Portland (UPI) — Medford and Vale continued to lead the class A-1 and A-2 high school football ranks in the weekly Journal coaches' poll today.

Medford had all eight first place votes in class A-1 while Jefferson remained in second place. Pendleton, which like the first two has won seven straight, was third with Marshfield 6-1 fourth and Lincoln 7-0 fifth.

Vale had 77 out of a possible 80 points. It has a 7-0 record as do Willamina, Seaside and Beñdon who are second, third and fourth respectively. Other A-2 teams in order are Coquille, Mac-Hi, Woodburn, Eggle Point, Myrtle Point and Estacada.

LA Council Nixes Ball Park Map

Los Angeles (UPI) — Even with all the taxpayer suits and stubborn residents out of the way, the Los Angeles Dodgers still find the road to Chavez ravine occupancy littered with obstacles.

This time it's maps.

For the second time, Dodger maps for the development of the ravine for a stadium site here turned down by the Los Angeles city council Monday.

City councilman Ransom M. Callicott, chairman of the council's planning committee, rejected the three new maps submitted and explained, "these maps I just received do not adequately answer our questions about commercial development near the stadium. These are not new maps."

Last Wednesday, Callicott, who says, "I have no quarrel with anybody," was one of the councilmen who rejected the Dodgers' map of the ravine which showed the club's proposed 52,000 seat ballpark would be surrounded by a restaurant, car wash, service station, ice cream parlors and other facilities.

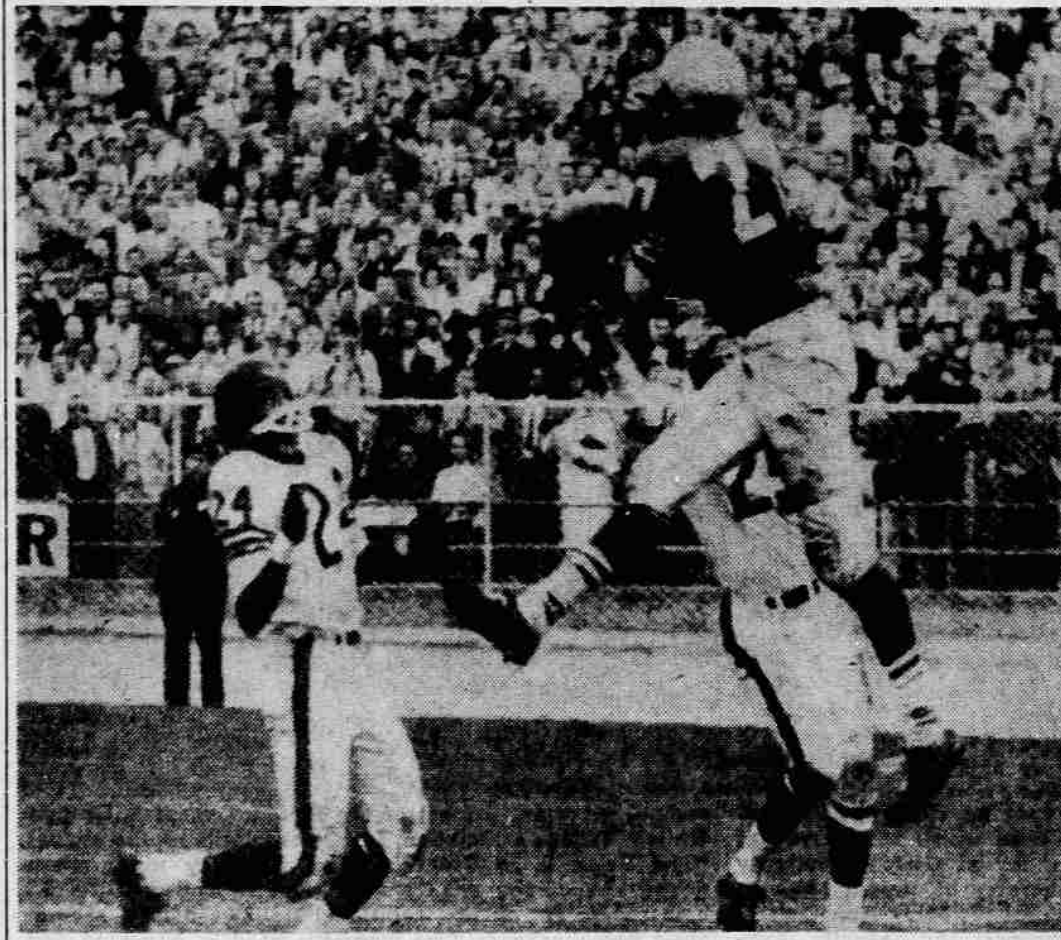
Reasoning Delayed

The council delayed taking action on rezoning the 192 acres in the ravine for commercial uses and another 125 acres for parking.

Dodger president Walter O'Malley forwarded a letter with the most recent maps.

He said, "at this time, I wish to restate our intention to use the purchased land for a stadium and landscaped ballpark and recreation area as per the terms of the contract with the city plus such incidental facilities as are usual to a stadium catering to the comfort and convenience of the public."

Callicott said, however, the new maps gave no indication of where the "incidental facilities" — the commercial enterprises — will be located.

Crash Victim in Critical Condition

San Bernardino, Calif. (UPI) — A 42-year-old woman who was trapped in an upside-down position for nearly seven hours in the wreckage of a small plane was reported in critical condition today at St. Bernardino hospital.

Mrs. Charlotte Mildon of Arcadia, Calif., was rescued Monday from the craft — in which her husband and another couple were killed — when her shouts for help finally attracted residents in the area of the crash.

The small plane smashed into the ground late Sunday night a half-mile from the Hesperia, Calif., airport when it hit power lines as it approached for a landing.

The plane fell only 300 yards from homes in the area, but residents said they saw nothing when they went to investigate during the night noise made by the craft's impact.

Killed in the crash were Mrs. Mildon's husband, Edward, 46, and Sgt. and Mrs. William J. Gibson of nearby George Air Force Base. Gibson was pilot of the plane.

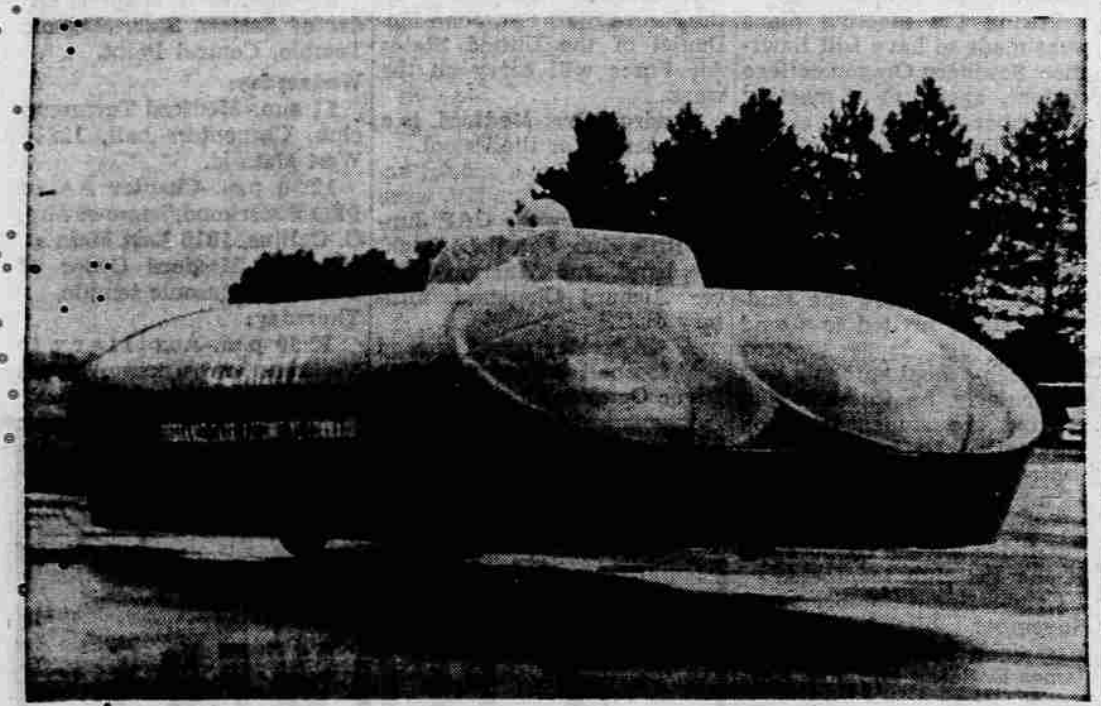

Incentive Pay Charge Possible

Palo Alto, Calif. (UPI) — The Detroit Lions may be in hot water with the rest of the National Football league because Coach George Wilson "plain forgot" to pay his players a customary gift of \$100 apiece before last Sunday's game with the Los Angeles Rams.

As a result of Wilson's "mental lapse," Detroit may have to answer charges that they held the money back as an incentive to beat the Rams. Incentive payments are against NFL rules and acting commissioner Austin Gunsels reportedly investigating the matter.

Wilson explained from the Lions' training camp here that the Detroit club officials customarily give each player \$100 when they make the trip to the coast.

He said he was given the money in Detroit before the club left for Los Angeles last week and was directed to give the money to the players when the team arrived on the West Coast.

"When you're not winning, you don't think of everything," Wilson said, "I just plain forgot about it."

Wilson said he gave the money to the players Monday following their 17-7 victory over the Rams. It was Detroit's first league victory in five starts.

HUNTER, MITEFF SIGN

New York (UPI) — Billy Hunter of New York and Alex Miteff of Argentina have signed to meet in a 10-round return heavyweight bout at Madison Square Garden, Nov. 27. Hunter, who stopped Tony Anthony last Friday, beat Miteff on a seven-round TKO in their first bout.

Agencies Probe Leaflet Drops

Washington (UPI) — At least seven U.S. agencies today investigated recent leaflet raids on Havana, Cuba, allegedly from airfields in this country, to determine if any federal laws were violated.

At the same time, the five-nation Inter-American Peace Committee launched an inquiry at U.S. request to find out whether the flights were conducted by Cuban refugees from bases in Florida.

The investigations were made urgent by Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro's mounting anger at the United States. He told a cheering protest rally Monday night that U.S. authorities either were "accomplices or murderers" or else defenseless to stop rebel flights against Cuba.

The flights, which Castro said dropped bombs as well as anti-Castro leaflets, are being investigated by the State and Justice departments, the FBI, the Immigration and Naturalization Service, and the Federal Aviation Agency.

Customs Bureau and border patrol agents in Florida were under orders to halt the flights.

But it was not clear immediately what action the United States could take. A spokesman said the Justice Department did not have enough facts to determine whether any federal law had been violated.

Sandy Awarded Split Verdict

New York (UPI) — Middleweight Randy Sandy of Brooklyn, N.Y., scored a split 10-round decision over young Emilio Griffith of New York Monday night in the feature bout at the Academy of Music.

Sandy, a former national AAU middleweight champion who turned pro in 1951, gained the decision when both judges—Joe Eppy and Joe Armstrong—voted for him.

The referee—George Walsh—voted for Griffith.
