Jordan Olivar Coach of Week

New Haven, Conn. - (UP) - In his own mind he considers himself "an offensive coach," but he's produced the first major college football team in 16 years to hold rivals scoreless in the first five games of the season.

He attributes five straight shutouts to using a mixture of defenses that keeps the other team mystified about what's coming next.

He's Jordan Olivar of Yale, the Beverly Hills, Calif., insurance man honored today by United Press International as college football's "coach of the week" for the amazing comeback of his Elis, the first Yale squad to be unscored on this late in a season in 46 years.

Hurt Their Pride
Last year Yale lost all seven of its Ivy league games and finished in the league cellar. Ten of this year's starters were members of that team, but there's a difference.

"Some mediocre players gained good experience in the span of one year, and became pretty good players," Olivar explained. "It's kind of hurt their pride last year."

Olivar says he spends 50 per cent of his practice sessions on defense and points out that "if you make one mistake on defense it can cost a touchdown; on offense, one mistake may only cost you a down."

But Porter is pressing his legal effort in the courts in an attempt to clear the way for a future visit, possibly next year. Last Thursday his attorneys filed in the Supreme Court a petition for a writ of certiorari in Porter's case against Secretary of State Christian A. Herter.

District Judge Matthew F. McGuire on Sept. 30 dismissed Porter's motion for summary judgment by which the congressman sought to prevent Herter from further blocking his passport travel authorization to Communist China. Porter has been issued a passport, but it is stamped "not valid for travel to those portions of China... under Communist control."

Deemed Necessary
Porter had declared, in his brief filed in District Court, that during his forthcoming trip to the Orient he deemed it necessary "in order fully and knowledgeably to perform my legislative functions as a member of Congress, to visit Red China to gain first-hand information concerning conditions there, and also as to the character, purposes and designs, domestic and international, of the political leadership, and the potentialities and circumstances of trade between Red China and the United States."

Philadelphia - (UP) - A dozen teams were in the running today for the first annual Liberty Bowl game to be played here Dec. 19.

Former Columbia university coach Lou Little, chairman of the bowl's selection committee, said his group discussed the 12 potentials at a meeting Tuesday. The game is expected to match the best team in the East against a strong sectional rival.

Little said a final choice would be made during the final week of November or December 1 for the game at the 98,000 seat Municipal Stadium.

He said the teams discussed were: Texas, Texas Christian, Southern Methodist, Louisiana State, Mississippi, Georgia Tech, Georgia, Clemson, Tennessee, the Air Force, Penn State, Syracuse and Pitt, among others.

Olympia, Wash. - (UP) - A new 25 per cent state wholesale tax on non-cigarette tobacco products was ruled unconstitutional Tuesday by Superior Court Judge Raymond W. Clifford.

The state was counting on the tax to raise \$3,500,000 in the next two years.

In a memorandum opinion Judge Clifford said the tax is unconstitutional because the state attempted to impose it on products of out-of-state distributors selling to Washington retailers.
