

Arizona State University; Mississippi Slapped by NCAA

Boston - (UPI) - The National Collegiate Athletic Association's all-powerful 18-man council Tuesday night rapped the knuckles of two member colleges and hinted that other reprimands may be issued today.

Executive Director Walter Byers, acting as spokesman for the group, Tuesday night announced that the Arizona State University at Tempe and the University of Mississippi, one of the nation's leading elevens, were penalized for violating football recruiting practices sanctioned by the NCAA.

Arizona Hit Hardest
Arizona was hit with the stiffest reprimand - a two-year probation period, the first year of which the school will be barred from participation in NCAA programs. This includes athletic events, radio and television programs sponsored by or connected with the NCAA.

Mississippi, with an unbeaten football team this season, received a one-year probation term but the penalty will not bar the team from participation in post-season bowl games or any other activities, according to Byers.

At the same time Arizona State and Mississippi were being reprimanded, Byers announced that the University of Cincinnati which had been placed on probation at the last meeting of the council in New Orleans last April, has been restored to good standing.

Ashland - A prayer and a desire to beat Eastern Oregon college this Saturday night in the Myrtle Bowl in North Bend is the prevalent air in the Southern Oregon college grid camp this week.

By beating the Mounties of Eastern Oregon, SOC's Red Raiders would be assured of at least second place in the Oregon Collegiate conference.

The prayer is for the Wolves of Oregon College of Education who tangle with Oregon Tech next Saturday in Klamath Falls. Winless OCE has never been a victim of the Owls in the grid wars but this year after six consecutive losses the picture is dim.

Oregon Tech holds the upper hand with a spotless 3-0 record in OCC play with the single game to play. An Owl loss and Raider win would knot the race for the top spot.

Allen Chips Bone
Only one injury took the spotlight in the Raider camp as a result of last week's game with OCE. Wayne Allen suffered a chipped bone in his ankle in the first half and as a result will be out for the

remainder of the season. Allen was a freshman mainstay in the defensive unit as a halfback and safety man. He was also the partner of Kerm Bennett on punt returns.

Doyle Bransom has moved in to take over for the missing Crater High school grad. Bransom is also a freshman and a grad of Jacksonville High school.

Jess Munyon made a surprise debut in the OCE game and he will be seeing action in a big way on the defensive unit again this week. Munyon had trouble with his knee and was expected to be shelved for the season. Treatment of the knee brought an almost unbelievable recovery in three weeks.

Al (the Horse) Barnes upped his rushing lead on the Raider squad to 337 yards with an 81 yard effort against OCE last week.

Gordy Carrigan continues to be the leading pass receiver on the Raider team and in the OCC with 63 more yards on five receptions. The shifty end now has 19 snafes which have been good for 335 yards.

Tony Brauner has also upped his punting average two points to a 34.1 average. Following the Myrtle Bowl game this week end, the Raiders will return home to play their final two games against Eastern Washington on Nov. 7 and Humboldt State one week later on Fuller field.

Jury Being Picked for Carbo Trial

New York - (UPI) - A jury was being completed today at the trial of Frankie Carbo, alleged underworld boxing czar, in General Sessions Court.

A 10-count indictment charges him with conspiracy, managing fighters without a license and making matches without a license.

During Tuesday's selection of nine jurors, all male, chief assistant district attorney Alfred J. Scotti said the trial might last three weeks.

Scotti's questioning of prospective jurors indicated he expects to introduce phone-tapped conversations as evidence.

Black Tornado To Meet Spirited Ashland Friday

When Medford and Ashland High school football teams come together at the Medford stadium Friday night, the host Black Tornado will be heavy favorite.

Season records, the Tornado's high scoring offense and Medford's greater depth give the pre-game odds to Oregon's No. 1 ranked team.

But it's for sure, the Grizzlies, of the Lithia city are not going to roll over and just play dead. They have a scrappy, spirited club which has no fear of Medford. And, that proof is the past two years.

Not since 1947 have the Grizzlies whipped the Tornado and some scores since have been much one-sided. But, supremely confident crews were held to 15 to 6 in 1957 and 27 to 0 in 1958. The latter tally does not tell the full story of the game. For, the Ashlanders calmed the Tornado to zephyr gentleness for three

quarters and held the Pear city gang scoreless in that time.

This season the Grizzlies have gained something of a giant-killer reputation with victories of 19 to 6 over Roseburg and 7 to 0 over Grants Pass, schools Ashland teams had not beaten since 1945.

Reasons for Ashland success have been outlined by Ferd Borsch in his Prep Patter column of the Oregonian. To Borsch, Varney Corey explained that the Grizzlies are a light team and that what they lack in weight they make up for in the determination to do the right thing at the right time. It's a matter of execution plus hustle.

Borsch also pointed to tight Grizzly pass defense with only seven of 69 aeriels thrown against the Ashlanders completed up until last week end. Ashland players had intercepted 10.

Medford mentor Fred Spiegelberg had his squad running defense yesterday against Ashland plays and had his club dummy scrimmage its offense. This afternoon it was to be more of the same but Spiegelberg said, "It might get a little rough."

Jensen, Holt Back
The Tornado did quite a bit of running Monday. There was group work and squad went through its repertoire of pass patterns.

Good news this week is the return of end and tackle Dennis Jensen, center Chuck Holt and end Bruce Bray. Jensen and Holt had been out with knee ailments and Bray with an ankle sprain. Spiegelberg said that Jensen, go team tackle and top defense team end, likely will not start. He reported that Holt, shock team ball snapper, should see a lot of duty. Bray, one of Medford's kick-off experts, is back battling with George Clearwater for the booting rights.

Still sidelined is halfback Mike McCullough because of a knee injury. The sophomore should be ready, however, for Medford's final junior varsity game of the season next Monday against Grants Pass and then for the varsity fray with the Cavemen on the following Friday.

Ball Players Garcia, Rhodes Get Bad News

Mike Garcia and Dusty Rhodes, major league stars only five years ago, got the bad news Tuesday.

Garcia, a 19-game winner in 1954, received his unconditional release from the Cleveland Indians while Rhodes, the Giants' pinch-hitter deluxe five seasons ago, was returned to the minors by San Francisco.

The Nashville Vols of the Southern association announced, meanwhile, that they have signed Jim Turner, ex-pitching coach of the New York Yankees, as their manager.

Made Free Agent
The Indians said Garcia, who won between 18 and 22 games four times, was free to sign with another major league team or is welcome to go to spring training with them next year. The 35-year old right-hander had a 3-6 record and a 4.00 earned run average this year but isn't going to give up without one more chance.

"There's nothing wrong with me that steady work won't cure," he commented. "Although I haven't talked to any other teams, I hope to sign with one near Cleveland."

Rhodes was sent to Tacoma in the Pacific Coast league when the Giants shook up their roster. Dusty hit only .167 in 48 appearances at the plate last season. He hit the headlines with a .345 mark in 1954 and also starred in the Giants' World Series victory over the Indians.
