Westport, Wash. — (UPI) — Salvage experts today were to stage an all-out effort to free the Liberty ship Lipari from the beach that has held her captive for the past week.

A tide of 9.8 feet, the highest since the vessel went aground, was expected to aid the powerful tug Salvage Chief in pulling the 42-foot freighter to deep water.

The Lipari was moved slightly Thursday morning, but the strain parted a 140-ton test anchor cable.

Von Braun May Get Extra Cash For Saturn Rocket

Washington — (UPI) — Prospects appeared bright today for Dr. Werner von Braun to get the extra \$100 million he wants for the Saturn super rocket that may put America ahead in the space race.

The Defense department is recommending a new Saturn budget of \$140 million, compared to the \$240 million Von Braun wants, but the Army missile expert is believed certain of support from the civilian space agency to which he is being transferred.

No Military Need

A Pentagon spokesman conceded that the department's recommendation was based only on military requirements. No military need for the super rocket is foreseen in the next five or six years, the spokesman said, so there was no need to complete the program before 1964 or 1965.

But the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, which will have charge of the project after Von Braun's transfer receives the approval of Congress, is eager to get a payload-carrying Saturn into space as soon as possible.

Von Braun said this can be accomplished in 1963 if more money is provided. The Saturn is to have more than twice the power of the largest rocket used so far by the Russians.
