

EAGLE POINT Week To Be Observed

Eagle Point - "Go Exploring in Books" is the theme selected for National Library week, Nov. 1 through 7 and the Eagle Point Grade school is celebrating by processing 400 new books to place in the newly remodeled library. New desks, chairs, and shelves were placed in the library during the summer.

Librarian Mrs. Maxine Berryman said that each pupil in school has a half hour library period once a week in which to check out and return borrowed books. Library instruction is conducted in the rooms, leaving the librarian free for individual help.

A library club is composed of four students from the seventh and eighth grade classes from boys and girls who must attain and maintain top grades in their work. They work each day between 2:30 and 3:15 p.m. in the library if their studies are completed. A meeting is held at that time on Fridays. The members work by twos during the day checking in and out books, mending and repairing books, filling cards, keeping magazines and shelves in order, and marking and processing new books.

Mrs. Berryman said that members make up the bulletin boards in the library and in the front hall, selecting for their theme this week "I Will Not," with pictures and captions of the things students should not do in school and on the school grounds.

According to Mrs. Berryman, each member will select a new book and show and explain it to each class in school as part of National Library week to build up the students' interest in reading. Special awards are presented to the youngsters at the close of school and a Christmas and swimming party at the close of the year are held for the club.

Officers of the library club are president, Tommy Lavine; vice president, Sharon Short; and secretary-treasurer, Eddie Hill. Librarians are Wayne Cook, Judy Hill, Sharon Short, Gayle Grow, Tommy Levine, Sandra Charters, Mike Charley, Cheryl De Haven, Eddie Hill, and Steven Jorde. Assistant librarians are Jeffrey Hopewell, Carolyn Unger, Brenda Solenberger, Donald Hanscom, Margaret Nelms, Duane Windham, Gail Trimble, Ronnie Young, Mary Alice Peska and Thomas Arthur. Special assistant librarians are Nancy Walton, Mike Mattheisen and Vivian Sinclair.

Mrs. Berryman said students are all taught to care for their library books and little damage occurs from them but books are being turned into the library torn, damaged, and soiled by the younger brothers and sisters. She said she would appreciate the parents help in keeping them out of reach of the younger children.

The Parent Teacher association sponsors a drive each year in which parents may either donate money for books or the books themselves, to the school library and a plaque bearing the child's name put on in memory of the child's birthday. The project is carried on yearly during National Education week. Open house for the new library will be held in conjunction with the open house tour conducted by the school during National Education week.

A polio clinic will be held in Eagle Point Saturday, Nov. 14, between 3 and 5 p.m. at the Eagle Point Grade school gymnasium. The program is being co-sponsored by the Jackson County Medical society and Jackson county junior chambers of commerce for the benefit of those not having or unable to obtain their polio shots in the past. President Larry Allen also visited the club and gave a talk on the polio program. State Vice President Glenn Nelson made an official visit to the club and presented slides and recordings on the Basic 10 of International Organizations and of the community development program.

The first of three rehearsals was held in the Eagle Point gymnasium Monday with the next one scheduled Monday, Nov. 7 at 7 p.m. The final rehearsal will be held Tuesday, Nov. 12, and everyone entered is asked to either be present or contact Mrs. Hanscom prior to that time.

The Family Council

Editor's Note: The Family Council consists of a judge, a psychiatrist, three clergymen, a newspaper editor, a women's editor and two writers. Each article is a summary of an actual case history. The Council reports on problems that have been dealt with by responsible agencies and counselors.

Eloise Y. - I can't stand them on my neck any longer. Mrs. J. Y. - She was always full of back-talk.

Eloise Y. - Two years ago when I was 17 I married my high school boy friend. Four months after our marriage we broke up and I went back to my parents.

Ever since I've come home they've been throwing up at me what a chump I was. They think they can now treat me like dirt. They think nothing of telling me off in front of my date if I come home late. They disgrace me every chance they get. They keep telling me everyone I go out with is no good.

I would get out of here if I could, but I have had a lot of illness and have been out of a job for some time. Now I feel that I can't stand them on my neck any longer.

Mrs. J. Y. - We feel that we failed in our responsibility to bring Eloise up right. We let her go her own sweet way and look what happened!

We warned her against going out with that no-good bum she married. But we were never able to do anything with her. She has been headstrong ever since she was a child. She was always full of back talk.

We feel that she was lucky to have gotten out of that marriage before a child was born. She still has a chance to make something out of her life and this time we're going to see that she does the right thing.

The Council-These parents should be aware that they can't undo the past. Their attempts to do just that is making the present intolerable for Eloise and the prospects for the future are poor.

Parents can't guide adolescents and older children unless a firm foundation is built up in childhood. This foundation is built not only on discipline, but upon mutual trust and respect. The child who knows he can count upon his parents to be considerate and helpful may rebel at times, but in the long run will turn to them where important matters are concerned.

The fact that these parents feel a measure of guilt about Eloise's unfortunate marriage may be the beginning of a better relationship. But they are wrong to blame themselves for not having been strict enough. Strictness in itself might not have prevented that marriage. Eloise needed understanding of marriage and the better values in life.

Now Eloise undoubtedly needs some guidance in reconstructing her life, but her parents don't help her by disgracing her and tearing down her self-respect. She needs her self-respect if she is to go out and seek worthwhile contacts and a constructive future. The
