## McLoughlin, Crater 9th Clubs Mix

McLoughlin Junior high ninth grade football team puts its undefeated and untied record on the block again Friday in a tangle with the strong once-beaten Crater high freshmen.

## Colts Rate Edge Over Cleveland

United Press International. The Baltimore Colts are 7½ point choices to whip the Cleveland Browns and the New York Giants are favored over the Green Bay Packers by seven in Sunday's key National Football League games.

The San Francisco Forty-Niners, who share the Western division lead with the Colts, are seven-point choices to defeat the Detroit Lions.

In the other games, the Philadelphia Eagles are favored over the Washington Redskins by seven points, the Pittsburgh Steelers are favored over the Chicago Cardinals by 3½ and the Los Angeles Rams are 7½ point picks to beat the Chicago Bears.

The Colts-Browns clash at Baltimore will affect both divisions.

It offers many intriguing angles for pro football followers.

It matches Baltimore, the current league champion, against pro football's most successful team. It matches two coaches who should not be invited to the same party. Weeb Ewbank, Baltimore's coach, was an assistant for five years with the Browns under Paul Brown. They did not part on the best of terms.

The Colts, tied with the Forty-Niners at 4-1, don't get many cracks at the Browns because the clubs are in different divisions. They knocked the Browns out of the Eastern race, 21-7, at Cleveland in 1956 and aim to hand them another blow Sunday before a capacity crowd of 57,557.

Baltimore also wants to win because it plays four of its next six games on the road. The Browns (3-2) need a victory to slip within range of the Colts (4-1) in the Eastern race. They trail New York by a game and would fall two behind if they lose and the Giants defeat the Packers (3-2).

## Friendly Strife Aim Of Leahy

Los Angeles —UPI— There will be no pro football war in Los Angeles if Frank Leahy, general manager of the local entry in the new American Football league, has any say about it.

Leahy's first public act as general manager of the Los Angeles Chargers, new name of Barron Hilton's entry in the AFL, was to extend the pipe of peace to the Rams, the National Football league club in Los Angeles.

"Competition with the Rams will always be on a friendly and honorable basis," Leahy told a press luncheon in Beverly Hills Tuesday.

"The Chargers' management feels it owes a debt of gratitude to the pioneers and plans to keep this fastest growing spectator sport on the high plane it enjoys today."

**No Coach Picked**

The former Notre Dame football coach said prior to his departure Tuesday night for a league meeting in New York City that the Los Angeles club had not decided on a coach since Eddie Erdelatz turned down the job a few weeks ago. That was prior to announcement of Leahy's appointment as general manager.

The cities now holding franchises are Los Angeles, New York, Dallas, Houston, Minneapolis and Denver. Leahy said hopes of another West Coast city were dim although he said Ernie Nevers, onetime Stanford football hero, would like to get a franchise for Oakland. Leahy listed New Orleans and Miami as possibilities.

## Louisiana State, Texas Slim Gridiron Favorites

New York —UPI—Louisiana State, the nation's top-ranked college football team, is a slim one-point favorite over third-ranked Mississippi for their "battle of Dixie" at Baton Rouge, La., Saturday night.

The oddsmakers also anticipate a close battle between the fourth-ranked Texas and Southern Methodist, listing the unbeaten Longhorns as three-point favorites.

Second-ranked Northwestern is picked to defeat Indiana by at least 13 points in a regionally-televised game and fifth-ranked Syracuse is a 14-point choice over Pittsburgh.

In another major clash, Army is a six-point favorite over the Air Force Academy for their first meeting at Yankee Stadium which will be televised throughout New England and the Middle Atlantic States.

Miami (Fla.) is a three-point pick over Kentucky and Tulane is a three-point favorite over Texas Tech in major Friday night games.
