## Newest Work of Artist To Be Shown on Sunday

An exhibit of 50 paintings and drawings completed in recent months will be shown by Eugene Bennett during an open house Sunday, November 1, at his studio, 329 South Grape street. Hours for the open house are from 2 to 5 p.m. and the public is invited to attend.

The artist states that the exhibit will serve as a preview of three one-man shows which are on his schedule. The first will be November 20 to December 20 in the new gallery in Britt Student center, Southern Oregon college, Ashland, the second in the Portland Art museum from January 5 to January 31, 1960; and the third to be the month of March in the new gallery of the Klamath Art association, Klamath Falls.

Some of his works will also be included in the Christmas and the Artist exhibit sponsored by the Salem Art association in December.

The work in the exhibit covers a variety of subjects, materials and moods. Some are of lumber mills, slash burners and lumber yards, while others were inspired by rock formation in the Crater Lake area. The big forest fire in the Ashland district provided material for some of the works, and others are described as aerial landscapes.

Flowers were the inspiration of some, and included in the exhibit is a special group of miniature abstractions combining oils, nails and other materials.

Brush drawings will include a series from children's play-grounds, tree studies from the Siskiyou mountains and Rocky Ann, construction workers and a band concert.

One of Mr. Bennett's works won honorable mention in the Centennial exhibit in Portland last summer, and he has won "sweepstakes," first, second and honorable mention in the annual Southern Oregon Art exhibit in Grants Pass throughout the year. His works were included in the art exhibit at the Oregon State Fair in September, and in a local exhibit arranged for the recent convention of the Oregon State Medical society.

Eugene Bennett, a native of Jackson county, holds bachelor and master degrees in art from the Art Institute of Chicago. He returned to Medford more than a year ago after living and teaching in Chicago for a number of years. His works have been exhibited throughout the United States, and have been purchased for traveling collections by the Art Institute of Chicago, the Museum of Modern Art in New York City for both European and American tours, and by the Portland Art museum.

## Seasonal Food Said Abundant

Washington—(UPI)—This weekend offers a wide selection of plentiful foods at the food markets. Best values are in seasonal fruits and vegetables. Pork, poultry, and eggs are also in ample supply.

This year's large crop of apples, grapefruit, oranges, cranberries and grapes provide good values for the fruit shopper.

Ample supplies of such fall vegetables as potatoes, onions, carrots, corn, cabbage, cucumbers, sweet potatoes, lettuce, tomatoes, and rutabagas offer excellent buys.

Pork is still a feature on the good value list, with special offerings this weekend in chops, hams and roasts. Reasonable price tags still adorn most poultry products.

Eggs and cheese continue to be top buys for the food shopper.

The best values in fish this weekend include canned tuna, shrimp, and fish sticks.

These are the week-end best values, nationally. Now, here is a closer look at plentiful foods in the West—Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington Wyoming.

Pork, beef, eggs and apples are in ample supply this week. Some cuts of pork and beef are priced 1 to 2 cents a pound lower this week, and ample supplies of lamb are down 1 cent a pound in the Los Angeles area. Light supplies of calf and veal are mostly unchanged in price.

Medium and large size eggs are 1 to 2 cents a dozen lower in the Los Angeles area, but egg prices are mostly unchanged in other markets. Poultry is in moderate to ample supply, and mostly unchanged in price.

Apples continue in heavy supply, and prices are declining. Other fresh fruit and vegetable plentiful include grapes, pears, cabbage, cauliflower, celery, lettuce, potatoes and tomatoes. In good supply are avocados, melons, lemons, oranges, corn, cucumbers, onions, bell peppers, and sweet potatoes.

Best buys in the fish line include salmon, halibut, rockfish, flounder, and sablefish.
