

### Lane-Atkins Tiff Billed Wednesday

New York — (UP) — Two significant welterweight fights, both on TV, feature this week's boxing schedule.

Kenny Lane, former lightweight challenger, makes his bid for recognition as a welterweight contender in a 10-rounder with Virgil Atkins, ex-welterweight champion, at Washington, D. C., Wednesday night. Lane is favored at 2-1.

Friday night's TV-radio (NBC) 10-rounder at Madison Square Garden brings together welterweight contenders Florentino Fernandez of Cuba and Gaspar Ortega of Mexico for a return match.

**Fernandez Favored 11-5**

Fernandez had to be content with a decision over rugged Ortega at Miami Beach, Sept. 11, and Fernandez' knockout string was snapped at 15 straight. The Cuban is favored at 11-5 to repeat.

In Wednesday's fight at Washington, southpaw Lane of Muskegon, Mich., is favored over Atkins of St. Louis because of his speed and skill, although Atkins is rated the harder puncher.

Jack Twyman of the Cincinnati Royals, who is handsome enough to be a television actor, starred in two TV "spectaculars" during the week end to lead his mates into first place in the National Basketball association's Western division.

The 6-foot-6 former University of Cincinnati star totaled 76 points in a pair of nationally televised games. He poured in 39 points in sparking the Royals to a 108-103 victory over the Detroit Pistons Saturday and added 37 points Sunday as Cincinnati edged the Minneapolis Lakers, 103-102.

Twyman traveled the length of the court to score the Royals' winning basket against Minneapolis after stealing the ball from Elgin Baylor under the Lakers' basket.

Baylor led the losers with 30 points, including 18 in the final period.

### Yankee's Collapse Big Baseball Story

New York — (UP) — The New York Yankees' collapse won out by a whisker over Harvey Haddix' perfect game in the United Press International's balloting to determine the No. 1 baseball story of the year.

The UPI board of 44 experts representing every city in the major leagues gave the story of the Yankees' collapse 66 points compared to 62 for Haddix' epic losing effort against the Milwaukee Braves on May 26. The formation of the Continental League ranked third with 44 points, the Chicago White Sox's first pennant victory since 1919 was fourth with 34 points and the Frank Lane vs. Joe Gordon fiasco in Cleveland was next with 14 points.

**12 First Place Votes**

The Yankees story received 12 first-place votes, 13 seconds and four thirds compared to 14 firsts, six seconds and eight thirds for Haddix' performance.

Nineteen stories were mentioned by the experts, including the Los Angeles Dodgers' rise from seventh place to a world championship, Elroy Face's remarkable string of 17 straight victories and his 18-1 season record, Willie McCovey's debut, Gene Conley's comeback and Sandy Koufax's record — tying 18-strikeout performance.

### Boxer Dies After Bout In Mexico

Guadalajara, Mexico — (UP) — Walter Ingram, 25, a boxer from Houston, Tex., who was knocked out in a non-title match Saturday night, died early today in a Guadalajara hospital of his injuries.

Ingram suffered a head injury when knocked out by world bantamweight Champion Jose Becerra. He died at 4:10 a.m. today after doctors had operated Sunday to remove a blood clot in the brain.

Attending physicians said the boxer's condition became serious shortly after 1 a.m. when he developed a respiratory depression. Later he suffered a "cardiac depression" which caused his death.

Ingram had remained in a coma after undergoing the brain surgery.

A native of Weirton, W. Va., Ingram underwent a severe beating at the hands of Becerra before the referee stopped the bout at 2:10 of the ninth round.

He made the announcement to a University of Michigan official Saturday at Ann Arbor before leaving for Boston.

Crisler, long-time University of Michigan coach, said he telegraphed Texas oilman Lamar Hunt, who is forming the new league with a group of sports enthusiasts, that he would not take the job even if selected.

Though Crisler made no statement about his future it was expected he would remain in his present post with University of Michigan.

He was contacted by the football group sometime ago but would make no immediate statement in connection with the job, apparently wishing to think the matter over.

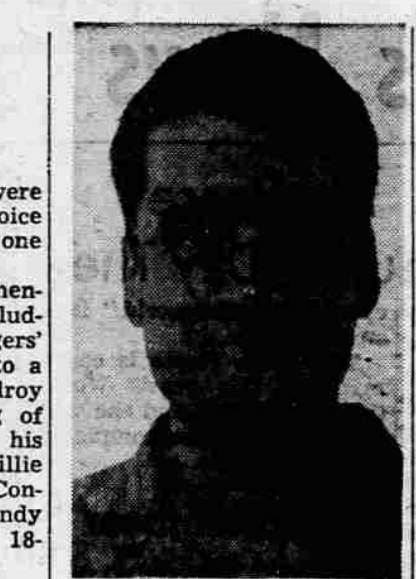
The Canadiens knocked the Detroit Red Wings from the unbeaten ranks Sunday night in a 2-1 victory over the Chicago Black Hawks.

The Horse Fly is The Worst Biter

"It'll rain today, sure as shooting, 'cause these pesky flies are biting like mad," observed the old timer as he slapped violently at the back of his neck.

He and many other folks believe that flies bite more just before a rain; this has been a general belief for a long time. Fact is, however, when stable flies are around they will bite whether it is going to rain or not. They bite storm or no storm.

Neither is the "old timer" alone in his idea that flies doing the biting are "grown-up house flies." The housefly doesn't bite; it has nothing to pierce with. It's the stable, or so-called horsefly that usually bites. There are some others that bite, too, but the worst offender is the horsefly.

The old timer, as well as many of the rest of us, have a right to be a little confused, for there are at least 80,000 kinds of flies in the world — many more kinds than any one person could identify in an entire lifetime. Flies comprise the order of insects called "diptera," a Greek word meaning two wings. Flies have soft, hairy bodies. The single pair of wings in these insects is similar to two pieces of cellophane. Many flies are carriers of human diseases. The deerfly is believed to be the vector in tularemia, or rabbit-fever.

It was the female horsefly that did the biting on the old timer's neck. The male never bites, which of course is little consolation to the man or animal being bitten. This vicious female will chase for miles any large, moving object, even an automobile or train, stupidly thinking it can get a meal of blood, perhaps believing the car or train is an overgrown horse. They fly only during the daylight hours.

The horsefly, or stablefly, lays her eggs in the decayed flesh of any animal she can find. She may even lay them in a sore on an animal's body. The larvae that hatch are dirty white, legless creatures we call maggots.

**Problems for Mother**

This instinctive insistence on the part of the female flies of this species presents some interesting problems for the prospective mother. There are times when she cannot find a suitable place for the eggs. The egg-laying can be delayed just so long, then the eggs hatch inside her body. On these occasions she can be said to bring forth living young.

**Small Worlds Around Us**

There have been many instances where the use of living maggots has been indicated in the treatment of human disease and open wounds. The hungry larvae are used to consume the decayed flesh, usually the larvae of the so-called bluebottle or blow-fly. These are called "surgical maggots." The eggs from the blue-bottle fly are carefully washed in hydrogen peroxide or diluted formaldehyde. When the eggs hatch, the maggots are fed sterile food until they attain the size and develop the appetite necessary to perform the unpleasant task of eating decayed flesh from a wound in a human being.
