Time to Teach will be the theme of the 13th annual fall two-day conference of the Department of Classroom Teachers, Oregon Education association, which will be held October 30 and 31 in Eugene.

On Saturday's program is a panel for local DCT presidents. Participants will include Mrs. Maxine Smith, Medford, president of the Oregon Education association; Ewald Turner, Pendleton, immediate past president of the National Education association's Department of Classroom Teachers; Miss Ella May Taylor, Tacoma, Wash., Northwest DCT regional director; Arnold Wolpert, west coast representative of NEA; Ed Elliott, director of field service, OEA; and Louis Corigan, Klamath Falls teacher.

Featured speakers of the Friday session will be Dr. Charles Bish, NEA, Washington, D.C., and Dr. Ray Lowe, professor of education, University of Oregon. Dr. Lowe will speak on "Emerging Role of the Teacher."

### Zonta Member Tells of Life In Saudi Arabia

Mrs. Helen Tweedy spoke about Saudi Arabia at a meeting of Medford Zonta club Thursday at the Jackson hotel. Mrs. Florene Bolton, chairman of the international relations committee, introduced Mrs. Tweedy, who was in Saudi Arabia from 1947 through 1951.

Mrs. Tweedy was employed as a nurse by the Arabian American Oil company at Dhahran, Arabia. The American employees lived inside a fenced compound of two square miles in the midst of a sandy, barren desert, she said. The company provided a full scale American community with post office, bank, club house and recreational facilities.

Food arrived from America every 6 weeks in refrigerated ship, causing the housewives to scramble for a share of the perishable fruits and vegetables.

Since all clothes had to be brought at the beginning of the two-year term, keeping abreast with the current styles was a considerable chore for the ladies, the speaker said.

Although this was an American community, residents were subject to the Arabian laws and customs. No Christian ceremonies could be publicly held and Mr. and Mrs. Tweedy's wedding was the last Christian ceremony permitted in this Moslem country. Since Friday is the Moslem holy day, Thursdays and Fridays were observed by the Oil company as the week end, Mrs. Tweedy said.

Mrs. Tweedy spoke of meeting and swimming with Florence Chadwick, who was training in the Arabian waters for her English channel swim.

The company hospital treated every type of case for the American community, she said. However, the only Arabians permitted in the hospital were surgery patients as the Arabian hospital at that time was not equipped for surgery.
