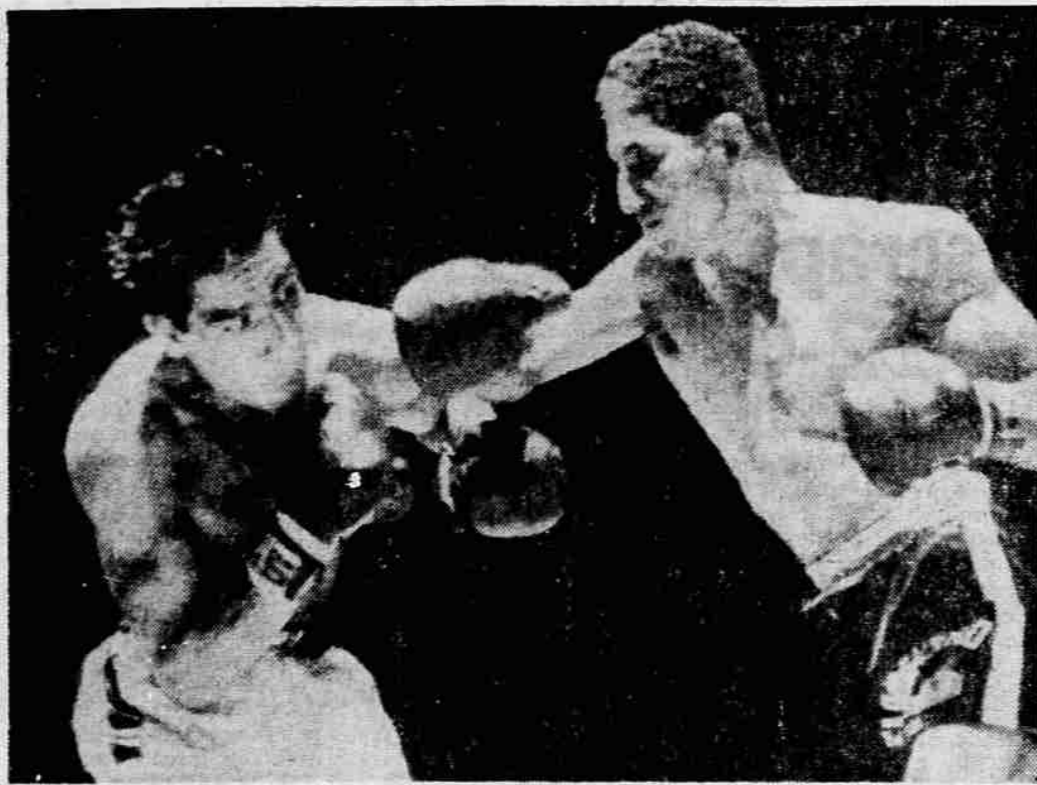

Fernandez Given Nod

New York — Slugger Florentino Fernandez of Cuba probably won a Jan. 22 shot at the welterweight crown by again outpointing Gaspar Ortega of Mexico in a thriller at Madison Square Garden Friday night for his 22nd straight professional victory.

Matchmaker Teddy Brenner said today, "I believe I can induce Don Jordan to defend against Fernandez in the Garden in January."

Jordan of Los Angeles, who must sign before Jan. 10 for a title defense, had already agreed to a non-title bout with the bull-shoaled Cuban on Jan. 22 if Florentino won Friday night.

Unbeaten Fernandez, 23, was the aggressor in every round with his left-hooking attack, but he was hard-pressed to win because of Ortega's countering tactics and surprising power in the many exchanges. And the Cuban had to be content with a split 10-round decision.

Ducks Crush Idaho With 45-7 Victory

 Moscow, Idaho — The University of Oregon Ducks proved they are still very much in the Rose Bowl race Saturday as they moved with equal ease in the air and on the ground to crush outclassed University of Idaho, 45-7.

The Vandals, suffering their seventh straight loss before a homecoming crowd of 7,000, scored on a 68-yard drive the first time they got the ball, but might as well have gone back to the dressing room after that.

Six Oregon men scored — halfback Willie West was the only repeater — as the Ducks marked up two touchdowns in the second period, four in the third, and one with under a minute remaining in the game.

The win left Oregon with only one loss — a close one to Washington last week — for the season.

Makes Lone Score
 The Ducks didn't look much like Rose Bowl material in the first period as the Vandals halted three Oregon drives. Idaho's lone score came when Gary Farnworth ran over from the four, 15 plays after Oregon had been forced to kick out of bounds on the Idaho 32. Ron Ismael's conversion was good.

Early in the second period the Ducks took over. Quarterback Dave Grosz threw to anyone eligible, including tackle Riley Mattson for a touchdown. Halfback Dave Grayson and fullback Harry Meedham took turns chalking up short — long ground gains.

Oregon's first score came on a 71-yard drive in nine plays. West plunged over from the seven. Meedham's run for extra failed.

Idaho had the ball for six plays and then the Ducks scored again on Grosz' pass to Mattson from the six. Grosz' pass to West for the conversion failed.

In the third period, Grosz passed from his own 40 to Grayson who caught the ball on the Idaho 21 and raced over for the score. Roger Daniels' kick was good.

Mike Rose set up the next scoring drive when he intercepted Farnworth's pass on the Idaho 11 and returned it to the eight. Daniels passed to end Paul Baugh from the five for the score, then kicked the extra point.

Score in Three Plays
 Idaho got one first down by recovering its own fumble, but Cleveland Jones intercepted another Farnworth

pass on the Oregon 20 and raced 39 yards. Seven plays later, Dick Arbuckle's touchdown was nullified by a penalty. Starting again on the 23, with first and goal to go, the Ducks scored in three plays, but Arbuckle missed the kick.

The period ended with the score Idaho still seven, Oregon 38.

Idaho mounted one sustained drive in the final period, but John Kyle fumbled on the Oregon 23. Oregon's sophomore backfield went 77 yards in seven plays with halfback Mickey Bruce scampering into the end zone from the four. Arbuckle kicked the point.

Phoenix Gains Rogue Title; Pirates To Take on Sutherlin

Phoenix — Phoenix High school's Pirates captured the Rogue league football championship here Friday night.

After an exciting first half, which saw them leading by only seven points, and a third period challenge, which saw their gap shrink to a single tally, the Pirates fired to down Eagle Point 26 to 12 in the District 6 A-2 southern division decider tussle.

Triumph took Phoenix into full district play-off finals. It will be host to Sutherlin next week end in the titular game. Sutherlin took the Umpqua Valley loop honors Friday afternoon with a 26 to 6 score over Glide. The Pirates and the Bulldogs each concluded 5-0 in their respective loops.

Final arrangements on the play-off likely will be announced on Monday.

Defensive Show
 First quarter was a defensive show with each team picking up one first down in the first nine minutes. Then the Eagles began their first goal-ward drive. The push began when Jim Nease returned a Ron Baker punt 18 yards to the Pirate 32. Steve Geren picked up 10 yards on two plunges, two more netted three yards then Nease reversed for seven yards and a first down on the 12. Bob Berryman carried twice for seven yards, then Geren went the last five yards on a spinner. Geren's bonus attempt was wide to the right, and the score was EP 6 to 0.

Phoenix took the kickoff and started its first paying thrust. Mike Consruck and Leon Small alternated the ball packing from their own 40-yard line to the Eagle 39. Then Lumley went to the 21 on a reverse, Consruck made 10 yards in two plays and Small ran three times for eight then he went off-tackle

for the score. Sam Walls split the uprights for the extra point.

The Eagles had the ball for four plays before returning it to the Pirates, Consruck returned a Nease punt 32 yards to the Eagle 43 yard line. Small tried the end but was stopped for no gain. Mike Reese then passed to Lumley who made a leaping catch on the 25 and running the rest of the way. Wall's kick was blocked.

This made the score Phoenix 13, Eagle Point 6.

Second Eagle March
 After receiving the kick-off in the third period the Eagles started on their second march. Nease returned the kick 14 yards to the 36. Geren paced the ball eight of the ten plays, gaining 20 yards on the drive. Gary Stelle picked up 23 yards on a reverse, and Berryman gained 11 on a sweep before Geren scored on a six yard plunge. A run by Berryman was stopped for no conversion and 13 to 12.

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Each team had the ball twice before the Pirates picked up their last touchdown in the closing quarter, taking over on their own 12 after Small tackled Nease for a six yard loss on a fourth down and three situation. Small lost to the 10 on a sweep. Lumley gained back to the twelve and then on a third and 10 play Lumley went 69 yards on a reverse to the Eagle 19-yard line. Other Richay took a hand off and went up the middle for 19 yards and the marker. Wall's kick was good.

Pass Intercepted
 In desperation the Eagles took to the air, throwing two passes before Consruck intercepted a Geren heave on the Pirate 34. Three plays later the game was over.

After gaining only 160 yards in the first half the Pirates picked up 213 yards in the second half to end up with a total of 373 overall yards, according to unofficial statistics. The Eagles gained 213 yards in the first half but were held to 111 in the second half for a total of 324. The Eagles led in first downs 17 to 13.

Actual stepped off official yardage, with penalties subtracted, showed Phoenix with an edge of 347 to 324. Eagle Point, which controlled the ball in the first half, ran 60 plays to Phoenix high's 48. Eagle Point finished 4-1 in the league, losing only to Phoenix.

UCLA, scoring on a first period break, came within one yard of tying the game in the third period. But tailback Bab Smith fumbled and the Huskies drew away in the final quarter.

Los Angeles — Quarterback Bob Schloredt, who lost the sight of his left eye in a boyhood accident, haunted the UCLA Bruins with his passing and ball-handling Saturday to lead the Washington Huskies to a 23 to 7 victory.

It was the Huskies' first victory over UCLA since 1950 in 19 games.

The win strengthened Washington's position as the top western contender for the Rose Bowl with only three games remaining on the Huskies' schedule.

A crowd of 32,838 saw Schloredt, who lost the sight of one eye as a boy, pass for two touchdowns, and score another himself. He was assisted in the one-sided victory by halfback George Fleming who scored one touchdown, booted a 37-yard field goal and two extra points.

Crater 9th, McLoughlin Play To Tie

McLoughlin Junior high's ninth grade Bulldogs and Crater high's freshmen fought to a deadlock in a rousing, hard-hitting football skirmish Friday on the McLoughlin turf here. Score was 6 to 6.

The Comet Frosh tabulated in the elongated first quarter, capitalizing on the first big break of the game, and the Bulldogs, utilizing a long punt and a long punt runback crossed the goal on the first play of the fourth period.

Medford's Bulldogs had a touchdown play nullified and Crater missed on two or three good opportunities to score.

Pass Snared
 A pass interception by Mike Glines got underway the successful Comet push. Crater went 45 yards in nine plays with a seven yard slash by Gary Wald over the left side of his line the pay-off punch.

A Glines to Pat Pepper conversion pass was incomplete. The Comets gambled on fourth down and passed for 21 yards on the march.

In the late third quarter a punt by McLoughlin's Frank Van Pelt put the ball in Crater possession on the Comet 28-yard line. Crater netted only one yard in three plays and Glines kicked. Jack Lowery took the ball on about his own 40 and scooted some 42 yards to the Comet 18.

Lowery then carried five yards. Ron Calkins failed to gain. But, Lowery boomed on a reverse for 13 yards and a touchdown. His extra marker kick was blocked.

Not long after, with the ball on the Mac 45, Mike Neathamer hurled a lightning pass to Keith Dalbec who was away like a flash to cross the goal. Offside was called and the play called back, heartbreaking to the Bulldog cries. Then, a spread formation pass play backfired as Pepper intercepted Calkins throw.

On One Foot Line
 Pepper ran back to the Bulldog 20. Wald ran to the nine for first down. Four plays later the Medford club took over on its one-foot line. A Glines pass in this effort was dropped in the end zone and a later muff also wrecked a Comet chance.

A Comet drive after the Mac TD carried from the Crater 26 to the Bulldog 23 before it halted with a pair of pass incomplections. With fourth and seven to go still in his own territory in this push, Glines ran 17 yards to a first down.

Crater had 175 net yards from scrimmage and Mac 101. McLoughlin had five first downs and the Comets eight. McLoughlin, still unbeaten, plays Hedrick next Friday afternoon with the winner to claim southern Oregon honors. Crater has lost only to Hedrick.

Last Friday's game had been underway for sometime before it was realized there was no timekeeper.
