

## Living Within 24 Hours Topic for Extension Units

"Living Within 24 Hours" is the topic of the study lesson for all county home extension units during November. Project leaders have been trained by Miss Mary Pat Lucy, Jackson county home extension agent. In some cases Miss Lucy will visit the unit and give the lesson.

"Homemakers are finding it increasingly difficult to find the time to participate in all the activities and community projects in addition to their homemaking work," Miss Lucy said. While it is impossible to set a schedule for a person's time, an evaluation of how a homemaker's time is spent can be made, she explained.

Subjects to be discussed in the lesson include "how much time should be spent on actual housekeeping, how much with the children, how much on community activities, and finally, how much time for personal improvement." Instructors hope that the lessons will help each woman in the management of her time.


