

Wreck of Cuban Army Leader's Airplane Spotted

Havana, Cuba — (UPI) — The wreckage of a plane which might be that of missing Maj. Camilo Cienfuegos, commander of Cuba's revolutionary army, was reported down on the north coast of Camaguey Province today.

An amateur radio operator at Placetas in Las Villas Province said he had received word that distress signals were received indicating the wreckage was at Playa Mamon on the north coast of Camaguey.

Planes Search Region

Army planes took off immediately to search the region.

Cienfuegos left Camaguey in Eastern Cuba for Havana around 6 p.m. Thursday with three other persons in a six-seater, twin-engine plane. That was the last heard from them.

Premier Fidel Castro personally led an air search today, flying in his private plane, Sierra Maestra. With him was Cienfuegos' brother, Omani.

Thor Missile Squadron Cancelled

Washington — (UPI) — The Defense Department today cancelled one of the 1,500-mile Thor missile squadrons scheduled to be deployed abroad. Four squadrons rather than five will now be sent overseas.

The Pentagon announcement also said "production of the missile by the Douglas Aircraft Co. is being phased down immediately" at Santa Monica, Calif.

The announcement said that "since special requirements by the Defense Department and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration still exist, limited production of the Thor will continue until these needs are met."

The reduction, which may save \$100 million in the billion dollar Air Force Thor program, presumably was because many European countries refused to receive the missiles.

TRIPS TO MOSCOW

MOSCOW — (UPI) — The general manager of the government tourist agency Intourist has reported that 9,500 Americans visited the Soviet Union in the first nine months of 1959, the news agency Tass said. During all of 1958, only 4,300 Americans visited the Soviet Union.



SATELLITIC ORRERY—Arthur B. Epperson, Klamath Falls, demonstrated his device he calls a "satellite orrery" during a science class at McLoughlin Junior High school last week. The former Iowa high school principal and math teacher, built the device as a hobby after the firing of Sputnik 1. A motor sends the satellite (in front of globe) revolving around the globe 15 times for each revolution the globe makes. The satellite blinks off and on as it rotates. The arc at the left changes the position of the satellite so its orbit may be changed.

The oscillator at extreme left acts as a tracing station and gives off "beep beep" signals. The contraption was built of scrap materials including parts of fishing tackle, Epperson explained. A fishing reel may be seen just below the tip of the arc on the left. Extending from it along a copper arm is a thread which is fastened to the satellite. The thread, when taped to the globe (white lines), weaves a network of the orbital track so it may be seen. Watching the device work are students Maureen Kilby and Fritz Beck.

Recomputation of Phone Rates Due

Salem — (UPI) — A recomputation of rates in a \$14,299 annual increase granted Sept. 1 to the eastern Oregon Telephone Company, Pilot Rock, has been announced by Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill.

The rates were directed following separate conferences Thursday with four representatives of the Citizens Telephone Committee and with Walter A. Karnopp, president of the utility.

"I am confident the situation existing in the area served by the company will be relieved after discussing matters with the parties," Hill commented.

No change was made in the increase - ceiling set by the PUC's order. Concerned are the Pilot Rock and Ukiah exchanges only.
