### Sunday Schools Have Classes for Mentally Retarded

In one of his parables, Jesus told about a good shepherd who left 99 sheep safe in the fold while he went forth to search for one little lamb that was lost in the dark.

Some of America's churches are discovering that this parable has a direct and poignant application, a problem that now confronts them.

The problem is to provide suitable religious training for the relatively small minority of children—about 3 out of every 100 in the average community—who are mentally retarded.

Ministering to the mentally retarded is not an easy task for any church to undertake. It requires a great deal of time, effort and planning.

These considerations are bound to loom large in the minds of overworked religious educators who are already hard put to line up enough teachers and classroom space for ever-growing enrollments of non-handicapped youngsters.

That's where the parable of the lost sheep comes into the picture. As long as there is even one child in the community who is left out of the Christian education program, through no fault of his own can the church honestly claim to be doing its job?

Conduct Survey

The question was brought sharply to the attention of church leaders by a survey conducted two years ago by the National Association for Retarded Children. It asked 175 local chapters in all parts of the country to ascertain what religious training facilities were available in their communities for mentally handicapped children.

Three-fourths of the chapters replied that no facilities existed. The survey turned up only 900 children actually were enrolled in special classes—500 in Protestant churches and 400 in Catholic churches.

In the wake of this report, the National Council of Churches called a meeting of Christian education officials of 30 major Protestant and Orthodox denominations. They agreed to undertake a
