—even for a 25-year-old. Because she is not entirely familiar with the attitudes Neal expresses, and because she has probably not circled in the same social group with him, Edith may not be able to evaluate him quite as well as someone closer to his own background.

We think Edith should give herself plenty of time to know Neal well. She should be aware that it takes enormous energy and determination to do well any one of the many things Neal claims he wants to accomplish. In his mid-20's he should be past the "wanting" stage and should have some start or some program for accomplishing his goals. Edith should find out whether he is really happy with his job and situation in life or is putting on a self-defensive show. She should ask herself if she can really be happy as Neal's wife—once the gilt has rubbed off a bit and she finds herself with a mop in hand, married to a mere human male.

If the answer is still yes, after a reasonable consideration of these matters, we think Edith has every right to go ahead and try to fulfill herself

in her own way. Her parents are wrong to issue warnings of doom. This is uncalculated and often regretted. A married child may at some time need help or mature advice, but will go any length to avoid the humiliation of coming to the kind of parents who are all too ready to say, "I told you so."

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Vessels Remain Aground on Coast

Two vessels remained aground off the Oregon and Washington coasts today.

The 7,229-ton freighter Lipari was stuck near Westport, Wash., and the 81-foot tug Columbia Queen was aground near Taft, Ore.

The tug Salvage Chief broke a tow cable at high tide today in an unsuccessful effort to pull free the 422-foot Lipari. The tug managed Sunday to move the beached vessel 60 feet toward deeper water.

Salvage crews moved the \$600,000 tug Columbia Queen about 50 to 75 feet where it was aground at the south entrance to Siletz bay. The Columbia Queen went aground early Saturday in heavy fog.

The Lipari, whose crew remained aboard, went aground Friday evening. The Lipari was straightened out Sunday when it was turned 12 degrees by two hawsers attached to it and pulled by winches aboard the Salvage Chief.
