LSU Tigers Ride High In Football

Louisiana State was riding higher than ever in college football's upper stratosphere today while Northwestern, Texas, Syracuse and Kansas also were soaring toward possible bowl berths.

Top-ranked LSU skimmed over its toughest hurdle on the way to its second straight national championship and a repeat appearance in the Sugar Bowl by turning back third-ranked Mississippi, 7-3, Saturday night on an 89-yard punt return by all-American Billy Cannon.

The Tigers face another toughie, Tennessee, next Saturday and then close out their regular season against Mississippi State and Tulane, who have lost eight games between them.

Here are the possible pairings for the major bowl games entering the final month of the season:

ROSE - Northwestern (6-0) vs. Washington (6-1) or Oregon (6-1).

SUGAR - Louisiana State (7-0) vs. Clemson (5-1) or Arkansas (5-2).

ORANGE - Syracuse (6-0) vs. Kansas (4-3).

COTTON - Texas (7-0) vs. Air Force (4-1) or Mississippi (6-1).

GATOR - Georgia (6-1) or Ole Miss vs. Arkansas or TCU 5-2.

Northwestern and Kansas can clinch a tie for first place in their respective conferences next Saturday while Syracuse reportedly will be offered an Orange Bowl bid if it gets by Penn State in a showdown "meeting" of the unbeaten.

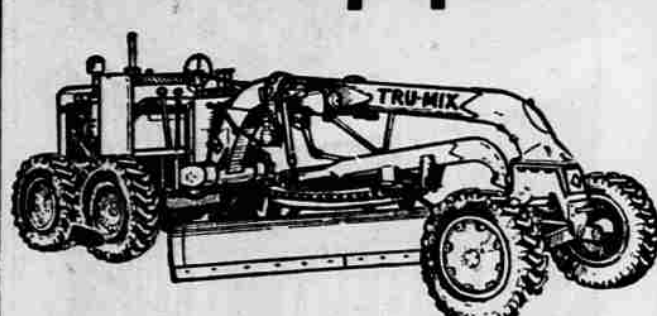
Wildcats Meet Wisconsin
Second ranked Northwestern, leading the Big Ten with a 4-0 mark, has a weekend date with Wisconsin (3-1) in a game that may decide the conference representative in the Rose Bowl.

In the Big Eight conference race, Kansas and Oklahoma are tied for the lead with 3-1 records. The Sooners are barred from a return trip to the Orange Bowl while Iowa State (2-2) has tough games remaining against Nebraska and Oklahoma. So Kansas will be in the driver's seat if it gets by Colorado this week.

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Crusaders Will Be Hosts for Oregon Quarter-Final Mix

St. Mary's of Medford today awaited its role of host in the quarter-finals of the Oregon Class B high school football championships.

The Crusaders of this city humbled Merrill on Saturday to gain the District 5B diadem. They turned back the Huskies 46 to 26 in an offensive-minded game. Merrill last year had won the Oregon small school crown.

Victory matched the Medford parochial school against a team from central or north central Oregon. That adversary, as yet unknown, will represent District 6. Oregon School Activities association football play-off plan places the quarter-final on the field of the winner of District 5 not later than Nov. 14.

St. Mary's, 6-0 in the circuit after triumph here Saturday night, tightened up its early loose ground defenses and broke away from a 20 to 20 deadlock to conquer the Klamath county Husky pack. Merrill was never closer to the Crusaders than a touchdown after SM made it 27 to 20 in the closing seconds of the half. Score after three periods was 39 to 26.

Three TDs Each

Dick and Bob Evans each tabulated three touchdowns for the Medford team and Ron Daley one while Terry Cooper kicked four conversion points. Dean Haskins and Troy Patterson on runs and Bill Beasley and Billy Artery on passes from Denny Salvadori were the Husky TD makers. Patterson ran an extra and Buckle Wilson thumped a bonus point.

Coach Bill McKibbin's aroused Crusaders went for touchdowns on their second, third, fourth and fifth chances with the ball and Merrill on its first, second and fourth opportunities as the teams traded score for score in the first half.

It was a keyed up St. Mary's aggregation which entered action Saturday. Pass defense was a Crusader weakness through the night and led to three Merrill scores, and it looked for a time like ground assault might be a force toward a Husky triumph. But, St. Mary's settled down and collected its turf resistance. It permitted just one Merrill touchdown in the second half, holding the Huskies to minus 10 net rushing yardage over the last two quarters.

Team Effort
It was "definitely a team effort," said McKibbin in reviewing St. Mary's title-winning game.

The Merrill loss ended a long string of victories for the Klamath county king which wound up with a 5-1 mark within the district. It hadn't lost to any other team this year and was unbeaten through 1958.

Merrill drove 45 yards to the game's first score after a 21-yard punt runback by Haskins. Thirteen plays were needed and Haskins toured the last 11 yards with Haskins converting.

St. Mary's strided from its own 42-yard line after the ensuing kick-off. After a three-yard gain by Dick Evans, a penalty against Merrill for grabbing a face mask put the ball on the Husky 40 stripe. Three plays moved to the 29 yard line. Then Alex Mene quick hit for 20 to the nine. Dick Evans then went over right tackle and shook loose from tacklers three times before he crossed the goal. Cooper added his first extra for a 7 to 7 tie.

Beasley Scores
The Huskies followed with a 56-yard drive after a good kick-off return by Haskins. They needed just five plays to score with a Salvadori chuck to Beasley for 21 yards and the TD. A 15-yard run by Beasley and a 16-yarder by Salvadori were the big ground gains of the quick promenade which made it 13 to 7.

But the Medford team struck back even more suddenly, using just three plays to cover 67 yards. Mene advanced from the SM 33 to the 37 on the last play of the first quarter. On the first strike of the second Bob Evans pumped a pass to Roger Hout, who made it to the 11 for a 52-yard gain. Bob Evans covered the remaining distance to the pay line on a roll and option play. That tied it 13 each.

Merrill was held on its own 27 after the kick-off and St. Mary's took the ball on its own 45 after the punt. Mene swept nine yards to the Husky 46 then ran all the way to the goal on a quick-hitter only to have a procedure infraction cancel out the run. SM still was not to be denied. Two plays got a first down on the 44 and the Crusaders went the rest of the distance in eight plays with Bob Evans sneaking over from the one. Cooper's kick made it 20 to 13.

Kick Backfires
Next Husky TD was just about a gift. SM tried an on-side kick-off by Bob Evans and recovered the ball but a Crusader was off-side and the Medford team had to kick again. The Crusaders tried the same maneuver but the ball went out-of-bounds on the SM 40 where Merrill got possession.

Three plays later the Klamath club had a TD with Patterson scoring from the three and Wilson kicking the extra to again deadlock the game. A 33-yard pass-run, Salvadori to Brian Fields, put the ball on the five-yard line in this surge.

St. Mary's came back in the last 1 minute 35 seconds of the half to go ahead to stay, covering 57 yards in four plays and the help of a penalty on Merrill. Fred Lucas ran 14 yards to the Merrill 43. A sensational reverse, lateral and pass play, with Bob Evans hurling to Daley, took the ball 35 yards to the eight-yard line.

Mene made just a yard then the Huskies were charged with a personal foul and penalized half the distance to the goal. Dick Evans plowed over the right side of the line into the end zone and Cooper thumped the bonus for the halftime 27 to 20.

Fumble Halts
The Crusaders tabulated on their first three scrimmage marches of the second half and a fumble stopped them on the nine-yard line on the fourth. SM lost the ball on downs on the 11-yard line just before the closing horn.

A clipping penalty on the second half kick-off put Merrill back on its eight yard line and it was forced to punt on fourth down from behind the nine yard line. That gave SM the ball on the Husky 37. Four plays gained to the 15 but Hout was spilled back on the 25. Bob Evans then pitched to Daley for a touchdown.

Merrill next went 55 yards to tally. Salvadori to Beasley passes got 24 and 12 yards to the 19 and Patterson hit to the 18. Salvadori tossed to Artery for 33 to 26.

Second St. Mary's touchdown of the third quarter was on a Bob to Dick Evans ac-

tioned with a 5-1 mark within the district. It hadn't lost to any other team this year and was unbeaten through 1958.

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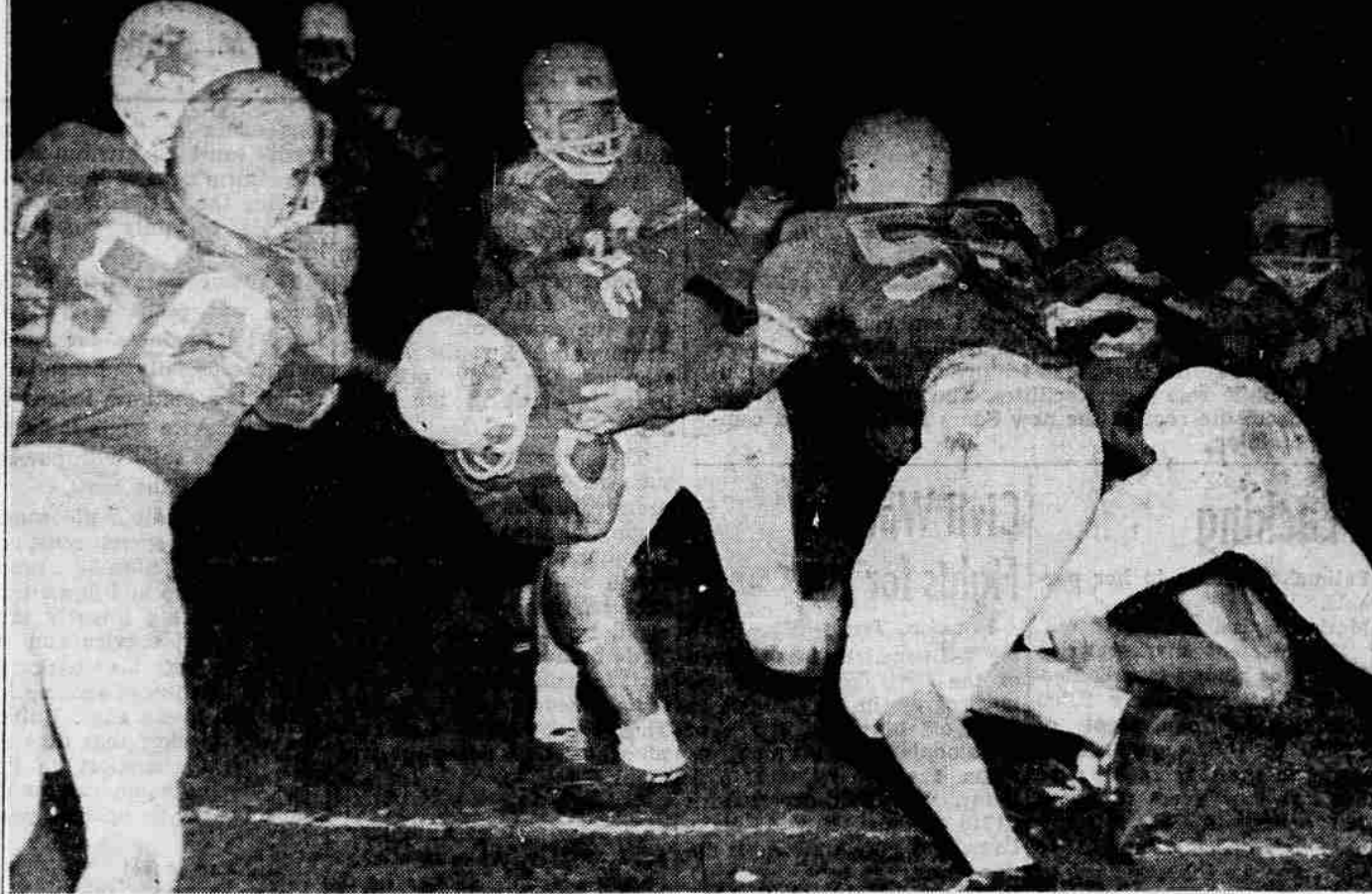

JERUSALEM MAYOR

Jerusalem - (UPI) - Gershon Agron, 66, mayor of Jerusalem since 1956, died Sunday after a lengthy illness.

The pitch was a short one and some spectacular broken field work by Dick enabled him to elude tacklers and reach the end zone on a play which covered 60 yards.

Tackled From Behind

Daley accomplished a save for SM on the following kick-off. Haskins, who received the ball on the Merrill 17, ran back 48 yards to the Crusader 35 before being caught from behind by the St. Mary's flankman. The Huskies moved to the SM 12 where they lost the ball on downs.

The Crusaders toured the 88 yards in nine plays for the last TD. Hout went for 21 yards and Fred Lucas for 28 and the pay-off romp was a four-yard option run by Bob Evans using his blockers well. Cooper added his fourth extra.

A 33-yard pass play, Bob Evans to Daley, took the Crusaders 33 yards to the Merrill eleven on SM's fourth scrimmage series of the half. But the gain cost the team the services of Daley for the play-offs. He was injured when tackled and was found to have a broken collarbone. Coach McKibbin said that Daley might be able to see duty if the Medford club reaches the B championship finals. It's a real loss because of his ability plus desire.

Interception
A Bob Evans pass interception gave SM the ball in the waning minutes on the Merrill 26. Dick Evans made it to the 13 for first down. But, the home team was set back to the 18 on a procedure infraction. Dick gained to the 17 but Bob lost to the 19. Delay of the game was tooted on St. Mary's and the ball moved back to the 24. Lucas went to the 17 and to the 11 on successive plays but SM had to give up the ball. Merrill's Salvadori was dumped back on his two as the game ended.

Merrill's ambitions in the final moments were damaged when Salvadori suffered a hobbling leg injury. That hurt the Husky aerial threat.

SM offense, run well by Bob Evans, outgained Merrill 445 to 225.

Raiders Drub EOC For 2nd in League

North Bend - Taking a hint from Southern Oregon college football Coach Al Akins, Gordy Carrigan went out and caught three touchdowns passes to help the Raiders swamp Eastern Oregon college 25-7 in the Ninth annual Myrtle Bowl game here Saturday night.

Akins was meditating over the fact the Raiders had scored only one touchdown through the air in six previous games just before game time in the dressing room.

Carrigan, slim and standing just 5 feet 10 inches, snared seven passes while being double teamed most of the evening. His yardage added up to 90.

Jack Brown and Lance Locke, the Raiders top two quarterbacks had a field day through the air. On the ground the defensive unit of the Raiders was having an equally good time in holding Eastern Oregon to a net of five yards.

10 of 13 by Brown
Brown hit 10 of the 13 aerials he threw and one was Carrigan's first touchdown in the second quarter. Locke tallied twice on aerials to Carrigan while completing four passes.

Led by the charging of Dick Smith, Neil Green, Pedro Colley, and Dave Brown, the forward wall of the Raiders allowed only 63 yards rushing while smearing Mountie ball carriers for 81 yards in losses. This gave EOC a minus 18 yards rushing.

Through the air the luckless Mounties completed three passes for 23 yards.

Akins said of his squad afterwards that it was one of the best combined efforts of offense and defense the Raiders have put together this year.

Southern Oregon, in nailing down runner-up honors in the Oregon Collegiate conference for the second successive year, totaled 345 yards offensively. SOC got 174 passing and 171 rushing.

Had Command
The Raiders had command throughout the game and scored their first touchdown with 2:54 remaining in the first quarter when Allen Barnes banged across from the one foot line. Phil Swisher added his only conversion of the night.

SOC got the ball on the Eastern 47 yard line after a punt and after losing one yard, Brown passed to Jim McAbee for 25 yards and Carrigan for 16 to put the ball on the Mountie seven yard line. Doyle Branson got five yards

before Barnes put the ball on the one foot line prior to the touchdown.

Scoring in every quarter, SOC's Carrigan got the first of his three with 10:49 remaining in the second stanza. The drive started on EOC's 45 yard line with Brown, Eldon Francis, and Barnes moving the ball to the 12 yard line along with a seven yard pass play to Carrigan.

Dominated All Areas
Brown then rolled out on a second down situation and hit Carrigan in the end zone.

Halftime showed the Raiders leading 13-0 and dominating every area of play. At the half Eastern had managed only one first down and that by virtue of a penalty against SOC.

Again starting in EOC territory, the Raiders drove to the Mountie seven where Locke hit Carrigan for the second tally through the air. It was Francis and Al McKinnis packing the ball all the way on the ground except for a pass interference penalty to set up the score.

SOC was down in scoring position again when the passing came to a disastrous hesitation as Chuck Backer intercepted for EOC on his own 25 and raced the full 75 yards for the score. John Wilmarth added the conversion with 7:35 remaining in the fourth quarter.

3-4 for Season
Not to be slighted, the Raiders started another drive that moved the ball to the Mountie 27 yard line on an 11-yard pass to Carrigan.

Carrigan driving in and then breaking out met face to face with Locke's pass on the next play three yards into the end zone with 28 seconds remaining to play in the game.

The win gives the Raiders a 3-4 record on the season and a final 3-1 mark in OCC play.

Oregon Tech nailed down the Oregon Collegiate conference title Saturday night with a hard-pressed 19-12 victory over winless Oregon College of Education at Klamath Falls.

Fullback Stan Glass carried the load for the Owls as he scored a pair of touchdowns on runs of three and seven yards. Glass carried the ball 33 times for a total of 169 yards.

It was the second consecutive year the Owls finished in the conference top spot, but last year they lost the crown because of a conference ruling on player ineligibility.

Southern Oregon sewed up second place in the conference standings with a decisive 25-7 win over Eastern Oregon College at North Bend.

Portland State, with only one conference win this season slipped out of league competition to absorb a 40-0 defeat at the hands of Pacific university.
