Blanket Collection Planned in Area

A blanket collection campaign for victims of September's typhoons in Japan and Korea will be launched here by the Jackson county chapter of the American Red Cross, according to local officials.

The chapter is seeking new and used clean blankets which will be shipped to the Far East for the thousands of people left destitute by the storms, which were considered the worst in the histories of both nations.

Red Cross officials said it can use all the blankets it can get. Similar campaigns

are being carried out in other chapters throughout the country. All blankets should be whole, with no rips, tears, holes or ragged edges, the Red Cross said. Any color or size will be acceptable, the Red Cross said, but no substitute item such as quilts, comforters or used clothing will be accepted.
