

Stocks Get Support In Late Trading

New York - (UPI) - Stocks met support in the late trading Thursday after going through a small decline earlier.

The market had to overcome some unsettlement from speculation in Studebaker-Packard issues which had generated heavy volume recently to the point where the stock exchange discontinued all stop orders in the issues. They declined substantially for a time and then met support above the lows.

Presley was released Thursday. Army doctors recommended he stay at home three days. He has a house in nearby Bad Neuenheim.

Beck Gives Up Parking Lot Job Due To Publicity

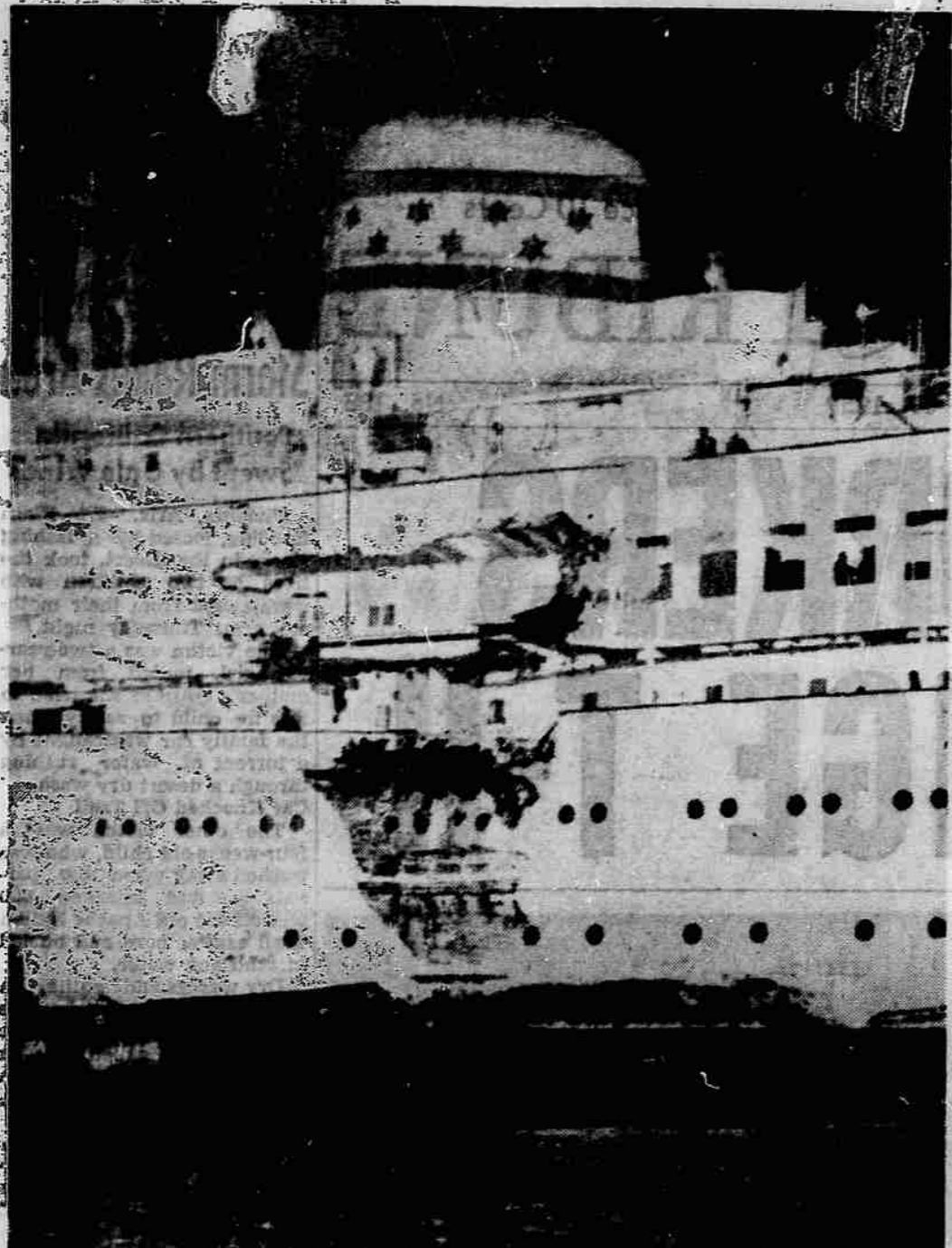
Seattle - (UPI) - Too much publicity has caused former Teamsters Union President Dave Beck to retire from his job of parking lot attendant.

Beck was spotlighted in the press and on radio and television Wednesday when it was discovered that he was spending three or four hours a day working at the parking lot he owns, one of many business enterprises.

"I'm a curiosity now," said Beck who is waiting while higher courts study appeals of his income tax evasion and grand larceny convictions. "I can't spend all my time answering questions. I'd go broke."

Beck, who rose from laundry truck driver to the presidency of the nation's biggest union, had been directing cars to parking stalls and making change at the lot for the past few months.

"It was good honest labor," said Beck. "I'm no better than anybody else. And I was doing pretty good 'til the papers found out about it."

Passenger Ship, Freighter Collide in New York Harbor

New York - (UPI) - The passenger ship Israel and the freighter American Press collided near the Statue of Liberty Thursday night with an impact some of the Israel's passengers said today had "the noise of a bomb."

One crew member of the Israeli ship was reported missing.

Several passengers and crew members were injured, apparently none seriously.

A passenger, Roger Pellowski, Milwaukee, said he saw the missing man, identified as Anthony Benites, securing a gangway a moment before the impact "but saw nothing of him after."

Many of the Israel's 200 passengers were in the dining room at the time of the collision, and several of them described the crash sound as like that of a bomb.

The Rev. E. Paul Kopp of the United Fundamentalist Church, Los Angeles, was in the dining salon with his wife and two children.

"We heard a terrible noise," he said. "It sounded like heavy objects on an empty floor. A little boy cried and one woman screamed. Water began pouring into the dining room, and there was some panic, but the panic quickly subsided with the help of the crew and officers."

Ship officers said the water came from broken pipes. Damage to both vessels was above the water line.

The collision happened about 8:30 p.m. in clear weather. The Israel was outbound and the freighter, owned by the United States Lines, was crossing the harbor to another berth.

"The impact of the collision was not very heavy," Capt. George Vickers, master of the American Press, said. He refused to comment on the cause of the collision until a Coast Guard hearing is held. Capt. Jacob Por, of the Israel, also refused comment.

Fraternity House Damaged by Fire

Eugene - (UPI) - Fire, which started from a defective flue, caused an estimated \$1,000 damage to the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity house on the University of Oregon campus here Thursday afternoon.

A fire department spokesman said the fire spread into a vertical opening beside the flue and burned upward to the third story of the men's living group.

No injuries were reported. Firemen said it took nearly an hour and a half to extinguish the stubborn blaze.

Fresh Clues Found In Search for Judge

Chicago - (UPI) - Police and the FBI, armed with fresh clues, conducted a two-pronged search along Chicago's South Shore and in northern Indiana today for missing U. S. Appeals Court Judge W. Lynn Parkinson.

Promising leads in the four-day search for the distinguished jurist were uncovered Thursday.

Homburg Found
 A blue-black homburg identified as belonging to the 57-year-old judge was found by a striking steelworker on the sandy shore of the 63rd st. beach.

At the same time, Indiana state police reported that a man answering Parkinson's description was seen twice Wednesday night at a lunch room in Chesterton, Ind., in the northwest corner of the state.

Pain in Head

Police said the developments were the best clues since the judge began his strange journey Monday afternoon after complaining of a pain in the back of his head.

His family said he was worried about low blood pressure and was under a doctor's care because of overwork. They said they were certain he was suffering from amnesia.

Straub Seen Choice As Demo Chairman

Portland - (UPI) - Oregon Democrats elect a new chairman Saturday and State Sen. Robert Straub of Springfield appeared to have the inside track.

Three of Straub's rivals for the post announced Thursday they have withdrawn. They are Portland attorney Berkeley Lent, Salem attorney Dan Poling and Vernon Burda, The Dalles.

Straub is a former county commissioner for Lane county and was elected to the state Senate in 1958.

The Democratic Central committee meets here Saturday to name a successor as chairman to the late Dave Epps. State Rep. Beulah Hand of Milwaukie has been acting chairman.

Two Arrested for Christmas Tree Theft


Two Shady Cove men are being held in the Jackson county jail today for Klamath county authorities on charges of Christmas tree theft.
