Question of Progress Being Made on Pollution Discussed

What progress is being made in Jackson county on air pollution abatement?

This was the question confronting members of the Jackson County Air Pollution Abatement League, the county court, representatives of the fruit and lumber industries and the City Sanitary Service at a meeting in the Jackson county court office yesterday afternoon.

George Flanagan, lumber mills' representative and Elk lumber company manager, reported that at least some progress is being made by the five mills closest to Medford. Flanagan said the committee is still working on one mill in the area which has not yet voluntarily joined the program.

Dunbar Carpenter, representing the county's pear growers, said about 43 per cent of the orchard heaters in the valley are open type pots. The Jackson County Fruit Growers League plans to draw up an agreement covering elimination of all open pots by the end of a five-year period, Carpenter said. Those attending the league meeting about two weeks ago "are definitely in agreement to carry through on the program," he added.

Several Sites

Anthony Boitano, City Sanitary Service operator, said he has inspected several sanitary land-fill sites. Because of complaints on smoke over Jacksonville from the present garbage disposal site, Boitano said he is planning to shift the garbage disposal site.

Because of seepage which might pollute a nearby stream, Boitano said sanitary land-fill would not be practical at the present site.

Carpenter estimated that 10 per cent of the valley's orchard heaters were return-stack or jumbo cone, a less smoke producing heater, 36 per cent were lazy flame, the type acceptable in southern California, 4 per cent were using Prestolites and other types were 7 per cent, which included other open type pots.

The survey accounted for 113,500 pots of all kinds in Jackson county, he said. This would be 20 heaters to the acre for a 5,600 acres heated by pots. This, he noted, is close to the county agent's estimate.

Current Pear Crop
"This is not an excuse, but the current pear crop is very short and represents 64 per cent of the overall harvest average for the last three years," Carpenter remarked. "Few orchardists are in the black this year. Now they are faced with the added investment of putting in new pots. They will go ahead, but this could make the job harder."

Answering questions from Mrs. Harlan Bosworth, a member of the air pollution league, and others, Carpenter said this would mean an added investment of \$75,000 for Jackson county area orchardists. The biggest problem will come with the smaller oper-

ator who does not have as much money, he noted.

County Judge Earl Miller said he knows of no statute to prevent burning of tires for orchard heating, answering a question from William Doernbach. Carpenter said the fruit growers' league has pointed out to all its membership that burning tires is outlawed.

Original Idea

"I wish to reaffirm my original idea - lumber and fruit production are our two chief industries in the Rogue valley," the county judge said. "The voluntary method of eliminating air pollution is best. If that fails some legislative action may be necessary later."

"At Medford Corporation air pollution is at a negligible and acceptable minimum," Flanagan reported. "If all other plants reduced their air pollution to the same low level the public wouldn't be concerned."

SP Freight Train Derailed at Dallas

Dallas, Ore. - (UPI) - Seven cars of a 20-car Southern Pacific freight train derailed on a branch line here late Tuesday blocking Dallas rail routes and tearing up seven-car lengths of track. No injuries were reported.

The freight, en route to Salem, was going 12 miles an hour when the accident occurred. Cause was not immediately determined.

A railroad spokesman said the derailment occurred at 7:40 p.m. and two of the cars fell across other tracks. Tracks were expected to be cleared during the morning and the wreckage cleared in the afternoon.

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NRA Delegates Open Convention

Denver - (UPI) - More than 1,000 delegates from 17 states will participate in the annual National Reclamation Association convention which started here today.

The convention will last three days.

William E. Welsh, of Washington, D.C., secretary-manager of the association, said this "will be one of the most crucial conventions in NRA history" because of "renewed interest in reclamation and recently enacted congressional legislation."

Among the speakers to appear at the convention are Colorado's two senators, Gordon Allott, and John A. Carroll; Colorado Gov. Steve McNichols; Reclamation Commissioner Floyd E. Dominy, Dr. C. H. Wadleigh, director of soil and conservation research of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and Gerald M. Kerr of the Bureau of Land Management.

Reps. Byron Rogers and Wayne N. Aspinall, both Colorado Democrats, also will participate.

Welsh said election of officers for 1960 will be held the final day of the convention.

Laselle Coles, of Prineville, Ore., the association's first vice president, is expected to be elevated to the presidency at that time, Welsh said.
