

Anti-U.S. Rally Called by Castro Scheduled Today

Three Expected to Talk Before Mass Assembly in Cuba

Havana — (UPI) — Peasants and workers by the tens of thousands streamed into Havana today for an anti-United States rally called by Premier Fidel Castro.

The bearded revolutionary leader called for one million Cubans to mass before the presidential palace at 4 p.m. (e.s.t.) today to protest what he said were the "economic and military threats" of the United States against his regime.

Castro, his leftist brother Raul, now defense minister, and President Osvaldo Dorticos are expected to address the crowd massed in the plaza below from the balcony of the palace in the heart of Havana.

Says Planes U.S.-Based
Castro's supporters went all out to ensure a massive turnout in Havana and at similar rallies in provincial capitals throughout Cuba.

Castro, in a five-hour television appearance which lasted from Thursday night into the early hours of Friday, charged that a plane from the United States "bombed" Havana last Wednesday night. Newspapers said U.S.-based planes also "machine-gunned" Cuba.

Planes dropped anti-Castro leaflets on Havana late Wednesday. Cuban warplanes were sent up to intercept the raiders and anti-aircraft guns also opened up. Two persons were killed and about 50 wounded with most evidence pointing to stray machinegun bullets and fragments of anti-aircraft shells as the cause for the casualties.

Blames Ex-Aide
Castro charged that the raid was masterminded and carried out by former chief of the Cuban air force Maj. Pedro Diaz Lanz. Diaz Lanz broke with Castro and took refuge in the United States over alleged Communist influence in the Cuban government.

In Miami, Fla., attorney J. Edward Worton said he would begin extradition proceedings against Diaz Lanz today in an effort to have the former air chief sent back to Cuba to face trial.

Minister of State Raul Roa said Friday that Cuba would request the United States to extradite Diaz Lanz and other Cuban "criminals."

Romance Lacking In Soviet Wedding, Americans Discover

Maplewood, N.J.—(UPI)—A young American couple who fell in love in Russia discovered that wedding ceremonies in the Soviet Union are all rubles and no romance.

It seemed logical for Dennis O'Connor, 24, and Mary Lou McMahon, 22, to want a Russian ceremony even though both are from New Jersey.

The two met at Middlebury College in Vermont, where they had pledged to speak only Russian while studying the language. They fell in love and became engaged. True to their promise, they spoke Russian only.

The couple decided to marry at a Russian ceremony in Moscow, where Dennis later

erated that wedding ceremonies in the Soviet Union are all rubles and no romance.

Back home again, the new Mrs. O'Connor told about their experience.

Church Weddings Rare
"Dennis had to work so hard with the American Embassy to arrange a church wedding for us," she said. "Weddings in churches have become rare in Russia."

Finally, a Polish priest was allowed to conduct the ceremony at St. Louis Roman Catholic Church in Moscow.

"People crowded around outside the church as we got married," Mrs. O'Connor said. "There were a lot of elderly women in shawls who seemed to remember the old-time weddings, and who cried. But the younger people just seemed aghast, as though they never had seen anything like it."

In deference to Soviet custom, the couple was married again 10 days later in real Russian style—with a bureaucratic civil ceremony.

The heart of the ceremony consisted of plunking down 15 rubles, or \$1.50, before a

plump woman office worker. Then the couple signed a register and had their passports stamped.

Either Name Acceptable
The office worker asked Mary Lou whether she wanted to keep her own name or take her husband's, since in Russia the women can arrange it either way. The bride said she preferred to be Mrs. O'Connor.

"Then is was all over," said the bride. "I wouldn't say there was much romance involved."

The Russian press widely played up the civil ceremony

—but completely ignored the church wedding, she said.

"They were so anxious to suppress all news of the church marriage that I had the impression someone was outside the church shooting people away as we got married," she said.




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California Man Dies From 'Roulette'
