Black Walnut Meats - A Taste Sensation

Many people never have enjoyed the taste thrill of black walnut meats. There is something about the flavor of black walnuts never found in any other food; actually it is a taste sensation. The flavor has been more-or-less successfully imitated by artificial chemicals. However, the real tang comes only from the oily goodness of the meats.

150 Feet High
The black walnut tree itself is majestic - often towering up into the air 150 feet. The bark is dark colored and deeply furrowed. Some people who have lived in close association with the tree claimed the "tree sang in the wind." In spite of the fact

this sounds much like an old wife's tale, there was some basis for the idea. Wind passes easily through the leaves, and in its passing the foliage quivers and vibrates in a peculiar "singing" sigh; "vibrating leaves" someone called it. In the fall of the year the black walnut trees hang heavy with fruit. The nuts are the size of tennis-balls; each nut carefully and heavily wrapped in a heavy, thick husk. The frost "cuts the nuts loose," they rattle earthward and often cover the ground beneath the tree. The nut itself is deeply ridged, and almost black.

After the nuts are gathered and dried a few days, the "shucking" begins. This is a process in itself. Perhaps one of the unforgettable memories of all folks who "went nutting" in the fall, was the "walnut shucking," the removal of the heavy husk that surrounds the ridged nut. Some farm-families used a "corn sheller." Turned by hand, the iron teeth of the shucking wheel tore the husks from the nut. Juice Squirrels

The original "husking" method was simply a hole in a board the approximate size of the nut, but smaller than the hole and hit sharply with a hammer. This drove the nut through the board, at the same time squeezing off the thick husk. Usually the walnut juice squirted out in several directions. To avoid staining the hands and fingers, thick gloves were worn. The juice was almost as permanent as the best dye; once on the bare skin it resisted several washings with soap and water.

But even if the hands were stained it was worth it, for long winter evenings around the fire could be shortened by cracking the nuts and picking the oily kernels from the broken shells.

It would be difficult to name a flavor that is comparable with the peculiar, hard to describe, but very pleasing taste of the black walnut. (Released by The Register and Tribune Syndicate, 1959)

Japanese Swords Sought by Group To Preserve Them

Washington—(UPI)—Sometime between 1300 and 1335 A.D., in feudal Japan, a Samurai sword was made by a master who was known as Kanemitsu of Bizen.

Recently, in Washington, D.C., the same sword turned up before Junzo Sato, who had come from Japan with the sole purpose of recovering some 42 such masterpieces. When Japan was defeated in World War II and the American occupation troops arrived, Gen. Douglas MacArthur's headquarters ordered that all weapons belonging to Japanese nationals should be surrendered to the occupation forces. More than 350,000 swords, ancient and modern, were given up by the former soldiers and traditional families, and were later brought back to the United States.

Sato came to this country hoping to find the ancient weapons, which have been designated as national treasures by the Japanese government. He represents his country's National Society for the Preservation of Artistic Japanese Swords.

The sword in question was presented to Sato by Frank Aiello, who was in Japan as an officer in the 8th Army during the early days of occupation and obtained the sword from a surrendering Japanese officer. Aiello is now local retail advertising manager for the Washington Star.

In feudal days, when the famous hero Hideyoshi Toyotomi was successfully conquering the entire country of Japan in the late 16th century, farmers were forbidden to possess any weapon. This was how swords became marks and symbols of the Samurai class, their spirit and power.

Even after the class system was abolished and the modern government was formed in 1868, the former Samurai class prized the ancient swords as their household treasures.

Use of such weapons by Japanese officers during World War II, either for morale or defensive purposes, was widespread.

Ike Will Enter Walter Reed for Physical Check

Washington - (UPI) - The White House announced Wednesday that President Eisenhower will enter Walter Reed Army Medical Center possibly later this week, for his annual physical "head to toe" check-up.

Eisenhower had a similarly complete physical examination Oct. 3-4, 1958. The President himself had planned to make the announcement at his news conference Wednesday, but no one asked him about his recent cold.

Usual Examination
"There is absolutely nothing wrong other than the usual examination," Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said of the examination.

Eisenhower was 69 years old Oct. 14. He has been suffering since early September from a cold of varying degree and the discomfort of recurrent, chronic bronchitis.

The physical examination will be conducted by the staff of specialists at Walter Reed working in consultation with the President's doctor, Maj. Gen. Howard McC. Snyder.
