

## Colorado Is Topic For Group

Mrs. Beryl Lyon gave a program on "By-ways of Colorado" for the October meeting of the Travel Study club, Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, last Tuesday, at the home of Mrs. Horace F. Knight, 452 Fairmount street.

Mrs. Lyon said that Colorado is one of the most beautiful states since it is high in the Rocky mountains and has 52 peaks over 14,000 feet and 1,000 or more over 10,000 feet.

It has been nicknamed the "Centennial State" because it was admitted to the union in 1876, just 100 years after the United States won its independence from Great Britain. Colorado ranks seventh in size among the states, and 34th in population. The name "Colorado" comes from the Spanish meaning "colored red," since the waters of the Colorado river are of a reddish tint. Colorado remained a wilderness, except for some trading posts, until about a hundred years ago, when gold was discovered, the speaker said. Men rushed in great numbers to Pike's peak, near where the gold had been found, and their slogan was the now famous "Pike's Peak or Bust." Later many other minerals were discovered. Colorado ranks first among the states in the mining of uranium, which is so important in producing atomic energy.

Dr. Arthur Flynn, a friend of Mrs. Lyon's father, wrote the state song, "Where the Columbines Grow."

Mrs. Lyon showed pictures her husband had taken. Mrs. Lyon has traveled extensively in Colorado and her home was in Denver many years.

**Pianist To Appear In Portland**

Portland — Returning to Portland for the fourth time since 1956, the popular pianist Leon Fleisher will be the first guest artist of the 1959-60 season of the Portland Symphony orchestra on November 9 and 10. Piero Belugi will conduct.

This is the first American-born instrumentalist in years to be invited to play at the White House, which he did May 11 for President Eisenhower and his guest, King Baudouin of Belgium.

This is the personable and talented young artist who, after playing Monday, November 9, at the Public Auditorium with the orchestra, goes with it to the Oriental Theatre on November 10, to open the new Tuesday-night symphony series. Programs and prices are identical.

Fleisher will play Greig's "Piano Concerto in A Minor" which has not had a professional hearing in Portland for some 10 years. The orchestra will begin with Brahms "Tragic Overture," and give a first performance in the city of Dvorak's "Symphony No. 2."

Season tickets for the Tuesday Six-Concert series are still available, with five guest artists and one orchestral program making up an outstanding bill of fare. Past performances of the symphony in the theatre have won plaudits for the "sound" and warm atmosphere.

Information on the series is available at the Portland Symphony office in the Park building, with the box office for both Fleisher concerts opening at J. K. Gill on November 5.
