

Oregon Tied For 11th Place In UPI Football Ratings

New York—UPI—Louisiana State and Northwestern remained 1-2 today in United Press International's major college football ratings but Syracuse replaced Mississippi in third place.

Washington was the only newcomer in the top 10, replacing Georgia Tech in 10th place in the latest balloting by the 35 leading coaches who rate the teams for UPI.

Syracuse, moving from fifth to third in the wake of its 35-0 triumph over Pittsburgh, achieved the highest standing it has reached in the ratings since they were inaugurated in 1950.

Texas remained fourth and Southern California advanced from sixth to fifth. Mississippi, which lost a hard-fought, 7-3 decision to LSU Saturday night, slipped from third to sixth. Penn State, Syracuse's opponent next Saturday, was seventh. Wisconsin was eighth and Auburn ninth and ahead of Washington.

Jerry Cote Winner in Pin Meet

Jerry Cote, Klamath Falls, will lead an eight-man southern Oregon delegation into Oregon match game bowling championship play-offs next Friday, Saturday and Sunday at Portland.

Cote had a 4,885 score to win sectional honors last Saturday and Sunday at Cave-man Bowl in Grants Pass.

Karl Bennett, proprietor of the Grants Pass lanes, was second with 4,688 and Harry Goode, Medford, took third with 4,648. Other scores among the eight who will go to Portland were Al Hackenworth, Klamath Falls, 4,646; Marsh Ramsby, Medford, 4,629; Howard Larsen, Grants Pass, 4,624; Carl Lane, Klamath Falls, 4,580; and Bob Victorine, Klamath Falls, 4,574.

Three To National

The three top scorers in the state tourney, sponsored by the Oregon State Bowling Proprietors association, will earn a trip to the national run-offs at Omaha, Neb.

This week end the state's 48 semi-finalists will roll six games on Friday and six on Saturday. The field then will be narrowed to 16 finalists who will roll 16 more games on Saturday and 16 more on Sunday.

Others from Medford who took part in the sectional were Harry Frye, Bill Newland, Don Harmon, Dick Westfield, Art Brooks, Bud Fisher, Harold Ellis, Harold Vessey, Ted Jantzer, Bruce Pomeroy, Ray Speer and Fred Anderson.

Oregon and Clemson tied for 11th. Purdue, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Illinois, Tennessee, Ohio State, Texas Christian and the Air Force Academy rounded out the top 20 in that order. 20 teams drew votes.

Detroit In Trouble On Attitude

Detroit—UPI—John Henry Johnson, Detroit Lions full-back, was in double trouble today because of his indifference.

Johnson missed the plane bringing the team back from San Francisco Sunday night and was promptly suspended by Coach George Wilson.

Wilson used Johnson's absence as the occasion to lash the whole Lions roster for its lack of "desire." He warned that a general "rebuilding" is planned for 1960.

Meanwhile, a superior court bench warrant for Johnson was issued in Oakland, Calif., when Johnson's ex-wife charged he was "indifferent" about paying \$850 in back alimony.

Wilson, sorely dejected by Detroit's sixth loss in seven starts, also blamed Johnson's general indifference. He said Johnson and three other players were fined \$25 each for reporting late for practice three days before the trip West.

May Be Out For Season

Johnson's suspension may carry through the entire season, Wilson said.

"He will definitely miss next Sunday's game with the Steelers in Pittsburgh," said the coach. "As for later games, I'm not making a decision at present."

Johnson, who was supposed to be visiting in the Oakland area, was the team's leading ground gainer in 1957, but has been a flop since. He played briefly in Sunday's 33-7 drubbing at the hands of the 49ers.

Schloredt Named Back of the Week

San Francisco—UPI—Quarterback Bob Schloredt of Washington has been named the Big Five's "Back of the Week" for the second time this season.

Schloredt threw two touchdown passes against UCLA Saturday and scored another himself to pace the Huskies to a 23-7 victory.

"Schloredt always comes up with the big play that kills a team," Washington coach Jim Owens said.

Little Pascual Perez of Argentina is slated to defend his flyweight 112-pound crown against Sado Yaotia of Japan at Osaka, Japan, Thursday night in a 15-rounder. It has been postponed three times.

Middleweight contender Joey Giardello of Brooklyn and Dick Tiger of Nigeria meet in a return 10-round bout at Syracuse, N.Y., Wednesday night.

Has Upset Giardello

Tiger, champion of the British Empire, upset Giardello on a decision at Chicago, Sept. 30, betting is at "even money" for Wednesday's return.

Mike DeJohn and Charley Powell—two tall lanky heavyweights—are scheduled for a TV-radio NBC 10-round Friday night at Syracuse, N.Y. DeJohn of Syracuse is a slight favorite at 6-5, although Powell of San Diego, Calif., is ranked ninth among heavyweight contenders and DeJohn is unranked.

Scott No. 1 Challenger Of Jordan

Mexico City—UPI—Charley Scott of Philadelphia was named the No. 1 challenger for Don Jordan's welterweight title in the latest monthly ratings released by the National Boxing association.

Scott moved into the top spot in the 147-pound class on the strength of his technical knockout victory over Sugar Hart of Philadelphia two weeks ago. Hart, who previously held the No. 1 berth, slipped to fourth place.

The ratings were announced here by NBA officials, who were in Mexico City to arrange for the Association's 1960 convention.

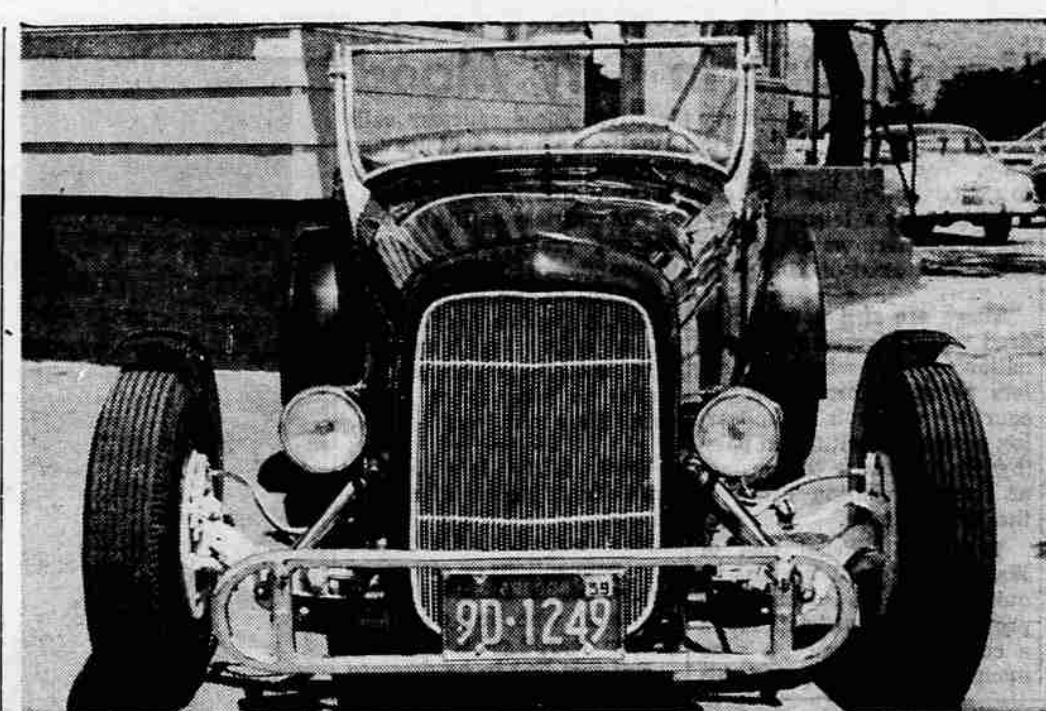

May Head New League

New York—UPI—Edgar E. (Rip) Miller, one of the "Seven Mules" who cleared the way for Notre Dame's famed "Four Horsemen" 35 years ago, is a strong candidate to become the first commissioner of the American Football League.

An informed source also told United Press International today that Buffalo, N.Y., has been granted a franchise in the new pro league. The eighth and final member is expected to be announced later this week.

Miller, assistant athletic director at the United States Naval Academy since 1947, met with AFL officials in New York last week. Frank Leahy, former Notre Dame head coach and now general manager of the Los Angeles entry, suggested Miller would make "an ideal commissioner."

ANNOUNCE GOLF DATES

New York—UPI—The 1961 junior amateur championship will be staged on Aug. 2-5 at Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y., and the 1961 senior amateur tournament will be staged on Oct. 2-7 at the Southern Hills Country Club, Tulsa, Okla., the United States Golf Association announced Monday.

Chicago—UPI—The Chicago White Sox, who promised action in the winter trading marts, got the ball rolling in a straight player deal with the Boston Red Sox.

The American league champions acquired Frank Baumann, a left handed pitcher, and gave up Ron Jackson, one of six first basemen carried on the White Sox roster.

Baumann, 26, was a bonus baby from St. Louis in 1952 and received an estimated \$100,000 for signing with the Red Sox. He finished the 1959 campaign, his first full season in the majors, with a 6-4 record and an earned run average of 4.05.

Baumann hurled two complete games, winning six-hiters from Baltimore and Detroit.

Jackson came to the White Sox after being paid a \$25,000 bonus in 1954. The 6-foot 4-inch first baseman was used only sporadically in three seasons, playing most of this year with Indianapolis where he hit .286. He hit 30 home runs and drove in 99 runs.

Trojan and Indian Lead Offensively

San Francisco—UPI—Jerry Traynham, Southern California's great fullback, and Dick Norman, Stanford's passing sensation, solidified their positions as Big Five offensive leaders during the past week, according to statistics released today.

Norman, with a big day against San Jose State, boosted his total yards gained through the air to 1,253 with 93 completions in 174 attempts. That also leads the nation. He has tossed nine touchdown passes.

Traynham upped his rushing yardage to 419—100 yards ahead of all competition. He has carried the ball 78 times.

Chris Burford of Stanford leads in pass receptions with 36 for 447 yards.

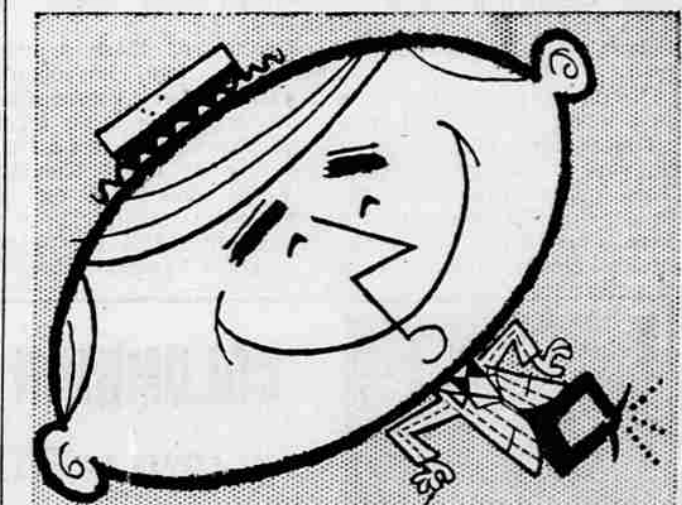

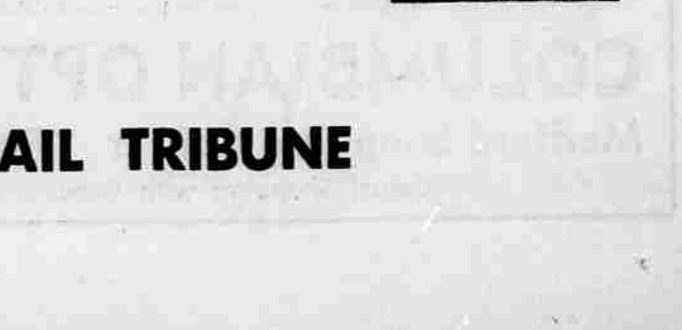
