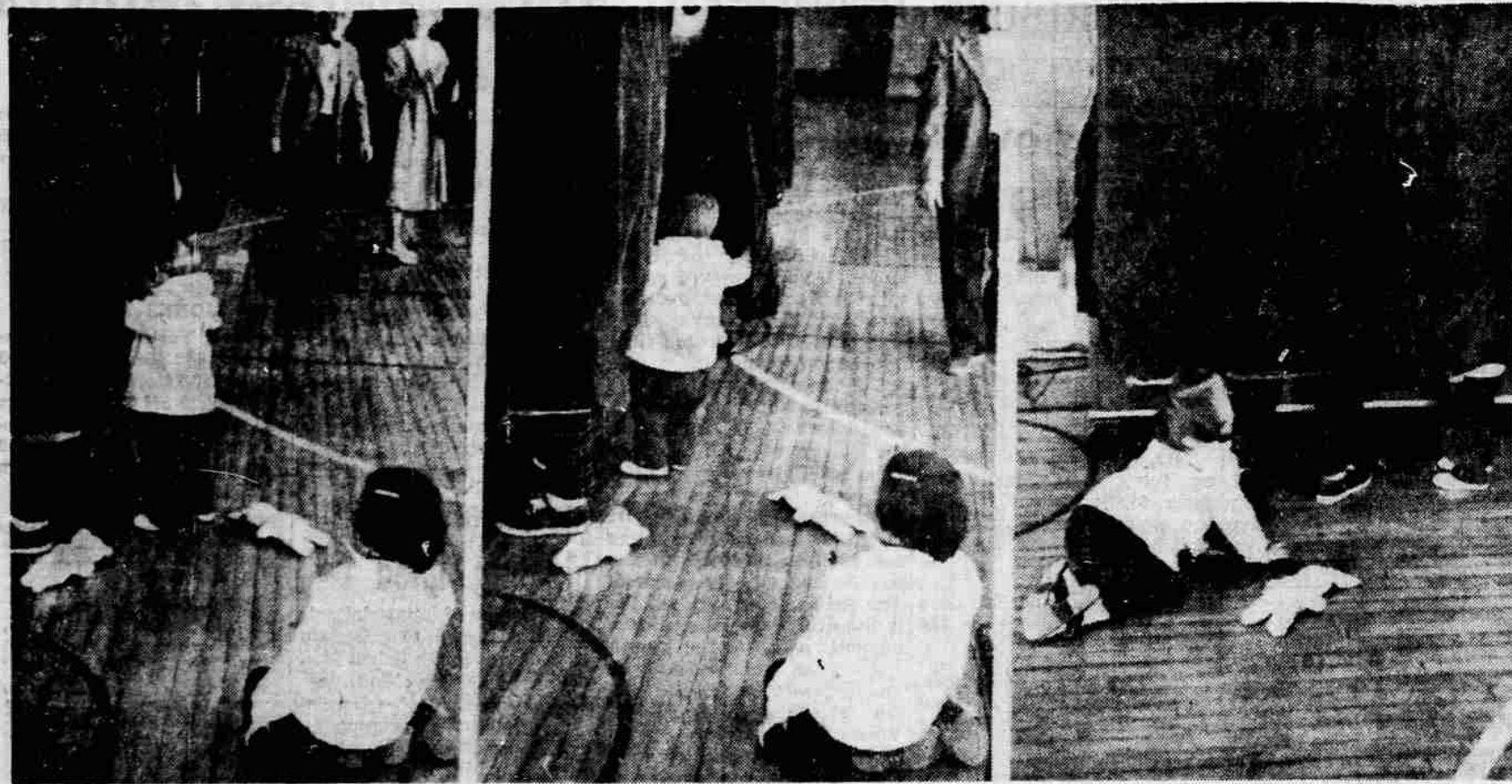


Steel Union Speaker Disclaims Shortage

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Dentist Sought For Giving Pills To 30 Children

Fremont, Calif. — (UPI) — Dr. William V. Shyne, a prominent dentist, was sought by police today on a charge of giving candy-coated laxative pills to 30 children on Halloween.

The children became violently ill, and Municipal Judge Edward Quaresima issued two warrants Monday charging Shyne with "outrage of public decency" and "unlawful dispensing of drugs."

Shyne, 40, denied the charge Sunday but police were unable to serve the warrants Monday. The dentist was not at home and he did not appear at his office.

To Issue Bulletin
Lt. Lowell Creighton of the police department said he would issue an all-points bulletin for Shyne today if the dentist was not located.

Police said about 450 of the laxative pills were tossed into the trick-or-treat bags of youngsters Halloween night. Thirty of the children later suffered attacks of vomiting and diarrhea which lasted several hours.

Inspector Lee Rieman said the pills were traced to the home of Shyne. The inspector said laboratory tests established that the pills were bitter alone, a strong purgative.

Portland Papers Face Strike Threat

Portland — (UPI) — Portland's two daily newspapers today faced the possibility of a strike Wednesday by members of the Stereotypers Union.

The Multnomah County Central Labor Council was told Monday night the union has received sanction from its international headquarters to strike Wednesday against the Oregon Journal and the Oregonian if no progress is made in contract negotiations.

The Labor Council referred to its executive board a request by the union to place the newspaper on the "unfair" list.

Conviction would be punishable by death before a firing squad.

Census Training Course Slated

A training course for census takers who will cover the west area of Jackson county for the 1959 census of agriculture will attend a training course Nov. 4 at the Rogue River city hall.

Harold Sander, crew leader who will conduct the session, recently attended a five-day census training course.

The Nov. 4 course will cover the use of the census questionnaire, definitions, interviewing and map reading. Emphasis will be placed on locating every farm and obtaining complete and accurate information.

Nov. 9 is the starting date for the census. Scheduled to take the Nov. 4 training are Raymond Frantz, and William Ferguson, Gold Hill; George Brown, Rogue River; Edith Shores, Jacksonville; and Charles Taylor, M. A. Adams and Francis Hamilton, Central Point.

Sander reported that census takers assigned for training in the three areas of Josephine county are Bertha King, Eva Henderson and Glen McCune, all of Grants Pass.

Snider Reappointed to AMA Highway Group

Medford Mayor John Snider has been reappointed to the highway committee of the American Municipal Association, according to a letter received from A. J. Celebrezze, association president and mayor of Cleveland, Ohio.

This will be Snider's second year on the committee, which is scheduled to meet this fall in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Suit to Condemn Land for Highway Use Continues

A state highway department condemnation suit involving property owned by Carl W. (Bill) and Irene Anhorn northeast of Central Point continued today with testimony of several appraisers.

The state's latest offer was \$17,500 for the property, between Freeman and Central Point market roads. Frank Van Dyke is representing the Anhorns, and Tom McLean, Salem, the state highway department.

The Anhorns have already moved off the property and the state has paid them \$14,000 so they could purchase property nearby. The state is seeking to condemn the property for the Seven Oaks-Nile creek section of the new Highway 99 freeway.

The defendants are seeking \$22,500 full cash market value for the property.

Testify as Appraisers
Testifying so far as appraisers have been Mark Goldy, Medford real estate man; Dale Kirklin, Medford, right of way buyer for the state highway department; Kenneth Colgill, Eugene, real estate broker; Cap. C. Vandagriff, Medford realtor; E. L. Bartholomew, Medford real estate man; and Jack McCormick, resident engineer with the state highway department.

The state is taking 3.32 acres and is leaving one-half acre.

Testimony yesterday afternoon and this morning was concentrated on how the appraisal figures were arrived at, value of land and buildings, highest use to which the property could be made, and values of land or real estate near the Anhorn property.

Tax Payment Deadline For Discount Nears

To receive the 3 per cent discount, taxes must be paid in person at the county tax office before 5 p.m., Friday, Nov. 13, and all payments, sent by mail must be postmarked before midnight, Sunday, Nov. 15, according to Sheriff Joe Walsh.

Walsh said normally the tax payments could be made in person on Nov. 15. However, that date falls on Sunday and the tax office is closed Saturday and Sunday.

North Entrance Road At Park Closes Today

Off-Year Ballots Expected To Give Clues To Future

Washington — (UPI) — Americans vote today in off-year elections which will be studied closely for clues to Democratic and Republican prospects in the national races just one year away.

In one of several big city mayoralty contests, former GOP presidential aspirant Harold Stassen is the underdog in Philadelphia to the Democratic incumbent, Richardson Dilworth.

Kentucky elects a governor in a race which has featured an old-fashioned political brawl among the Democrats, involving out-going Gov. A. B. (Happy) Chandler. Republicans hope the split will help them to victory.

Mississippi elects a governor. But the Democratic candidate, Ross Barnett, is unopposed. Virginia, Mississippi, Kentucky, New Jersey and New York vote for members of the state legislatures.

In addition to Philadelphia, other major cities holding elections include Cleveland and Columbus, Ohio; Pittsburgh, Boston, San Francisco, Indianapolis, Ind., and Bridgeport and Hartford, Conn. Hundreds of other cities and counties also will ballot for local officials.

If Stassen loses, it could mean the end of the political road for the former Minnesota governor, 1948 and 1952 GOP presidential contender, disarmament adviser to President Eisenhower and loser in the Pennsylvania GOP gubernatorial primary last year.

Carbon Monoxide Blamed for Deaths

La Grande — (UPI) — The Union county coroner's office today attributed deaths of two Elgin teenagers in a car near Elgin last Saturday to carbon monoxide poisoning. Deputy Coroner Everett C. Abbott said a final report was forthcoming from the State Crime Laboratory in Portland.

The victims were Russell Theodore Kennedy Jr., 19, and Sheila K. Stine, 15, both of Elgin. They left their homes Friday night for a dance in Elgin. Their bodies were found in the car in a ditch near the girl's home the next morning.

Firemen Accept Repairable Toys

City firemen are now accepting repairable toys for their annual project to provide Christmas gifts for needy youngsters of the community.

Firemen mend and paint the toys and Medford Lady Lions handled the distribution of the gifts.

Toys may be left at the central fire station at Front and Third sts. Any toy which is repairable will be accepted. The large wheeled ones are preferred, such as tricycles and wagons. Firemen also will take dolls and doll clothing for Lady Lions to fix.

Firemen will have their annual dance on the night of Thanksgiving day, Nov. 26, at the Medford Armory with proceeds going to the toy project.

Panama Students Demand U.S. Give Up Canal Zone

Three Injured in Demonstration

Balboa, Canal Zone — (UPI) — Panamanian students demanding the United States give up the Panama Canal Zone injured three U.S. policemen today in a wild, stone-throwing battle.

The American police finally broke up the attack with tear gas and arrested two of the students. They stood by with fire hoses ready in expectation of a new and bigger onslaught.

The battle raged across a road marking the border between Panamanian and Canal Zone territory. It was near the Panama National Assembly building but only one Panamanian patrol car showed up during the early violence.

'Peaceful Invasion'
The rock attack occurred when the police refused to let the students carry their demonstration into the Canal Zone itself.

The demonstration was stirred up by former Panamanian Foreign Minister Aquilino Boyd who had called for a "peaceful invasion" of the Canal on this Panamanian Independence Day.

Boyd, accompanied by his wife, four young children and a dozen followers, were permitted by American guards to go onto Canal Zone property after they warned him they would stop any trouble he tried to create.

He emphasized his campaign was a peaceful one. On the banks of the canal he made a short speech and said "we sincerely believe that pretty soon we are going to have the Panamanian flag flying officially over this part of Panamanian territory."

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Boys Apprehended For Radio Theft
Two Medford boys, aged 14 and 15, were turned over to juvenile authorities Monday after precautionary measures by Medford police resulted in the boys' arrest.

The two were taken into custody at Walker Radio company, 205 West Jackson st., when they attempted to purchase batteries for a radio which had been stolen from Couey Appliance store, 225 East Sixth st.

Police notified local radio supply stores to watch for the suspects after Garner Wayne Couey, owner of the appliance store, reported the theft of the transistor radio sometime between Friday and Monday.

The missing radio was identified by a serial number. Authorities lodged the 14-year-old in the juvenile detention home and released the 15-year-old to his parents.

Two Burglaries Reported in City

Burglaries of the Merchants Wholesale Supply company, 300 North Fir st., and the Empire Beverage of Medford, Inc., 14 West Fourth st., are under investigation by Medford city police.

An estimated \$5 in change was taken from a cash box in a cabinet drawer at Merchants Supply and an estimated \$6 in change and 8½ cases of beer were reported missing from the beverage company.

Police said the beverage company burglary was discovered about 1:30 a.m. by an officer on a routine patrol and the second crime was discovered later this morning by store officials.

Area Men Cleared Of Tree Charges

Two Shady Cove men, Lawrence Lester Sanderson, 28, and Lawrence Carl Rone, 28, were cleared of charges of illegal cutting of Christmas trees in Klamath county district court Friday.

The charges were dropped at the request of the Klamath county district attorney, who stated that the men were not directly involved in any way with the illegal cutting of Christmas trees.

The men had previously been arrested in Jackson county on a Klamath county warrant concerning a case of Christmas tree cutting on the Klamath Indian tribe lands.

Income Increase In State Said To Be Below Average

Portland — (UPI) — Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said today average incomes in the nation as a whole for the past six years have gone up 17.6 per cent but the Oregon increase is only 5.5 per cent.

Neuberger testified at a one-day hearing into the Oregon unemployment situation conducted by Sen. Pat McNamara (D-Mich.).

The Oregon lawmaker said the Oregon increase was "less than the inflation in consumer prices during the period."

Need Defense Work
Neuberger said Oregon had "no major defense industries" although California and Washington were well fixed in this field.

He urged that the special Senate committee on unemployment problems consider the "impact and distribution of defense spending in the United States and the economic equities involved."

Oregon is not prostrate, Neuberger said. "It is a state of intelligent, capable people, arm wage rates are the second highest in the nation and factory wages are above the national average. Sixty-five per cent of Oregon families own their own homes, compared to 55 per cent nationally," he added.

But, he said, "Oregon does have problems of growth and employment."

He said the state relies greatly on the lumber industry which is directly affected by federal policies with respect to housing.

McNamara commented that he did not think the unemployment problem in Portland was the worst in the country "but it certainly is one of the areas we need to know more about."

Oregon Labor Commissioner Norman Nilssen said the nation was training fewer apprentices in skilled trades.

Jobless Benefits Continue Climb
Salem — (UPI) — The number of Oregonians drawing unemployment benefits continued its seasonal climb last week, totalling 10,685 compared to 9,930 a week earlier.

Employment Department officials said the trend will continue upward during the next few months, probably reaching the seasonal unemployment high sometime next February.

The current increase is caused by layoffs thinly scattered through many industries, especially logging and construction.

Supreme Court Hears Attorney As Case Opens

Government's Side Will Be Presented

Washington — (UPI) — The United Steelworkers told the Supreme Court today there is enough steel in this country to insure the nation's health and safety even if the 112-day-old strike continues to the end of the year.

The union's attorney, 51-year-old Arthur J. Goldberg, made this statement in opening oral arguments on the steelworkers' plea that the tribunal overturn a lower court's back-to-work order against the strikers.

First Ruling
The high court's decision on the union's appeal will mark the first time it has ever ruled on Taft-Hartley Law provisions authorizing 80-day no strike injunctions.

Speaking in a calm, matter-of-fact manner, Goldberg cited production figures to show that steel output has not been completely halted by the walkout. He said companies still in production are capable of producing 25 million tons a year, or enough to meet the nation's basic needs.

Warren Calls Case
Chief Justice Earl Warren, calling up the case by name and number, announced that "because of cooperation of counsel on both sides, we believe there is no need to put a time limit on the arguments, believing parties will take no longer than necessary."

Goldberg argued the union's case first.

Solicitor General J. Lee Rankin prepared to present the government's side when Goldberg finished.

There was standing room only in the majestic marble pillared court chamber, which was crowded with lawyers, tourists and the principal parties to the long dispute. A long line of would-be spectators waited patiently in the halls, hoping for a chance to get into the court room.

Figures Cited
Goldberg cited production figures in an effort to dispute the contention of President Eisenhower and Federal Judge Herbert P. Sore of Pittsburgh, Pa., that the strike imperiled the national health and safety.

Under the Taft-Hartley Law, the President may appoint a fact-finding board if, in his opinion, a strike imperils the national health or safety. If a federal court agrees that an emergency exists it may grant a back-to-work injunction.

Dental Records of Children Compared
Corvallis — (UPI) — A five-state study involving children's teeth and fluorides in water shows that although Oregon youths had a high number of decayed, missing and filled teeth, they ranked below many other areas. Oregon State College took part in the study.

More than 2,000 youngsters between 14 and 16 were examined in Oregon, Washington, Utah, Montana and Idaho. Almost all of them needed dental care.

In areas where there was no fluoride in water, 95 per cent needed attention compared to 77 per cent in those who lived where water was fluorinated.

Salem — (UPI) — Forty-five school children were back in classes today little the worse for a Monday accident in which their bus toppled over at West Stayton.

Turkey-Poland Deadlock In UN Voting Continues

United Nations, N.Y. — (UPI) — The General Assembly set a new record in its marathon balloting today without breaking the deadlock between Turkey and Poland. It suspended further voting in its Security Council election for two more weeks.

1958 Record Broken
Six ballots were taken this morning, bringing the total to 37 and breaking the record of 36 cast in 1955 when a stalemate between the Philippines and Yugoslavia was broken by drawing lots. Yugoslavia won and was elected under an agreement that it would serve only half the two-year term on the council.

Turkey, which held the lead when balloting was suspended two weeks ago, ran its edge to its widest margin today on the 34th ballot, when it polled 43 votes against 35 for Poland. However, Poland tied the balloting on the next round and held a 42-38 edge when voting was suspended until Nov. 17. A two-thirds majority is required.

Mexico Not To Remove Storm Dead

Minatitlan, Mexico — (UPI) — The grave diggers gave up today in Minatitlan.

"What's the use of digging them out from under 15 feet of mud only to bury them under six feet of dirt?" asked Maj. Andres Coamu, commander of the rescue team sent here by the Mexican government.

Must Lie in Peace
"The rest of the dead must lie in peace where they are."

The smell of death lay everywhere in this mountain village that was almost wiped out in a grinding roar at 7:30 a.m. a week ago today when

nightlong cloudbursts loosened the slopes of Los Copales Mountains.

The living were walking dead, moving through the sloping streets like zombies or sleepwalkers or little children just awakened after a dream too frightening to be understood.

Silent and Unsmiling
They were silent and unsmiling and could give no coherent account of the disaster that struck while most were sleeping or huddled awake in their mud and straw huts awaiting the end of the cyclone-borne rains.

The village of Minatitlan lies low on the slopes of Los Copales, nestled in a ravine formed by two interlocking mountainsides. Below is a nameless dry riverbed that last Tuesday became a great river, swollen and trapping the people of Minatitlan.

Many Escape Death
Village authorities say 1,374 persons were living here a week ago when the sides of the mountains trembled, slipped slightly and then roared downward toward the flooded riverbed with ever-increasing speed.

Almost 900 persons escaped death, though 100 were badly hurt. They crossed themselves and said it was a miracle. There was no warning and no premonition. Another 400 persons were crushed in their adobe huts or smothered beneath tons of muck and mire.

Tarantulas, Scorpions Dead
One of the first horrors of the disaster, the swarms of tarantulas and scorpions which were jarred loose and attacked the survivors, are dead. The Public Health Ministry sprayed the area and ended this terror.
